RUSSIAN NATIONAL ARRESTED FOR OVERSTAYING

MARGAO: A Russian national, Andrei Tsaune, has been arrested in Goa for staying in India without a valid passport and visa, violating the Foreigner Order 1948 and the Foreigners Act 1946. Canacona Police registered an of-fence under Section 7(1) and 7(3)(iii) of the Foreigner Order 1948, punishable under Section 14 of the Foreigners Act 1946, following a complaint by PSI Rajasekhar Reddy of Canacona Police Station. Police stated that Tsaune had been residing in Patnem-Canacona, since March 28, 2020, without the necessary travel documents. He was arrested and remanded to judicial custody for five days.

LABOURER DIES AFTER FALLING **ON RAILWAY TRACK**

MARGAO: A labourer, Rasidal Miya, succumbed to injuries after falling onto the Caranzol railway track while at work. Vasco Railway Police received information from the Deputy Station Manager, Vasco Railway Station (SWR), about the incident between Caranzol and Castle Rock railway stations. Miya was transported by train for medical treatment but was declared dead on arrival at the government hospital, Ramnagar. An email from PSI, Ramnagar, confirmed that the accident occurred on February 6, at around 11.30 am.

ILLEGAL HILL CUTTING REPORTED IN CANACONA

MARGAO: Canacona Police have registered a case against Ashok Prabhu Dessai of Margao for allegedly carrying out illegal hill cutting in Cola village, Canacona. Following a written complaint by Rohan Bandari from the Town and Country Planning Department, police registered the offence under Section 17A of the TCP Act 1974. The incident took place on December 17, 2024, at a prop-erty bearing Survey No 132/9, where approximately 30 metres x 10 metres of land was excavated to a height of 1.5 metres for personal gain.

ODISHA NATIVE ARRESTED BY OLD GOA POLICE FOR POSSESSING GANJA

PANJIM: Old Goa Police have arrested Sahab Sahoo (28), a native of Odisha, for allegedly possessing ganja worth Rs 12,000. According to police, the accused, who cur-rently resides in Dhulapi-Corlim, was caught red-handed with 115 grams of ganja during a raid conducted near the forest watchtower at Carambolim-Tiswadi. The raid took place on January 6, based on reliable information received by the police. An FIR has been registered in the case, and further investigation is underway, officials confirmed.

ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES DAMAGED IN TRANSFORMER SHORT CIRCUIT

PONDA: A short circuit in a transformer at Parampai, Marcaim, caused damage to electrical appliances in several houses early this morning. Local Panch member Vinod Naik reported that a sudden voltage surge damaged electrical and electronic goods, including bulbs, mobile phones, televisions, and washing machines, in homes across Parampai-Madkai. The electricity department later replaced the faulty transformer.

OLIVE RIDLEY TURTLE LAYS 126 EGGS ON CALANGUTE BEACH

CALANGUTE: The Tour-ist Police Unit (TPU) discovered an Olive Ridley turtle laying eggs on Calangute Beach during a night patrol. This marks the second instance of turtle nesting on the beach this season. The turtle laid 126



eggs before returning to the sea. Upon being informed, the Forest Department arrived at the site and relocated the eggs to the turtle nesting facility in Morjim for hatching.

Gold prices at their peak, most jewellery stores in Goa running low on walk-ins

State industry leaders witnessing transformation driven by global economic uncertainties; say consumers waiting for gold to stabilise or decrease

MARGAO: The gold market in India is experiencing unprecedented volatility, with prices reaching record-breaking levels, reshaping consumer behaviour and challenging local jewellers. In Goa, industry leaders are witnessing a significant transformation driven by global economic uncertainties.

Providing critical insights into the current market dynamics, Pramit Raikar, President of the Goa Gold Dealers Association (GGDA), said, "Gold prices hit an all-time high on Friday, February 7 amid global uncertainties and strong investor demand. In India, gold breached 85,000 per 10 gms mark for the first time, gaining almost 1,200 per gram in a single day. Globally, gold touched an all-time high of \$2,855 per ounce."

Elaborating on the complex factors driving this surge, he said, "Trade war tensions between US and China-with the latter imposing tariffs on the former's imports in retaliation for US duties on Chinese goodshave prompted investors to turn to gold as a safe-haven asset. A weak US dollar has made gold more attractive

Expressing hope that recent budget provisions might provide relief, Raikar remained cautiously optimistic, saying: "Reduction in personal income tax rates along with tax exemption limit raised to Rs 12 lakh in the recently concluded budget will significantly boost consumer spending and drive demand for jewellery."

The broader market trends support these local observations. Recent data shows 24K gold in Mumbai and other metro cities surged by Rs 270 to Rs 86,510 per 10 grams. Internationally, spot gold rose 0.48% to \$2,867 an ounce, reflecting continued global economic uncertainties. Analysts predict the gold prices will remain strong, influenced by ongoing geopolitical tensions, central bank policies, and global economic conditions.

The current landscape suggests a complex interplay of global economic factors, investor sentiment, and local market dynamics, with gold emerging as a critical asset in uncertain times.

Calangute police crack down on public drinking, 21 booked

curb public drinking, Calangute police have registered 21 cases against individuals caught consuming alcohol in public places since January 1, collecting a total of Rs 42,000 in fines from the accused.

A police spokesperson stated, "This drive has been initiated to tackle the nuisance of public drinking. Individuals found drinking in public spaces will be booked. The move follows multiple incidents where tourists have carelessly discarded alcohol bottles on beaches, leading to injuries from broken glass and even cases of drowning due to intoxication. Sahitya Akademi must honour tiatr legacy in Roman script: GKF

MARGAO: Reacting to Chief Minister Pramod Sawant's recent appeal to the Sahitya Akademi, New Delhi, to consider tiatr script books for national literary awards, the Global Konknni Forum (GKF) has criticised his failure to specify that the request should include books written in the Konkani Roman script.

The GKF emphasised that tiatr literature has been written in the Roman script since 1892 and urged the Sawant government to push for its inclusion in the Sahitya Akademi's recognition process.

According to Jose Salvador Fernandes, Secretary of GKF, the Sahitya Akademi's General Council recognized Konkani as an independent literary language on February 26, 1975. The resolution stated, "As Konkani fulfills the criteria formulated by the Akademi for recognition of a language, it is recognized as an independent modern literary language of India." However, the resolution did not specify any script for Konkani, allowing contributions from all scripts, Fernandes explained.

He further pointed out that in 1981, the Sahitya Akademi's Konkani Advisory Board, dominated by Devnagari supporters, passed a decision recognizing Devnagari as the sole official script for Konkani. This, he argued, has marginalized Konkani literature in other scripts. Fernandes stressed that the Akademi, as a body promoting Indian languages and literature, should not engage in script-based politics, as a language is not inherently tied to a specific script.

Fernandes warned that the dominant Devnagari lobby might attempt to impose its script on tiatr literature as well, erasing the distinct identity of the Roman script. which has been the foundation of

tiatr writing for over 133 years. He expressed concerns that if tiatr books are considered for Sahitya Akademi recognition in the future, they might be required to be submitted in Devnagari, compromising the uniqueness of the Roman script.

GKF highlighted that tiatr performances, held regularly in Goa and internationally, play a crucial role in preserving Konkani language and culture. These performances also serve as a platform for discussing social and political issues affecting society.

In light of this, the Global Konknni Forum urged the Sawant government to take a firm stand and request the Sahitya Akademi to accept tiatr script books in Konkani Roman script—without merely appeasing the Roman script Konkani community, which has faced discrimination since the enactment of the Official Language Act of 1987.
