### UAE announces reopening of embassy in Beirut

DUBAI: The United Arab Emirates announced on Friday that it reopened its embassy in Lebanon, state media reported, years after it was shut down in solidarity with Saudi Arabia. The Emirati embassy in Beirut "has officially resumed diplomatic activities", state news agency WAM said. "The reopening of the embassy represents an important step in advancing bilateral cooperation between the two countries," WAM cited foreign ministry undersecretary Omar Obaid al-Shamsi as saying. The UAE, alongside several other Gulf states, recalled its diplomats from Lebanon in October 2021 in "solidarity" with Riyadh over a Lebanese minister's criticism of the Saudi-led military intervention in Yemen. Relations between the UAE and Lebanon had deteriorated for years over the influence of the Iran-backed Hezbollah group in Lebanon.

### France holds seven after crypto boss kidnapping

PARIS: France is holding six men and a woman following the kidnapping and torture of the co-founder of a global cryptocurrency company and his partner, prosecutors said Saturday. The seven, who could face long prison terms up to life, are among 10 people taken into custody late Thursday as anti-gang investigators probe the case. David Balland, a 36-year-old co-founder and former employee of Ledger - a world leader in security systems for crypto and digital assets - and his partner were taken from his home in Mereau in the Loire region early Tuesday, Paris prosecutor Laure Beccuau told reporters Friday. Another Ledger co-founder, Eric Larcheveque, alerted police to the kidnapping after receiving a video showing a mutilated finger belonging to Balland, and a ransom demand, according to a source close to the case.

### South African peacekeepers killed as fighting rages in DRC

GOMA: Three South African peacekeepers have been killed in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, where fighting intensified on Saturday between the Congolese army and Rwandan-backed M23 fighters, a political party said. Fighting raged in the region despite calls from the international community for the M23 to halt its advance on Goma, the key city in the east and home to over a million people. After the failure of Angolan-led peace talks, the M23 and the Rwandan army have advanced in recent weeks towards Goma, the capital of the North Kivu province in DR Congo's perennially restive and mineral-rich east. An AFP reporter saw a burned-out, smoking armoured vehicle of the UN peacekeeping force MONUSCO on the road between Goma and Sake, scene of intense fighting in recent days.

### Iran arrests 13 Bahais for promoting their 'misguided sect'

TEHRAN: Iranian authorities arrested 13 followers of the Bahai faith in the central province of Isfahan, accusing them of proselytising for their "misguided sect", the Revolutionary Guards said on Saturday. The Bahais, Iran's largest non-Muslim minority, are branded "heretics" by the Islamic republic and are often targeted over their alleged ties to Israel, home to their most important shrines and world headquarters. "These individuals, who were illegally and indirectly promoting their religious deviation, were arrested by intelligence agents," the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) said in a statement carried by Iranian state news agency IRNA. "These active missionaries were systematically creating ideological deviations and attracting Muslims to the misguided Bahai sect on the internet or through classes for children and adolescents, using artistic methods such as music, painting, etc," it added.

### US migrant deportation flights arrive in Latin America

GUATEMALA CITY: US military planes carrying dozens of expelled migrants arrived in Guatemala, authorities said Friday, as President Donald Trump moved to crack down on illegal immigration. A total of 265 Guatemalans arrived on three flights - two operated by the military, and one a charter, the Central American country's migration institute said, updating earlier figures. Washington also sent four deportation flights to Mexico on Thursday, the White House press secretary said on X, despite multiple US media reports that authorities there had turned at least one plane back. The Mexican government has not confirmed either the arrival of flights or any agreement to receive a specific number of planes with deportees.

# Israel releases 200 Palestinian prisoners after Hamas frees four female soldiers

PTI, TEL AVIV: Four female Israeli soldiers who were taken in the attack that sparked the war in Gaza returned to Israel on Saturday after Hamas militants paraded them before a crowd of thousands in Gaza City and handed them over to the Red Cross. Israel later released 200 Palestinian prisoners in the second exchange of a fragile ceasefire. The four Israelis smiled, waved and gave the thumbs-up from a stage in Palestine Square, with armed, masked militants on either side as Hamas again sought to show it remained in control in Gaza after 15 months of war. The hostages likely acted under duress. Previously released ones said they were held in brutal conditions and forced to record propaganda videos.

