600-yr-old banyan tree collapses at Banastari market, tragedy averted

Locals, vendors heave sigh of relief; thank 'Vada Dev' for protecting them

PONDA: A major tragedy was averted as a 600-year-old banyan tree, worshipped by locals as Vada Dev, collapsed at the Banastari market at 1:30 am on Thursday. Fortunately, no casualties were reported, bringing relief to vendors and devotees who regularly worship at the site. The ancient tree, which

housed a small temple (ghumti), had been revered for centuries. Locals and vendors, who arrived at the market in the morning, expressed gratitude that the tree had fallen before the busy market day, preventing a potential disaster. "We are thankful that Vada Dev protected us and collapsed without harming anyone," said a local vendor. Every year, cultural celebrations, including two staged dra-

Naik further stated that the incident caused an estimated loss of Rs 6 lakh, as the falling tree damaged metal sheets of the ghumti and several market stalls. However, he acknowledged that the timing of the collapse saved lives, as it occurred in the early hours of the morning before vendors and shoppers arrived.

West Bengal youth dies in rickshaw crash at Dharbandora

PONDA: Sanit Chandra Geetal, 25, a resident of Banastarim originally from West Bengal, died after a rickshaw collided with a parked container truck at around 4 am on Thursday. The rickshaw driver. Uttam Gawli, 48, from Banastarim, sustained minor injuries.

According to Ponda police, Sanit Geetal, who was seated next to the rickshaw driver, died on the spot when the rickshaw crashed into the back of a stationary container truck at Dharbandora. The vehicle was transporting vegetables from Banastari to Belgaum at the time of the accident. Following the collision, Sunit was trapped inside the rickshaw's cabin and succumbed to his injuries before Ponda fire brigade personnel cut open the roof to extricate him.

The container truck had reportedly broken down and was parked on the road at the time of the accident, according to the injured rickshaw driver.

GOA STARTS ISSUING E-PASSPORTS ON PILOT BASIS FOR CIVILIANS

PANJIM: The Regional Passport Office, Panjim has started issuing e-passports on a pilot basis for civilians. These passports feature an embedded chip storing biometric data for enhanced security. The trial phase aims to assess the functionality of the chip, biometric data collection, and passport readers while identifying potential issues. The e-passport will enhance security and facilitate smoother travel. It will provide advanced security features and easier immigration facilities for Indian citizens in 140 countries worldwide. It will also reduce fraud cases by consolidating complete personal data on a single page, it was informed. The Union Ministry of External Affairs, which launched the project in April 2024, will gather feedback from users and immigration officers before a nationwide rollout. Goa is the third passport office to offer the facility after Nagpur and Bhubaneswar.

JHARKHAND YOUTH HELD FOR RAPING MINOR GIRL

MARGAO: Sushan Nayak, 21, a resident of Sarzora, Salcete, and native of Kaloni, Jharkhand, was arrested by Cuncolim police for allegedly raping a minor girl. He was produced before the Judicial Magistrate First Class, JMFC, Margao, and remanded to judicial custody.

Police stated that Nayak's statement will be recorded, and a medical examination will be conducted at Goa Medical College, GMC Bambolim Hospital. The parents of the minor victim, who are labourers in Jharkhand, have been informed, and details about the alleged kidnapping will be collected from them. Nayak, a waiter at a South Goa hotel, was picked up by Cuncolim police from his rented room in a Salcete village. His clothes and other evidence have been

According to police, Navak traveled to Jharkhand, brought the minor girl to Goa without her family's knowledge, and sexually abused her.

CHANDOR MAN FALLS TO DEATH WHILE PRUNING COCONUT TREE

MARGAO: Silystre Felipe, a 60-year-old resident of Chandor, Salcete, succumbed to his injuries after accidentally falling while cutting a coconut tree at Pingal, Assolda, Quepem. According to Quepem police, they were alerted by the Police Control Room (PCR) in Panaji that Felipe was brought dead to the Community Health Centre (CHC) in Curchorem. Upon inquiry, police confirmed that he had fallen from a height while cutting a coconut tree. A scene of occurrence panchanama and inquest panchanama were conducted. The body was sent for a postmortem examination at South Goa District Hospital, Margao, where the police surgeon certified the cause of death as 'haemorrhagic shock' due to an artery that ruptured when he sustained multiple fractures in the fall.

