## **NAVELIM RESIDENT DUPED IN** WHATSAPP FRAUD CASE

MARGAO: Subhash Anvekar, a resident of Colmorod-Navelim, has lodged a formal complaint with the Margao police, alleging that an unidentified individual impersonated his friend, Sao Tomme Collaso, via WhatsApp. The impersonator deceitfully convinced Anvekar to transfer Rs 1,00,027 to various bank accounts under the pretext of an emergency. This incident constitutes cheating through the use of a communication device. The Margao police have registered an offence under Sections 318(4) and 319(2) of the BNS 2023 Act and Section 66-D of the Information Technology Act, 2000. An investigation into the matter is currently ongoing.

## **KARNATAKA DUO HELD FOR ILLEGALLY TRANSPORTING PIGS**

PANJIM: The Valpoi Police have arrested Jeevan Shipri from Belagavi and Sagar Jadhav from Dharwad for alleged cruelty to animals. According to police, the accused were allegedly found transporting 53 pigs without any proper documents and by confining them in the carriers of the vehicles in unhygienic condition, thus subjecting them to cruelty. Two Karnataka registered vehicles used by them to transport the vehicles have been seized, police said. An FIR has been registered and the case is being investigated by ASI Laxman Parab of Valpoi Police Station.

## **DECOMPOSED BODY OF ELDERLY** MAN DISCOVERED IN MARGAO

MARGAO: The Fatorda police have discovered the decomposed body of an 85-year-old man at a flat within the Housing Society building in Madel, Margao. Acting on a call from the Panaji Police Control Room (PCR), authorities were informed of the senior citizen who had been unresponsive for three days, with the door to his residence locked from the inside and a foul odour emanating from the flat. Upon arrival, police summoned the Fire and Emergency Services to forcibly open the door. The decomposed body of the deceased, identified as Anthony Fernandes, was found lying on the floor. A scene panchanama was conducted, and the body was sent for a post-mortem examination at the South Goa District Hospital, Margao. Due to the advanced stage of decomposition, the cause of death could not be determined immediately; however, viscera samples have been preserved for chemical analysis. Further investigations are underway.

## SANGUEM RESIDENT DEFRAUDED **BY FAKE POLICE OFFICERS**

MARGAO: Shankar Gaonkar, a resident of Bhati, Sanguem, has filed a complaint with the Sanguem police, reporting that unidentified individuals, using multiple mobile number , contacted him via WhatsApp while impersonating officers from the Mumbai Crime Branch. The fraudsters verified the last four digits of his Aadhar card and deceitfully instilled fear in him by alleging his involvement in money laundering cases, threatening imprisonment.

Subsequently, they dishonestly induced him to transfer Rs 90,000 to a fraudulent bank account. Meanwhile Maria Santana Dias of Benaulim has lodged a complaint with the Colva police, stating that between October 28, 2024 and November 6, 2024, an individual named Vikas Prasad impersonated a police inspector from the Delhi Crime Branch during a video call. The impersonator falsely accused her of being implicated in drug peddling, threatening her with dire consequences if she did not comply with his demands. Under this pretext, the fraudster dishonestly induced Ms Dias to transfer Rs 4.41.706 to a bank account. The Colva police have registered an offence under Sections 318(4), 319(2), and 351(2) of the BNS 2023 Act, as well as Section 66-D of the Information Technology Act, 2000 and 2008.

# **TEACHERS REJECT PROPOSAL TO START ACADEMIC YEAR IN APRIL**

Cite summer heat, insufficient time as major hurdle; Association warns stress, fatigue will have adverse impact on students and teachers

PANJIM: The All Goa Secondary School Teachers' Association (AGSSTA) has strongly opposed the proposed changes to the academic calendar, which include starting the academic year in April instead of June and extending school hours to 39 hours per week. The association has warned that these changes will negatively impact students, teachers, and the overall education system in Goa.