Israel's Prison Service later said it had released of 200 Palestinians, including 121 people serving life sentences after being convicted of deadly attacks against Israelis, while others were held without charge. Thousands of Palestinians in the Israeli-occupied West Bank city of Ramallah celebrated their arrival. Some of those released wore Hamas

headbands given to them by the crowd. Wan-looking and wearing gray prison sweat-suits, some rode on supporters' shoulders.

In the deal's first major crisis, Israel said it would not allow displaced Palestinians to begin returning to northern Gaza as had been expected by Sunday, because a civilian hostage who was supposed to be released, Arbel Yehoud, had not been freed. As mediators addressed that, hundreds of Palestinians gathered, waiting to move north.

Why are they treating us like this?" asked one man, Khalil Abd.

Israeli forces and shot and killed a Palestinian man close to the Netzarim corridor where people were waiting, Palestinian medical officials said. Israel's military didn't immediately comment.

Israel insists on release of civilian hostage Arbel Yehoud Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office said Israel would not allow Palestinians to begin returning to northern Gaza until Yehoud, a civilian taken from a kibbutz, was freed.

Hamas said it held Israel responsible for any delay in implementing the agreement and its repercussions.

A senior Hamas official said the group informed mediators that Yehoud will be released next week. An Egyptian official involved in the negotiations called the matter a minor issue "that mediators were working to resolve. Both officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorised to discuss the matter publicly.

The ceasefire began last weekend and is aimed at winding down the deadliest and most destructive war ever fought between Israel and Hamas. The deal has so far held, quieting airstrikes and rockets and allowing for increased aid to flow into tiny, devastated Gaza.

When the ceasefire started Sunday, three hostages were released in exchange for 90 Palestinian prisoners, all women and children.

Among the 200 Palestinian prisoners released were Mohammad Odeh, 52, and Wael Qassim, 54, who were accused of carrying out deadly Hamas attacks against Israelis, including a bombing at a cafeteria at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem in 2002 that killed nine people, including five US citizens.

## Drone attack on hospital kills 67 in Sudan's Darfur

AFP, PORT SUDAN: A drone attack on one of the last functioning hospitals in El-Fasher in Sudan's Darfur region has killed 67 people and injured dozens, local activists and a medical source said Saturday, updating an earlier toll. "Thirty-seven of those injured in the drone strike yesterday died today, bringing the number of victims up to 67," the source told AFP, requesting anonymity for fear of retaliation.

He added that a number of those injured were still being treated, but could not give an exact figure.

The bombing of the Saudi Hospital late Friday had "led to the destruction" of the hospital's emergency building, the source said.

AFP could not independently verify which of Sudan's warring sides had launched the attack. Since April 2023, the Sudanese army has been at war with the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF), who have seized nearly the entire vast western region of Darfur.

Since May they have besieged El-Fasher, the state capital of North Darfur, but have not managed to claim the city where army-aligned militias have repeatedly pushed them back.

Last week, the RSF issued an ultimatum demanding army forces and allies leave the city by Wednesday afternoon in advance of an expected offensive.

Local activists have re-

ported intermittent fighting since, including repeated artillery fire from the RSF on the famine-hit Abu Shouk displacement camp.

On Friday morning alone,

heavy shelling killed eight people in the camp, according to civil society group the Darfur General Coordination of Camps for the Displaced and Refugees.

## US arrests 538 illegal immigrant criminals

PTI, WASHINGTON: The US has arrested 538 illegal immigrant criminals, including a suspected terrorist, and several illegals convicted of sex crimes against minors, the White House has said.

In a series of posts on X on Thursday, White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt said the Trump administration also deported hundreds of illegal immigrant criminals via military aircraft.

"The largest massive deportation operation in history is well underway. Promises made. Promises kept," she said.

Leavitt said, "The Trump Administration arrested 538 illegal immigrant criminals including a suspected terrorist, four members of the Tren de Aragua gang, and several illegals convicted of sex crimes against minors."