India urged to revive Lanka fishing dialogue, ban destructive practices

MARGAO: National Fishworkers Forum (NFF) General Secretary Olencio Simoes has demanded that the Indian government immediately reactivate bilateral dialogue with Sri Lanka and ban destructive fishing practices, following his participation in an international small-scale fisheries workshop in Sri Lanka. Speaking at the threeday event in Minuwangoda, Colombo, Simoes called for India to include local stakeholders in the Joint Working Group and implement stronger legislation against harmful methods such as bottom trawling, pair trawling, bull trawling, and LED light fishing.

The workshop held reently brought together fishing community leaders from across Asia, Africa, Latin America, the Caribbean, Europe, and North America to discuss issues facing small-scale fisheries globally. A major focus was the transboundary conflicts

A major focus was the transboundary conflicts in Palk Bay—the narrow strait separating Tamil Nadu in India from northern Sri Lankawhere fishing rights have long been contested between the two nations

in Palk Bay-the narrow strait separating Tamil Nadu in India from northern Sri Lanka—where fishing rights have long been contested between the two nations. Simoes highlighted the urgent situation, noting that over 530 boats were seized by Sri Lankan naval forces in 2024 alone, with 119 fishers and 16 vessels detained since January this year.

A dedicated panel discussion on Palk Bay featured prominent voices including Annalingam Annarasa, President of Federation of Jaffna District Fisheries Cooperatives Union, Pradip Chatterjee of India's National Federation of Small Scale Fishworkers, along with Meera Srinivasan, correspondent for The Hindu in Sri Lanka, and Dr. Ahilan Kadirgamar, senior lecturer at the University of Jaffna.

Simoes further urged the Indian government to fully implement the voluntary guidelines for sustainable small-scale fisheries established by the UN's Food and Agriculture Organisation, to which India is a signatory. He emphasized that such measures would protect the livelihoods of millions of fishers while safeguarding fish as a crucial economic food source, particularly relevant given India's concerning position at 105th out of 127 countries in the Global Hunger Index

The workshop, organized by the International Collective in Support of Fishworkers and the Forum for Small Scale Fisheries, reinforced the international commitment to promoting equitable, gender-inclusive, self-reliant, and sustainable smallscale fisheries worldwide.

DoT opens portal for cable applications

PANJIM: The Department of Rules, 2024, all applica-Telecom (DoT), Government of India, has announced that the Gatishakti Sanchar Portal is now open for online applications from February 15. This move is expected to resolve the two-monthlong internet disruption in Goa caused by cable-cutting issues. The portal, accessible at gatishaktisanchar.gov.in, will allow Facility Providers, including telecom and internet service providers, to apply for the use of the Electricity Department's infrastructure for cable installation.

Under the Telecommunications (Right of Way)

tions must be processed online. Facility Providers who previously submitted applications in hard copy must reapply through the portal. The Electricity Department will assess applications on merit after payment of the required fees. To streamline coordination, two nodal officers have been appointed for North and South Goa. Meanwhile, the High

Court of Bombay at Goa has directed cable operators to pay 20% of their pending dues to the Electricity Department for using its infrastructure.

Delegation seeks extension of Carnival timings beyond 10 pm

Locals livid as residential complex spews sewage at Daag-Ponda

Irked that septic waste is still not disposed of properly despite the new Sewage Treatment Plant in town

PONDA: Residents of Ponda, have raised health concerns over yet another instance of sewage overflow from a building at Daag. The overflowing human waste has caused a strong stench, creating a public nuisance. Locals have complained about the unbearable odour in the area.

Despite repeated warnings from the Ponda Municipal Council (PMC) in the past, there has been a lukewarm response to connecting residential buildings to the sewage

Kisan Naik, a resident of Ponda, questioned the authorities' inaction,

stating that despite the presence of a functional 15 MLD Sewage Treatment Plant (STP), sewage continues to overflow into the open. "Who will take responsibility if diseases like cholera and typhoid spread due to sewage spilling onto the roads from residential buildings?" he asked. He

stressed that it is PMC's duty to address the problem. It may be recalled that the PMC had previously warned certain residential buildings in Daag-Tisk that their water connections would be disconnected if the sewage issue was not resolved. However, the current overflow of septic waste is from a different building in the

urged all residential buildings and societies in Ponda to apply for and obtain sewage connections, warning that failure to do so could lead to the disconnection of their water supply. "Residents should cooperate to maintain cleanliness in the town. Some hospitals have already obtained sewage connections, and all residential buildings must follow suit," he stated. Municipal supervisors have been distributing application forms for sewage connections and have identified areas where sewage is overflowing. Naik reiterated that PMC will not tolerate open sewage flow, which poses a public health hazard.
