From 24x7 to 4 hours, CM's faltering pledge on water

What will the proposed drinking water department do, if Goa's water resources are insufficient to start with?

PANJIM: A lot of water may have flown down Goa's rivers in the past six years and the State may have received back-to-back years of surplus rain in 2023 and 2024, but myopic planning and rampant over development have ensured that the people of the State are consistently denied sufficient water supply to their homes.

Such has been the struggle that Chief Minister Pramod Sawant, who loftily claimed in 2019 that every home in Goa would get 24x7 water supply by 2025 has scaled it down to four hours a day in his Assembly speech on February 8 - and that too by 2026. His 2019 claims came

during his Budget speech, where he also spoke about new water treatment plants and JICA projects to augment the State's water supply.

Reacting to the CM's statement, environmentalist Rajendra Kerkar who had voiced his concern over water crisis, said, "We will not get water even for one year. The government streams and springs."

He said, "The Chief Minister is now talking of providing four hours of water per day. But we are reeling under water shortage even after the High Court directed the PWD junior engineer to visit the village, monitor the water supply and file a report. This was in May 2024 after which engineers of PWD and WRD conducted door-to-door survey in Ganjem-Usgao. They surveyed 40 houses and everywhere the residents complained about water shortage and how they are depending on borewells. streams and lakes for water."

Digambar Kamat discharged in illegal mining case

PANJIM: The Principal District and Sessions Court in Panjim has discharged former Chief Minister Digambar Kamat and 16 others, including miner Ravindra Prakash, in an illegal mining case where they were charged with granting condonation of delay - essentially, an extension - in renewing mining leases, which was said to have resulted in a substantial loss to the : state exchequer.

The case stemmed from an investigation by the Special Investigating Team (SIT) of the Crime Branch, which filed a chargesheet in 2018 against Kamat and the others. The charges related to the alleged condonation of delays in renewing mining leases between 2007 and 2012, during Kamat's tenure as Chief Minister. The FIR was based on a complaint lodged by the Directorate of Mines and Geology.

According to the chargesheet, the illegal condo- a key figure.

nation of delays caused a loss of Rs 135 crore to the state's treasury. However, despite the court's ruling in favour of the accused, Kamat still faces another chargesheet in a similar case, which is currently being heard in court.

The cases were filed following the findings of the Justice M B Shah Commission, which alleged that illegal mining in Goa from 2007 to 2012 had resulted in a Rs 35,000 crore scam, with Kamat being named as



















































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
