MARGAO: The South Goa District Magistrate has directed all heads and in-charges of nationalised banks in the region to ensure 24/7 security for ATMs. This includes the mandatory installation of CCTV cameras or an Electronic Surveillance System (ESS) with features like a panic button, two-way communication, hooter, and remote control.

Additionally, property owners—including those of residential establishments, hotels, shacks, private guest houses, and religious bodies—must verify the identities of individuals before providing temporary accommodation. Non-compliance will result in FIRs being filed for violations.

The Magistrate's directives follow a report by the Superintendent of Police, South Goa, highlighting the rising misuse of fake identities and false addresses by criminals to secure temporary accommodations. This practice has made it difficult for law enforcement to trace suspects after committing crimes.

To counter this, the Magistrate has called for stricter checks, requiring accommodation providers to verify identities with legitimate documents such as Voter IDs, Aadhaar Cards, PassSouth Goa. Under the strict provi-

sions of the order, no landlords, tenants, owners, or property managers within the territorial jurisdiction of South Goa District shall let, sublet, or rent out any accommodation to any person unless the complete particulars of the tenants have been furnished to the Officer-In-Charge of the concerned Police Station. This mandatory reporting mechanism aims to create a robust tracking system for temporary residents and visitors.

Furthermore, all in-charges of accommodations are required to provide full facilities for inspection and maintain records in the aforementioned PATHIK software, allowing police authorities and other authorised entities to conduct comprehensive surveillance and verification.

MARGAO: In a bid to tackle the growing problem of unauthorized advertisements and graffiti defacing public spaces, the South Goa District Magistrate has instructed the Margao Municipal Council (MMC) to initiate a 45-day special drive to remove such defacements.

Egna Cleetus, South Goa Collector, announced the directive on Wednesday under Section 7 of the Goa Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 1988. The drive aims to restore Margao's aesthetic appeal by targeting unauthorised posters, banners, graffiti, and other forms of deface-ment that have marred the town's public properties.

The municipal officials have been tasked with identifying affected areas, allocating resources, and coordinating with enforcement teams to execute the initiative. They are required to submit a compliance report, including photographic evidence of the areas before and after the clean-up.

An awareness campaign will also be launched alongside the drive to educate the public on the legal consequences of defacement, aiming to deter such activities in the future.

The Collector stressed the importance of sufficient manpower and resources for the initiative's success. Failure to comply with the directive will invite strict legal action against responsible officers or individuals.

The initiative is expected to significantly improve Margao's environmental and aesthetic integrity, making the town cleaner and more welcoming.

South Goa police step up anti-drug raids amid surge in trafficking

MARGAO: Police stations in South Goa have intensified anti-drug operations, conducting 36 raids in 2024 under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, detecting 35 of these cases. The raids highlight the ongoing battle against drug use and trafficking, particularly in Margao and

Salcete's coastal belt. Superintendent of Police (Traffic) Prabodh Shirwaikar disclosed details of significant seizures and arrests this year. A series of August raids proved particularly impactful, with police recovering substantial amounts of ganja and arresting key offenders. Notable cases include the arrest of two individuals in Colva with 450 grams of ganja worth Rs 45,000 and another seizure in Verna involving 575 grams valued at Rs 57,500.

The largest haul came on August 21, when Curchorem police seized 5.13 kg of ganja worth Rs 5.13 lakh, leading to the arrest of two suspects. Meanwhile, Vasco police confiscated 780 grams of ganja worth Rs 78,000, further underlining the persistent threat of drug

Community members, particularly in Cuncolim, have expressed alarm over the growing prevalence of drug peddlers targeting youth and schoolchildren. Villagers submitted a memorandum to local police, urging stringent measures to curb the menace.

Despite claims of progress in reducing drug-related crimes, police acknowledge the need for enhanced resources and specialised training. Challenges such as procedural delays and limited manpower hinder sustained enforcement. However, a two-pronged strategy of regular raids and awareness campaigns has shown promise in addressing the issue.

Comparative data suggests a decline in NDPS cases from earlier years, with 60 cases reported in 2017 and a peak of 77 cases in 2018. The police attribute this reduction to increased vigilance and consistent efforts to tackle drug-related crimes.

