RHYTHMS FOR PEACE: Sur Jahan brings world musicians to Goa

Sur Jahan, the two-day festival brought together musicians from Sweden, Iceland, Netherlands, Rajasthan and Goa making Goa a centre of folk music

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The annual World Peace Music Festival, Sur Jahan was held at the Kala Academy over the weekend. It was a celebration of musical styles from Iceland, Sweden, Netherlands and India. The audience was exposed to sacred and medieval tunes from Europe, the magic of the ghumat and the magical voice of Habib Khan, the talented artist of Langa music from Rajasthan.

The Goa Ghumat Project lead by Carlos Gonsalves was a performance that featured different indigenous instruments like the dhol, tasha, shamel, kasale, a western drum set, acoustic guitar and Goan traditional folk vocals. The fans in the audience kept applauding the interesting use of Goa's traditional percussion. He got the audience involved with a rhythm of claps to the percussive magic of the ghumat. It was a short set but it got the audience perked up for the magic that was to follow in the festival.

A traditional folk band from the Netherlands, with all four members being over 70 years old, Folkcorn it was their first visit to India. Their sense of humor and the interplay between the band members made it a delight. The fact that they sang in Old Dutch did not make it a barrier. The songs were about everyday life in the village, its complications and the challenges that arise when one falls in love. The band improvised and it was a very interesting experience. Jitze Kopinga who was the singer and who did most of the talking had the

Habib Khan Langa and team were the revelation of the first day. His strong voice filled the auditorium.

He sang songs about life cycle, seasons, festivals and folklore. This is the only folk music to follow ragas that is also dependent on the time they are performing, the direction they are facing at that point in time, the season they are performing in,

and finally the event they are performing for. It was a set that had the audience clapping at times and as Habib's voice washed over the audience there was a sense of awe at the magic he was able to create. He ended his set with the song that was once featured in a Bollywood hit, 'Mast Kalandar'.

The all-female band from Iceland, Umbra Ensemble, coming from the coldest part of the world, their songs comprise not just folk songs but also original arrangements of medieval tunes but also contemporary songs composed by band members. They also sang songs about Vikings and of love lost. It was an interesting set by the first ever Icelandic group to ever come to India. The sounds were certainly new to Indian ears and it made for an interesting set.

The final set of the festival was by the big daddy of Nordic music, Ale Muller. He may be touching 70 but the verve of the man was certainly a sight to behold. His set contained a number that was a waltz and a blues inspired folk song to name just a few. His interaction with band members had a definite light touch which kept everything moving smoothly. Ale dedicated a song to his three and half year old granddaughter living in Stockholm. It was a set that had influences from Greece and Turkey which signified his interaction with people living in Stockholm.

The final performance of the event involved Habib Khan, Ale Muller, Folkcorn and Umbra ensemble. It was a jugabandi of various styles that started off in the cold of Nordic Europe and came through Rajasthan. It was a composition that aptly described the beauty in this world and to appreciate it there had to be peace and harmony.

Vicky Kaushal calls Chhaava 'toughest' role



The Life of St Francis Xavier through the lens of philately

'Saint Francis Xavier his life journey through stamps, prayer cards and lithographs', a book meticulously put together focuses on the life of Saint Francis Xavier, with a separate section at the end covering a wide range of first-class relics spread around the world

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The book 'Saint Francis Xavier his life journey through stamps, prayer cards and lithographs', is authored by João Paulo Cota, who was born in Angola to parents of Goan descent and relocated to Goa at the age of 14. After graduating from the Goa Engineering College with first-class honors in Civil Engineering, he subsequently moved to London. A lifetime member of the Goa Philatelic and Numismatic Society, João Paulo holds membership in the Royal Philatelic Society London, in addition to contributing to various other similar organizations.

"I collect everything and anything related to Portuguese India, pre 1961 period, be it stamps, coins, banknotes, postcards, photos, prayer cards, lithographs, militaria, books, etc. Over time, I have realized that holding these collectables on my hands were equivalent to me touching history that span

many centuries ago. I did write a philatelic article in 2012 relating to Portuguese India postal history and that won me the George Pearson literature award in Portugal for best article in Portuguese related philatelic research," says João, who has a particular interest in religious artifacts associated with St Francis Xavier. He has received multiple medals at both national (UK) and international philatelic exhibitions, consistently showcasing materials from Portuguese India.

During the previous St Francis Xavier exposition in

2014, João began to gather philatelic items, accumulating a significant collection of First Day Covers from the 1952 exposition to serve as part of a commemorative souvenir. However, the concept soon evolved into the creation of a historical work detailing the life of the saint, wherein certain books would include an original philatelic item for readers to touch and appreciate the history of philately. João consulted the master of all works related to the saint - the monumental work of Otto Schurhammer, the Jesuit priest, who had spent 60 years researching the life

of St Francis Xavier and had real proof of what he wrote.

João had help from people overseas located in countries where the St Francis Xavier had been. They were helpful in getting him good information and photographs when needed, also picking up prayer cards from their countries. The stamps, prayer cards and lithographs, were all carefully chosen. The central theme of the book is to immerse the reader in the 1500s, a time when St Francis Xavier roamed the Earth. The lithographs illustrating the cities he traversed across the seas provide a visual representation of the landscapes he would have witnessed firsthand, as these prints originate from that era, with some dating back over 400 years. The narrative chronicles the life of St
