Ton-up Hit-Man roars back to form, India crush England to clinch ODI series

Rohit's knock saw him surpass (10,987) Rahul Dravid's 10,889 runs to enter top-10 ODI run-scorers' list, hosts grab three-match series 2-0

PTI, CUTTACK: Under pressure with questions over form and mounting retirement speculations, skipper Rohit Sharma silenced it all with a vintage 32nd century, firing India to a dominant four-wicket series-clinching victory over England in the second ODI, here, on Sunday.

Opting to bat on a belter, England were bowled out for 304 in 49.5 overs with left-arm spinner Ravindra Jadeja (3/35) continuing his stranglehold over the visitors.

The 37-year-old Indian skipper made the chase a lopsided affair, returning to his World Cup 2023 best with impeccable timing and effortless strokeplay en route to his 90-ball 119 -- his century No 32 in ODIs that came just in time ahead of the Champions Trophy in less than two weeks.

2ND ODI: INDIA VS ENGLAND

His 90-ball masterclass, studded with seven sixes and 12 fours, set the tone as India cruised to the target in 44.3 overs to take an unbeatable 2-0 lead going into the final ODI in Ahmedabad on Wednesday.

Shubman Gill also made a fluent 60 off 52 balls (9x4, 1x6) but it felt overshadowed in comparison to Rohit in their solid opening partnership of 136 runs -- their sixth century-plus stand together.

Back after missing out the Nagpur ODI because of a swollen knee, star batter Virat Kohli (5) fell cheaply edging a Adil Rashid legbreak. Rashid has now got Kohli four times in ODIs.

Rohit then had a fruitful 70-run stand with Shrevas Iyer (44) before he was dismissed off a full toss with Rashid taking a fine backward running catch.

Iyer soon departed following a runout, while KL Rahul (10) and Hardik Pandya (10) also fell cheaply.

PTI, CUTTACK: The scathing criticism from all quarters wasn't something that perturbed Rohit Sharma's Îndian teammates who knew that their skipper was just a knock away from getting back into his element, senior all-rounder Ravindra Jadeja said.

The innings came at the perfect time, just weeks before the Champions Trophy (CT), reaffirming his importance to the team.

The entire world may be behind him but in our dressing room, there was no such atmosphere. He is such a great player that he knows exactly how to build an innings," Jadeja said at the post-match media interaction. The all-rounder added that such phases are normal for great players.

"It's just a matter of one good inning. As you saw, it didn't even feel like he hadn't scored runs in the previous innings. The shots he played were smooth and he looked confident. Just played normal strokes."

Jadeja emphasised that there was never any panic within the squad despite external criticism.

"Sometimes, it just takes one or two innings to turn things around. The good thing is that, before an important tournament like the CT, scoring a hundred is a huge boost. It's great for the team, and obviously, he himself knows his game well. There's nothing much to think or discuss."

He brought up his three figures in 76 balls, spanking Rashid over long-off -- his first in 14 innings.

This was also his second fastest hundred. His fastest was a 63-ball hundred against Afghanistan in the 2023 World Cup.

ENJOYED SCORING RUNS, BROKE DOWN MY INNINGS IN PIECES WHILE BATTING: ROHIT

CUTTACK: Indian skipper Rohit Sharma said on Sunday that he "enjoyed" coring a hundred for the team, and attributed his century to him "breaking down" his batting approach here on Sunday.

Came into the second ODI against England with a string low-scores against his name, Rohit shushed his doubters with a masterly 90-ball 32nd ODI hundred, also containing 12 fours and seven sixes.

It helped India register a nine-wicket win, and grab the three-match series 2-0.

"It was good and really enjoyed being out there, scoring some runs for the team. It was an important game with the series on the line but I broke it down to pieces about how I wanted to bat," Rohit said during the presentation ceremony.

"(ODIs are) longer than T20s and shorter than Tests and I wanted to break it down. I wanted to bat as deep as possible and that was my focus." Rohit said he wanted place the ball precisely in the gaps as the England bowlers

were aiming at his body.

