MARGAO: The decision to transport water from River Sal for Republic Day celebrations in Delhi has cast a spotlight on the river's alarming pollution levels. While the gesture aims to honour India's martyrs, it also raises questions about the river's deteriorating state and the failure to address its environmental degradation effectively.

The pollution of River Sal has been a matter of legal and public concern for years. A Public Interest Litigation (PIL) filed by Navelim resident Prof Antonio Alvares has prompted the High Court to monitor the issue closely. In response, agencies like the Margao Municipal Council (MMC), Sewerage Infrastructure Development Corporation of Goa Limited (SIDCGL), and the Public Works Department (PWD) were directed to tackle illegal sewage connections. ble Coastal Management (NCSCM) paint a grim picture. The GSPCB found high fecal coliform levels between Khareband and Mobor, making the water unfit for bathing and recreational use. The NCSCM reported sediment imbalance at the river's mouth in Mobor, further harming its ecosystem.

Local voices have been vocal in their criticism of the Republic Day gesture. "Transporting water from Sal without addressing its pollution concerns is meaningless. Real benefits will only come once the river is cleaned, and proper pollution control measures are implemented," said Roque Fernandes, a resident of Benaulim.

Environmental advocate

Abhijit Prabhudesai framed the issue within a broader context of neglect. "If these martyrs were alive today, they would undoubtedly advocate for cleaning the river first. How can we honour their sacrifice while allowing our environment to degrade?" he asked, highlighting the lack of political will to tackle Goa's environ-

mental challenges. Anthony D'Silva from Ambelim criticised the central government's decision to nationalise the river, arguing that it has weakened local oversight. "This river is losing its true essence. The central government's decision to nationalise it has stripped it of its power, depriving both the state government and the people

of their authority," he said. He stressed that restoring local control and enforcing strict pollution control measures are essential to reviving River Sal.

The irony of the situation is not lost on residents. While the Republic Day initiative aims to symbolically unite the nation, it inadvertently underscores the stark disconnect between symbolism and meaningful action. Once considered Salcete's lifeline, River Sal now reflects the consequences of unchecked urbanisation, untreated sewage, and inadequate waste management. Activists argue that the focus must shift from symbolic gestures to actionable solutions. Measures such as plugging illegal sewage connections, installing advanced treatment systems, and managing solid waste must move beyond planning to execution. Without these, River Sal's plight risks becoming a permanent reminder of

MARGAO: A group of concerned citizens from Margao held a press conference on Tuesday, shedding new light on the Rs 18 lakh scam allegedly perpetrated by Yogesh Shetkar, a staff member of the Margao Municipality.

The citizens claimed that Shetkar had not only been involved in fraudulent acwithin the Municipality

MMC FEAST but also started his own finance company. They alleged that Shet-

kar has political backing, which has shielded him from more serious consequences.

The group demanded that all the stolen money be recovered from the accused, the effectiveness of his arrest, which they alleged was "merely for show". The Rs 18 lakh from the feast fair revenue allegedly misappropriated by Shetkar, has sparked widespread controversy. "Citizens from across Goa have been cheated by Shetkar, and plans are underway to file formal complaints with the authorities," said Savio

Coutinho claimed that they had confirmed Shetkar's involvement in starting a finance company and provided

evidence as well. "We have the copy of a receipt where Shetkar has signed as a director of the

finance company. He had launched a finance scheme, and we have found agreement documents with investors, that bear his signature. Despite all these facts being public knowledge, he has been protected," Coutinho alleged.

He called for a deeper investigation into Shetkar's finance company, in addition to the ongoing inquiry into the fraud at the Mar-

gao Municipality. Coutinho strongcriticised the police's account of

Shetkar's calling it false. "The police version of the arrest is completely untrue," he stated. He pointed out that the Green Goa Foundation (GGF) had recently raised concerns other officials in the scam, demanding their arrest as well.

The GGF has warned that if the authorities fail to recover the stolen amount and take further action against the accused, they will seek legal recourse with the High Court.

The case came to light in June, leading to Shetkar's suspension by the MMC. According to the police, Shetkar was entrusted with Rs 28,70,400 collected from 299 stall owners between May 19 and 25,. The money was intended to be deposited into the Margao Municipal Council's HDFC Bank account, but Shetkar failed to do so, instead spending the amount for his personal use.