SP Shirwaikar emphasised the importance of community cooperation in combating the drug problem, assuring that the police remain committed to protecting the youth from substance abuse.

Pernem man killed, biker injured by speeding car near Verna

MARGAO: A scooter rider was killed, and his pillion grievously injured when a speeding car hit the two-wheeler on NH-66 near Utorda Bypass Road on Thursday evening. The bearing temporary registration number MH-14-TCM-605, was driven by Prashant Gaikwad, a resident of Raigad, Maharashtra. According to sources, Gaikwad is a social media influencer and had allegedly come down to Goa to shoot 'reels' to promote the newly-launched car.

The Verna police said that the driver was allegedly driving rashly and negligently, endangering human life while traveling from Margao toward Panjim. Near the Utorda bypass, the car veered onto the wrong side of the road and collided head-on with the scooter

The scooter rider, identified as Sitaram Karapurkar of Bhat Pawni, Pernem, and the pillion rider, Ravindra Kumar Singh, a native of Jharkhand, suffered severe injuries. Tragically, the rider succumbed to his injuries at South Goa District Hospital in Margao.

The accused driver, Prashant Gaikwad, was arrested but later released on bail.

Margao restaurant closures: Special camp for pollution compliance today

MARGAO: In compliance with directions from the Goa State Pollution Control Board (GSPCB) and subsequent orders from the High Court, the district administrations had begun sealing establishments violating environmental norms earlier this month. At least 21 eateries found to be operating illegally were sealed, while authorities initiated action against 46 units whose owners failed to obtain the requisite consent from the Goa State Pollution Control Board. According to official records, the GSPCB had previously ordered the suspension of operations for 107 units in Margao city due to a lack of consent and improper effluent

discharge. Following these actions, 53 establishments submitted the necessary applications, resulting in the revocation of closure orders for those units.

To facilitate compliance, the GSP-CB has scheduled a special camp to assist with online applications for Consent to Operate and Renewal under the Water and Air Acts. The camp will take place on January 24, from 2.30 pm to 6 pm at the Collectorate Building, South Goa.

Establishments are advised to bring all required documents to ensure a smooth application process and avoid future closures. This initiative aims to streamline compliance and support local businesses in adhering to environmental norms.

Rs 20 lakh paver project launched at Belabai-Vasco

VASCO: Paver works worth Rs 20 lakh were inaugurated at Belabai on Thursday, marking a significant development milestone spearheaded by Mormugao Municipal Council (MMC) Chairperson Girish Borker.

Borker highlighted Belabai's lack of development for five decades and outlined future plans for internal roads at Mestawada and Orulem, as well as laying new sewage pipelines. "I am the first councillor to take up this work since MMC's inception. We are also launching the construction of a

Biker falls into Benaulim culvert left incomplete for nearly a year

The poor condition of the Khareband stretch has made it hazardous for vehicles, leading to injuries and frequent mishaps

MARGAO: The incomplete construction of a culvert in Benaulim for over a year has resulted in numerous accidents, with locals voicing concerns about the danger it poses to commuters. A food delivery agent suffered injuries after falling over the low barricade, and into the water, while navigating the poorly maintained stretch. Locals reported that they had raised

the issue with the South Goa Collector a year ago, highlighting the excessive height of the culvert and the need for urgent repairs. However, no steps have been taken to address the issue, leaving the road in a deteriorating state.

Residents also pointed to substandard construction, which they claim has made the area particularly prone to accidents. "Several vehicles have gone off the road, including a car that recently fell into a waterlogged section. The deteriorating road condition forces motorists to swerve into the opposite lane to avoid potholes, increasing the risk of collisions," said social activist from Benaulim, Santan Pereira.

To mitigate accidents, locals have taken the initiative to place barrels on the road as a warning for drivers. However, they emphasise that this is a temporary measure and urged the authorities to take immediate action to repair the road and ensure commuter safety.

"The road has become extremely dangerous, and despite repeated complaints, nothing has been done to improve the condition. We appealed to the authorities a year ago, but no action has been taken,"

added Pereira. On Wednesday, a meeting was held to address safety risks on the Mercado stretch