Speaking on the issue, AGSSTA President Savio Suraj Victoria said, "Commencing the academic year in April instead of June presents numerous challenges. April is one of the hottest months in Goa, and high temperatures combined with humidity create extremely uncomfortable and unhealthy conditions for both students and teachers. Most schools lack proper cooling facilities, which increases the risk of dehydration, heat exhaustion,

"Teachers need time to correct examination papers, including Goa Board exams for which many of them are deputed. Additionally, this change would disrupt the

finalisation of results, preparation of time-tables, annual plans, and lesson schedules for the new academic year," he said.

PANJIM: The Director of Panchayats has instructed all Block Development Officers (BDOs) to streamline the process of issuing permissions by village panchayats for beach weddings and other events.

In a circular, Director of Panchayats Siddhi Halarnakar stated that village panchayats should levy a uniform fee of Rs 25,000 for granting No Obiection Certificates (NOCs) or permissions for events held in hotels, party areas, or lawns within their jurisdiction. "This step has been taken to streamline the process and ensure uniformity in the fees collected by village panchayats for permitting events and weddings held at resorts," the circular explained.

The Director highlighted that while the village panchayats in Goa operate under the Goa Panchayat Raj

Act, 1994, and the rules formulated under it, the Act does not explicitly address the authority of panchayats to collect fees or charges for events taking place within registered business premises such as hotels, party venues, or open lawns.

"It has been observed that applicants, including event management companies, face challenges in obtaining permissions or NOCs for events held in hotels, including beach weddings, where other connected departments or authorities are already issuing permissions for the same." Halarnakar noted.

To address this issue, the Director has instructed all BDOs to ensure that village panchayats under their jurisdiction collect a uniform, one-time fee of Rs 25,000 per event. The collected fees are to be utilised specifically for waste management activities.

MARGAO: Goa's urban planning practices have come under severe criticism from activists who are demanding an immediate implementation of a Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP) to address the state's growing land use challenges.

The concerns were raised during a public talk organized by Goyche Fudle Pillge Khatir (GFPK), where certified Architect and Urban Planner Tahir Noronha highlighted the critical gaps in the current planning framework. "Goa's unique character

is being eroded by haphazard development. The absence of a comprehensive and participatory planning process threatens the very essence of our state," said GFPK President Jack Mascarenhas, calling for urgent government action. He emphasized that in the face of climate change and increasing pressure on Goa's environment, a robust

and transparent planning framework is more crucial than ever. The current system's reliance on repeatedly extended Outline Development Plans (ODPs) without proper justification or comprehensive studies has

raised serious concerns among urban planning exapproach.

GFPK has outlined several comprehensive demands for immediate action. First and foremost, they are calling for an immediate halt to the practice of indefinite ODP extensions, which they argue has contributed to unplanned development patterns across the state.

Additionally, the or-ganization is demanding that the government commission comprehensive studies to inform the development of a CDP. These studies would need to include detailed environmental impact assessand incorporate ments

a holistic regional planning meaningful public consultation at every stage of the

planning process. A key aspect of GF-PK's demands focuses on strengthening local governance structures. The organisation emphasizes that effective land use planning necessitates strong participation from panchayats and district-level authorities, who need to be empowered with both the authority and resources to implement and enforce planning regulations effectively.

The activists have also highlighted the importance of public participation in the planning process. They

argue that local communities must have a say in development decisions that affect their neighbourhoods and livelihoods. calling for increased transparency in all planning processes.

Looking toward the future, GFPK stressed that responsible and sustainable development is crucial for preserving Goa's unique heritage. The organization has called upon not just the government but all stakeholders to prioritize a comprehensive and participatory planning approach to safeguard Goa's heritage and ensure a sustainable future for all its residents.

## CONFERENCE HELD AT MIRAMAR



PANJIM: A recent international conference on Pathology, Histopathology, and Cytopathology was held in Miramar, attracting 200 delegates from across India (representing 23 states) and overseas, including the USA, Canada, France, Australia, and New Zealand.
