River Sal stinks of government apathy, rues HC petitioner Says contamination of tributaries and fields is testing farmers' patience; pins hopes on High Court

MARGAO: As the High Court hearing approaches on Tuesday regarding the ongoing Public Interest Litigation (PIL) concerning the discharge of sewage and waste into Margao's storm water drains, which ultimately pollutes the River Sal and nearby bodies like Salpem Lake in Navelim, petitioner Professor Antonio Alvares continues to emphasize that much more needs to be done to resolve the issue permanently.

Despite the Goa State Pollution Control Board (GSPCB) sealing several establishments in Margao, Alvares points out that significant challenges remain.

"The water flowing into the nullah remains as polluted as on the other hand, is connectever. It's testing the patience of the farmers. The Municipal Council has shown little urgency in addressing this problem. Neither the State Government, Water Resourc- ties seem indifferent as long es Department (WRD), Public as the sewage continues to

PORTS MIN DENIES PLANS FOR JETTIES ON RIVER SAL

MARGAO: Amid growing concerns over proposed jetties on the Sal **River, Ports Minister Alexio Sequeira** categorically denied any government plans for such projects. He stated that there was no proposal with the government to construct even a single jetty on the Sal, dismissing allegations raised by Congress functionaries. Sequeira questioned how Congress had arrived at the conclusion that jetties were being planned for the river.

The minister's remarks came after the Benaulim Congress block committee submitted a petition to South Goa MP Viriato Fernandes, voicing concerns over alleged plans to construct three additional jetties on the river. Congress cited announcements made by the Inland Waterways Development Council (IWDC), which listed waterway projects across India, including river Sal.

Local fishing communities from

Benaulim, Navelim, and Velim have raised alarms about the potential environmental fallout of such developments, particularly fears of coal transportation through the proposed jetties. The petition highlighted the importance of river Sal for traditional fishing activities, with major fish unloading centres at Cutbona and Mobor.

South Goa District Congress President Savio D'Silva has announced plans to escalate the matter at gram sabhas of riverside panchavats. He pointed out the river's existing pollution issues, including high E. coli levels due to sewage discharge, and argued that additional industrial activity could further threaten the fragile ecosystem and local livelihoods. Despite Sequeira's denial, Con-

gress has insisted on transparency regarding the IWDC's announced plans and their potential implications for the river.

MARGAO: Benaulim Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) MLA Capt Venzy Viegas has tabled three Private Members' Resolutions for the upcoming Goa Legislative Assembly session. MAPUSA: A Russian national undertrial, Sergei Rozanov, has been booked for trying to smuggle narcotic drugs in Colvale State Central jail. Shankar B Gaonkar, Superintendent of Jail, Colvale, lodged a complaint with the Colvale Police Station stating that the incident took place on January 21 at around 3.45 pm.

According to the complaint, the alleged accused was taken out for a court hearing at Mapusa and after the hearing he was brought back. While entering the prison, he was frisked by the Indian Reserve Battalion (IRBn) when he was allegedly found in the possession of 94 grams of charas worth approximately Rs 94,000. He had concealed the drugs in sandals.

GIDC to tighten safety measures across **Verna Industrial Estate**

MARGAO: The recent fire at the Verna Industrial Estate, which destroyed around 40 cars, has spurred the Goa Industrial Development Corporation (GIDC) to tighten safety measures across the estate while also issuing closure notice to the unit in question. GIDC Chairman Aleixo Reginaldo Lourenco has directed all industries in the area to conduct a thorough review of safety protocols and ensure compliance to prevent similar incidents. He stressed the need to maintain clear surroundings and address fire hazards promptly, warning of strict action against defaulters. Following the blaze,



GIDC took immediate action against the automobile service centre found in violation of safety regulations. Acting on a report that was submitted by its estate wing, GIDC revoked the service centre's occupancy certificate and ordered its operations to cease. The estate wing's re-

port revealed that vehicles awaiting servicing were parked in open spaces, disregarding prior directives from the Corporation. This negligence was identified as a major factor in the fire's rapid spread. GIDC Managing Director Pravimal Abhishek confirmed, "We have issued show cause notices to the retail-

ers for ignoring our earlier orders to remove the illegally parked vehicles. They have seven days to respond, after which further action

will be initiated." Abhishek emphasized

that the operators' failure to comply with previous notices had serious consequences. "The occupancy certificate was revoked immediately after reviewing the report. The facility has since shut down operations, and the operators have complied," he stated.

The fire, which began in dry grass before spreading to parked vehicles, has highlighted the risks of unattended hazards. Lourenco disclosed that many of the affected vehicles had been left abandoned for two to three years, despite earlier notices to the company responsible. "We have taken action against them for their non-compliance," he said.
