# **DENGUE OUTBREAK:** Fisheries Dept under fire for neglecting hygiene, infrastructure at Cutbona Jetty

Authorities scramble to contain crisis; spread of cholera feared as many fishing boat labourers ill with diarrhoea; lack of toilets forces workers to relieve themselves in the open

MARGAO: In response to the dengue outbreak at the Cutbona Jetty, a review meeting was held on Wednesday at the South Goa District Collectorate to finalise both shortterm and long-term measures aimed at addressing the crisis and preventing future outbreaks. One key decision was to conduct a joint inspection of the jetty, tentatively scheduled for Monday, and to consider amending State laws to ensure the welfare of the labour force at jetties, who currently do not fall under existing labour regulations.

The meeting, convened by Salcete Deputy Collector Ganesh Barve at the request of GOACAN coordinator Roland Martins, brought together government officials and

Silva pointed out several problems, including inadequate toilet facilities at the jetty, forcing migrant workers to relieve themselves in open areas. He suggested that boat owner societies pay a lump sum in advance to cover the cost of using the existing toilet facilities.

Silva also questioned the purpose of the new jetty, which cannot be fully utilised due to inadequate facilities, with the jetty now being used as a dumping ground for old nets and broken boats. The Fisheries Department was further criticised by Cavelossim Sarpanch Dixon Vaz, who called for detailed data on the number of labourers

The Labour Department suggested that physical health check-ups be conducted for labourers upon their arrival in Goa. DySP Dessai emphasised the importance of isolating suspected dengue patients immediately.

The Deputy Collector was also urged to hold another review meeting at the end of the month to assess the progress made.

The Fisheries Department's Colva office was asked to request additional staff, and the Balli PHC was asked to seek more support to tackle the outbreak. Silva also raised concerns about discrepancies between the official number of dengue cases and the actual number of cases, particularly those admitted to private hospitals. "As per rumours, there are more than 50 cases," said Silva.

# Russian national booked for dangerous stunt atop Zuari Bridge

**PANJIM:** The Agasaim police have charged a Russian national, identified as Shchervakov Maksim, a YouTuber, for allegedly performing a dangerous stunt on top of the new cable-stayed Zuari bridge.

According to the complaint filed by Dilip Rote, Liaison Manager of DBL Dilip Buildcon Ltd, the accused entered the construction site without permission and climbed atop the tower crane. The act posed significant risks to both his own safety and the safety of others.

The police have registered an offence under Sections 329(1) and 125 of the BNS.

# Engineering student dies in collision with parked truck in Canacona

CANACONA: Blesser Gomes, a 21-year-old engineering student from Palolem, was killed in a road accident near the bus stand at Gulem on the National Highway in Canacona taluka on Wednesday night. According to the police, Gomes was returning home when his two-wheeler collided with a truck that was parked on the road unexpectedly. Despite being rushed to a nearby hospital, he was declared dead on arrival. The Canacona police have conducted a panchanama and sent the body for a post-mortem examination. Further investigations are ongoing.

Tuenkar acknowledged the overcrowding issue, which has raised safety concerns, especially after a recent incident in Margao where a girl student faced sexual harassment on an overcrowded bus. He emphasised that steps would be taken to prioritise the safety of female commuters and senior citizens on KTC buses.

"Yes, the issue has been brought to my attention, and we will ensure that preference is given to female commuters and senior citizens on KTC buses," Tuenkar stated, adding that a shortage of KTC buses has

lighted the issue, urging CM Pramod Sawant to introduce an additional bus service from the KTC bus stand to Fr Agnel Ashram-Verna. Silva, who witnessed the overcrowding firsthand, stressed the difficulties faced by students from Carmel College, Fr Agnel College, and Padre Conceicao College due to inadequate transport facilities.

"It has come to our notice that students are facing significant difficulties due to the lack of transport from the KTC Margao bus stand to Verna," Silva stated. He proposed arranging extra bus trips between 8.30 am and 9 am to alleviate the overcrowding, which he believes would significantly improve the situation for students and other commuters.

## Ailing TN fish vendor found dead in Vasco Railway Station toilet

VASCO: A 64-year-old man was found dead in the toilet at Vasco Railway Station. The deceased, identified as Nagamalai Muniyan, a native of Viluppuram, Tamil Nadu, was discovered by railway authorities around 7.20 am.

The Station Master reported it to the Vasco Railway Police who registered an Unnatural Death (UD) case under Section 174 of the CrPC and dispatched a team to the scene. Upon arrival, police found Muniyan's lifeless body inside the toilet. Preliminary inquiries with his family revealed that Munivan, who worked as a fish vendor, had been suffering from an illness. He had collapsed in the toilet and passed away. Muniyan's wife identified the body and confirmed that he had been struggling with health issues for some time. Police do not suspect any foul play.

# GKF calls on CM to introduce Romi Konkani in schools, warns of language decline without govt support

MARGAO: The Global Konknni Forum (GKF) has called on Chief Minister Pramod Sawant to 'rise above petty politics' and show statesmanship by supporting the introduction of Roman Konkani in schools and granting it equal status alongside Devanagari in the Official Language Act (OLA).

Kennedy Afonso, President of GKF, announced that the forum plans to meet with the Chief Minister and all MLAs to present a draft of the official language amendment Bill. This Bill seeks to grant Roman script equal status with Devanagari in the OLA and propose a phased introduction of Roman Konkani in school curriculums from grades I to X.

Afonso highlighted that during the 25th anniversa-

The GKF believes that the absence of Roman script Konkani in education has driven the younger generation towards English, resulting in a loss of new vocabulary in Konkani. They argue that introducing Roman Konkani in schools is crucial to preserving the language and keeping it relevant for future generations. The forum pointed out that the new National Educational Policy (NEP) does not mandate education in a specific script or official language but instead encourages teaching in the house language, local language, or mother tongue. This flexibility, they argue, should be leveraged to support