"Looking at the pitch - when you play on black soil, it tends to skid on a bit and you have to show the full face of the bat initially. "They bowled into the body and kept it on the stumps and that's where I prepared my plan and tried to access the gaps."

The Mumbaikar praised his opening partner Shubman Gill for assisting him to get the team off to a flier. "I got very good support from Gill and Shreyas (Iyer) as well. I enjoy batting with Gill. He is a very classy player and doesn't seem to get overawed by the situation and the numbers are there as well.

Credit to Rohit: Butter

England captain Jos Buttler praised his counterpart Rohit for crafting a superb hundred, and said they also needed a batter who could have pushed the team past the 350-run mark. "We needed someone to push on and get us to 350. Credit to Rohit, he batted superbly, he has been batting like this since a few years in ODI cricket," said Buttler.

Australia secures first Test series

win in Sri Lanka in 14 years

Karunaratne retires

PTI, DUBAI: The International Cricket Council on Sunday lavished praise on former Sri Lankan captain and prolific opener Dimuth Karunaratne, who brought the curtains down on his glittering international career along with his 100th Test against Australia in Galle.

Karunaratne scored 36 and 14 in his farewell Test as Australia won the match by nine wickets to make a clean sweep of the twogame series.

"Dimuth has had a very fine career during which he excelled as a batter in the most traditional format of the game, becoming only the seventh from his country to feature in 100 Tests," said ICC chairman Jay Shah.

Karunaratne, 36, scored 7222 runs in Tests at a healthy average of nearly 40, including a top score of 244. He also played 50 ODIs, scoring 1,316 runs.

He captained Sri Lanka in 30 Tests between 2019 and 2023, winning 12 and losing 12 while in charge.

The left-hander made his international debut against England in an ODI at Manchester in 2011. All his 16 Test tons came

as an opener, a record for most centuries by a Sri Lankan in that position that he holds jointly with former captain Marvan Atapattu.

But his most cherished feat came when he led Sri Lanka to a 2-0 Test series win over South Africa in 2019, and the Island nation became the first Asian side to win an away Test rubber against Proteas since their readmission to cricket.

England to fly in Banton as cover for injured Jacob Bethell CUTTACK: England on __

Sunday called up batter Tom Banton as a cover for injured all-rounder Jacob Bethell for third ODI against India at Ahmedabad. Bethell, who scored a half-century and took a wicket in England's four-wicket defeat in the first ODI at Nagpur, had sustained a left hamstring injury. "The



injury will be assessed further when the team arrives in Ahmedabad on Monday (for the third ODI on Wednesday)," said an England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) release on Sunday. The 26-year-old Banton, a wicketkeeper-batter has played six ODIs, scoring 134 runs with a highest of 58. "Banton, who last played for England in an ODI in August 2020, has been in outstanding form in T20 franchise cricket. He is currently the leading run-scorer in the UAE ILT20 competition, where he has amassed 493 runs from 11 innings at an average of 54.77, including two centuries," said the release. Baton will arrive in India on Monday.

Bosch replaces Nortie in South Africa's Champions Trophy squad JOHANNESBURG: South

Africa on Sunday named relatively newcomer Corbin Bosch as a replacement for injured fast bowler Anrich Nortje for the Champions Trophy later this month. Nortje was ruled out of the marquee ICC event with a recurring back injury last month. Bosch, 30, who made



his international debut in December last year, has played just one ODI, scoring an unbeaten 40 and taking a wicket with his right-arm pace bowling. "Along with Bosch, South Africa have also added fast bowler Kwena Maphaka in the squad as a travelling reserve. The two fast bowlers along with batter Tony de Zorzi will travel to Pakistan on Sunday to join the squad for the remainder of their ODI (tri-) series," the ICC said in a release. Last month, Cricket South Africa (CSA) had said Nortje would not be in line to recover for the Champions Trophy, commencing in Pakistan and Dubai on February 19. Nortje had also missed out on the 2023 Cricket World Cup in India due to a stress fracture in his back.

