REDISCOVERING TREASURES OF PAST GOA



Exploring the heritage of MB house

Don Bosco College's Department of Business Administration (Travel & Tourism) in collaboration with Ecotiva and the Heritage Club organized an enriching field trip 'Discovering the Treasures of the Past'. The trip was also a part of commemorating National Tourism Day keeping in mind this year's theme, 'Tourism and sustainable transformation'

and aimed to offer students a deeper understanding of the historical and cultural heritage of South Goa.

The field trip began with a visit to the Menezes Braganza Pereira House, one of the oldest and most historic homes in Goa. The mansion is an excellent example of Indo-Portuguese architecture and speaks volumes about

Goa's colonial past. A guided tour of the property was led by experts who shared stories about the house's history, the legacy of the Menezes Braganza Pereira family, and its significance in Goa's cultural landscape. Students appreciated the preservation efforts and the architectural beauty of the house.

The second venue of the trip was the Rachol Seminary, an important educational and religious institution in Goa. The seminary was established in the 16th century. Justice MS Karnik delivers lecture on 75 years of the Indian Constitution

VM Salgaocar College of Law, Miramar, concluded its month long celebration on '75 years of the Constitution of India' with a special lecture on 'Role of Judiciary in a Democracy' by Justice Makarand Subhash Karnik, Judge, High Court of Bombay at Goa. The programme was sponsored by Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa.

Justice Karnik traced the evolution of justice from ancient times under kings to the modern constitutional framework. He highlighted the constitution framers' vision of fairness, equity, and human dignity as cornerstones of India's democracy. He also discussed the judiciary's



proactive role in bridging legislative gaps, citing the landmark Vishakha judgment, where the Supreme Court laid down workplace sexual harassment guidelines. He reflected on Article 14 of the Constitution, lauding its expansive interpretation by the judiciary to uphold

equality in various circumstances. Addressing young advocates and law students, Justice Karnik offered practical advice, urging them to first focus on the core issue of a case, then try to understand the litigant's perspective. Justice Karnik also

mentioned the significance of observing the silences in the Constitution of India. The book 'One Nation, One Law: Unification of Family Laws', published in memory of the late Prof Dr Carmo D'Souza was released. The book, presented by Dr Mrunmayi Vaidya, contributes significantly to the ongoing discourse on legal reforms.

Ld Sr Adv Suresh Lotlikar, Adv Santosh Bharme, and family members of the late Prof Dr Carmo D'Souza were present for the lecture. Dr Shaber Ali G, Principal delivered the welcome address, the programme was coordinated by Dr Sandhya Ram and Dr Aamod Shirali. Bhumika Kamat Redkar compered the programme.