Municipal Council (MMC) has come under sharp from criticism Savio Coutinho, former MMC chief and convenor of the Shadow Council for Margao (SCM), who claimed there are major loopholes in the town's waste disposal system.

According to Coutinho, the municipal body is entirely unprepared to address the 16 to 17 tonnes of dry waste generated in the town daily. "Of this total waste volume," Coutinho stated, "approximately 10 tonnes are sent to the Cacora plant and Nessai shed, with the remaining seven tonnes directed to the Sonsoddo Waste Management Plant."

"The most alarming revelation," Coutinho emphasised, "is that only three to four tonnes of this waste are being baled, resulting in 10 to 15 bales of approximately 300 kg each. This means that around three tonnes of dry waste continue to accumulate at Sonsoddo daily, leading to a mounting waste mountain that grows by an estimated 90 to 100 tonnes monthly."

generation might be even higher, with municipal workers reportedly disposing of a significant quantity of dry waste through crude burning in ward areas. These practices not only contribute to environmental pollution but also release toxic fumes into the already polluted environment."

"The situation at Sonsoddo is further complicated," he added, "by periodic fire incidents that temporarily reduce accumulated waste, but pose school nearby." He noted that while

wet waste is entirely processed at the Cacora plant, and 60% of dry waste goes to Cacora and Nessai shed, the minimal baling of just four tonnes daily can hardly be considered an achievement of the Council "Citizens and taxpayers need to question their elected representatives," Coutinho stressed. "Until then, nothing good will come through as the same representatives will consider that the peo-

ple are content with how

things are going on."

WRD restores nullah after Ponda civic body nixes encroachments

PONDA: Encroachments made by approximately 14 shop owners along the internal nullah at the Ponda Old bus stand have been cleared after directives from the Ponda Municipal Council (PMC).

The removal was prompted by difficulties faced by the Water Resources Department (WRD) in constructing a retaining wall for the nullah due to the encroachments.

With the obstruction now removed, the WRD has been able to widen the nullah, restoring its original 2.5-metre width. The clearance has also facilitated the construction

of a retaining wall alongside the nullah, enhancing the area's infrastructure and safety.

It was observed that several shop owners had extended their shops into the nullah basin flowing behind their establishmen ts. This unauthorised expansion significantly narrowed the nullah, reducing its width by one to oneand-a-half metres in some

The restricted flow had been a major contributor to monsoon flooding at the old bus stand, a crucial location in Ponda City.

A meeting with the affected shop owners, by Agriculture chaired Minister Ravi Naik, was held to address the issue The discussion was attended by PMC Chairperson Anand Naik and the Chief Officer.

During the meeting, the shop owners assured their cooperation with the PMC and WRD in completing the retaining wall. They recognised that the wall would not only enhance the safety of their shops but also mitigate the risk of flooding during the monsoon season.

The restoration work marks a significant step in addressing long-standing issues of flooding and infrastructural strain at the Ponda Old Bus Stand, ensuring smoother operations in the area.

Truck mishap on crumbling Manora-Raia road sparks outrage among locals

MARGAO: The deteriorating state of the Manora-Raia road came under renewed scrutiny on Tuesday after a truck toppled off the damaged stretch, leaving locals both shocked and angered by the authorities' inaction. Local MLA Aleixo Reginaldo Lourenco has assured that repairs will commence within 15 days, pledging to prioritise quality construction over the substandard work of the past.

"The road's poor condition has been a ticking time bomb for years, yet both the MLA and local officials remain indifferent," said Joao Paulo Fernandes, a local resident and AAP member. He criticised the prolonged neglect, adding, "Are they waiting for a major tragedy to occur? The broken promises of road repairs and safety measures are now clear, with incidents like these becoming more frequent."

Fernandes urged swift action

to prevent further accidents, warning, "Let this accident be a wake-up call to those in power.

residents of Mano-The ra-Raia will not tolerate this negligence any longer." Responding to the outrage, MLA Lourenco emphasised his proactive efforts to address the issue. "All necessary approvals have been secured, and a work order was issued in November. I am personally ensuring the quality of the road and coordinating with departments to avoid future disruptions," he said.

Acknowledging past shortcomings, Lourenco assured residents that inferior materials like duplicate tar would no longer be used. "This time, we're committed to building quality roads. Some of my opponents are making baseless allegations to claim credit for the work, but my focus is on delivering results," he added.