Gukesh goes down to Caruana in Freestyle Grand Slam HAMBURG (Germany): World

Champion D Gukesh suffered a rare setback in normal time control, losing to USA's Fabiano Caruana in the first game of the quarterfinals of the Freestyle Grand Slam chess tournament here. Gukesh was at the top of his game for a good part, improvising when it was necessary



but he failed to find a queen sacrifice in the latter stages of the middle game. It changed the course of the game for him. Caruana was quick to take charge of the situation and did not give a chance for the Indian to make a comeback. Meanwhile, Magnus Carlsen, the main protagonist behind the tour, scored a fine win over Nodirbek Abdusattorov of Uzbekistan. Alireza Firouzja of France lost to Vincent Keymer of Germany in the opener. In the other game of the quarters, Javokhir Sindarov of Uzbekistan played out a draw with Hikaru Nakamura while in the inconsequential 9th place decider. American Levon Aronian won his first game at the expense of Vladimir Fedoseev of Slovenia.

Shuttler Sindhu pulls out of BAMTC 2025 due to hamstring issues

NEW DELHI: Two-time Olympic medallist shuttler PV Sindhu has pulled out of the **Badminton Asia Mixed Team** Championships in China due to a hamstring issue, dealing a huge blow to the country's chances of improving the colour of their medal in the prestigious edition. The tournament is set to be played



in Qingdao from February 11-16 with the Indian shuttlers currently undergoing training at a camp in Guwahati. Besides Sindhu, the other leading players in the camp are Lakshya Sen, and HS Prannoy, along with the formidable doubles pair of Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty. Sindhu was a part of the squad that won bronze in the previous edition of the tournament. "It is with a heavy heart that I share I won't be travelling with the team for BAMTC 2025. While training on the 4th (February) in Guwahati, I felt a twinge in my hamstring. Despite my efforts to push through with heavy taping for our country, an MRI has revealed that my recovery will take slightly longer than I initially expected," said the 29-year-old Sindhu in a post on 'X'. India are placed in a tough Group D alongside runnersup South Korea and Macau. They will begin their campaign against Macau on February 12, which will be followed by a tough outing against South Korea on February 13.

Mary Kom, Saina & Leander named in **Govt Sports Experts Advisory panel**

NEW DELHI: The government has constituted a committee to be headed by Sports Minister Mansukh Mandaviya with three Olympic medallists as members to advice on identification and grooming of talent, ensure fair and transparent selection and monitor the performance of athletes competing at international events as well evaluate the coaches. The 17-member Sports Experts Advisory Committee will have celebrated boxer Mary Kom, tennis legend Leander Paes and trail-blazer shuttler Saina Nehwal, who all have won Olympic medals, as members. Union Minister of State for Sports Raksha Khadse will be the vice chairperson and sports secretary/joint secretary will be the convenor. The committee is made up of government delegates and retired eminent athletes from various sports, according to a Sports Ministry circular issued on Saturday. The committee's objectives include talent identification and advising for development of sub-junior and junior level athletes for training, oversee selection of national athletes/teams to ensure fair and transparent selection, observe the coaching facilities during national camps, observe and provide analysis on performance of India/foreign coaches attached to the national teams and progress of the performance of the national campers.

AP, GALLE (Sri Lanka): Australia wrapped up a comprehensive 2-0 series victory over Sri Lanka, sealing the second test with a commanding nine-wicket win in Galle on Sunday.

International Cricket Stadium in Galle

Top order batter Marnus Labuschagne flicked a delivery from retiring Sri Lankan player Dimuth Karunaratne to mid-wicket to complete the triumph, just 15 minutes before lunch on the fourth day.

It's Australia's first test series win on Sri Lankan soil since 2011.

Their last success here came under Ricky Ponting's captaincy, a 1-0 victory in 2011. However, they suffered a 3-0 whitewash in 2016 under Steve Smith's leadership, and the 2022 series ended in a 1-1 draw.
