# Sao Jose de Areal station not for coal handling, says Konkan Rly

Station will facilitate train crossings, help ease congestion at Margao Railway Station, which has reached maximum capacity, say officials; villagers not convinced

MARGAO: Amid growing opposition to the proposed railway station at Sao Jose De Areal, the Konkan Railway Corporation (KRC) has reiterated that the station is being developed exclusively for passenger traffic and not for coal movement. The corporation maintains that the project is necessary to ease congestion at the Margao railway station, which has nearly reached full capacity and cannot be expanded further.

Resistance to the project has intensified, with the Sao Jose de Areal village panchayat recently convening an urgent gram sabha where residents unanimously opposed the proposed new station plan. The panchayat decided to formally communicate their objections to the authorities. In Sarzora, villagers organised a signature campaign, submitting a petition to the Chief Minister via Velim MLA Cruz Silva, while the village panchayat also re-

# Citizens decry MMC's decision to hike service fees, demand accountability

MARGAO: Citizens of Margao have voiced strong opposition to the recent decision by the Margao Municipal Council to increase fees and service charges. The residents condemned the hike and demanded a white paper detailing the various services provided by the civic body.

The move to hike various fees, including house and trade taxes, as well as service charges, was made during a special meeting held by the municipal council. In response, Margao residents have raised concerns about the lack of transparency and accountability from the civic body.

Speaking to reporters, Prabhav Naik, a Margao local, expressed frustration over the decision and called for a comprehensive white paper on the services offered by the council.

He demanded clarity on the functioning of key municipal services, including scientific waste management, the availability of hygienic toilets and changing rooms, drinking water kiosks, as well as the maintenance of traffic islands and public areas. Naik also criticized the municipality for its failure to address illegal activities within its jurisdiction.

"There are numerous illegal activities occurring under the municipality's nose, yet they continue to turn a blind eye and fail to take any action," he said.

Radha Kavlekar, another concerned resident, condemned the fee hike, describing it as an attempt to exploit loyal taxpayers.

# Betalbatim resort fined for dumping, burning garbage

MARGAO: The Betalbatim village panchayat has imposed a penalty on a hotel for disposing of garbage in an open area and has given the establishment a 10-day deadline to clear the accumulated waste from the site.

Betalbatim Deputy Sarpanch Ilma Dias, along with the Panchayat secretary, led the enforcement drive against the hotel, citing its improper disposal of waste generated on the premises. She pointed out that the garbage was dumped at a location connected to a creek, which eventually feeds into the Arabian Sea.

"We have cracked the whip against the hotel after we have learnt that they have also disposed of some garbage by burning. The waste seemed to have been lying for many months now. It is not just waste disposal, but the pollution it will cause the creek water as well," she said, while speaking to the media.

She added: "These hotels have been doing business in the village for many years now and are violating the rules of garbage disposal. The hotel was twice warned by the Panchayat. Now, we have to fine them. They have been told to clear the waste within 10 days."

MARGAO: As the Carnival float parade kicks off on Saturday, the Margao Municipal Council will introduce a float aimed at raising awareness about the importance of younger generations caring for their elders.

Margao Municipal Council Chairperson Damodar Shirodkar announced this initiative during a press conference on Friday while outlining the Carnival program for Margao and Fatorda. He clarified that the float would not compete for prizes but would solely focus on spreading awareness.

"The idea came from a concerned group that approached the civic body, urging us to highlight this pressing social issue," Shirodkar said. "The goal is to remind people about the respect and care our elders deserve. The event will be closely monitored, with approximately 280 traffic police officers and over 300 other personnel deployed to ensure security. Margao Carnival Committee Chairman Camilo Barretto added that the celebrations would also include the traditional zomnivele khell in all 25 municipal wards, along with a grand Konkani musical show on March 3.

## ryots vow to nix Borim bridge

With their NGT case scheduled for hearing in April, farmers and fisherfolk worry that the govt may push ahead with land demarcation once the khazans dry up

MARGAO: Farmers from Loutolim have pledged to physically resist any attempt by the Public Works Department (PWD) to proceed with demarcation work for the controversial Borim bridge project while their case remains pending before the National Green Tribunal (NGT).

With the tribunal adjourning the case to April 23, 2025, tensions have escalated among farmers who fear the government may use the delay to push forward with construction despite unresolved environmental concerns. The core dispute revolves around whether the bridge requires Environmental Clearance (EC) under existing regulations. Farmers argue that their Khazan fields-integral to their livelihoods—would suffer irreparable damage if the project proceeds in its current form.

Albert Pinheiro, president of the Carbot, Mascasana & Bebdo Tenants Association in Loutolim, voiced skepticism about the PWD's intentions, alleging that officials might wait for the Khazan lands to dry before attempting demarcation.

'The Khazan fields are currently filled with saline water for pisciculture and weed control. Once they dry, the PWD may take advantage of the situation to begin demarcation," he warned.

Pinheiro reaffirmed that

the farmers were prepared to resist any premature demarcation efforts.

"We have already protested and physically stood by our fields when the PWD attempted demarcation. If they proceed despite pending legal issues, farmers will have no choice but to take direct action to protect their lands," he said.

He stressed that the farmers' concerns could be resolved if authorities altered the bridge's alignment to avoid the Khazan lands. "We are relying on government-issued notifications

that prohibit construction on Khazan fields. If the government does not honour its own rules, then depending on regulations becomes meaningless," Pinheiro remarked.

The NGT had adjourned

the hearing due to a packed schedule and the absence of technical experts from Chennai.

Despite a request for an earlier date, farmers were advised to submit objections and demands the following Monday. Meanwhile, the Union

Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change (MoEFCC) has yet to submit a fresh affidavit clarifying EC requirements, and the State government has not responded to the farmers' request for an interim stay on construction.

MARGAO: Repeated acts of desecration at a cross in Maina, Curtorim, have caused deep concern among villagers, prompting them to demand stricter measures to safeguard religious sites. The cross, which has stood since 1959, has been targeted three times in the past two months, sparking frustration and outrage in the community.

The first incident occurred on January 16, 2025, followed by another on February 19, and yet again on February 21. Residents are struggling

to understand the motive behind these recurring attacks. Xavier de Maina, speaking on behalf of the villagers, expressed dismay over the situation. "It is distressing to see

someone trying to create unrest. We have no clue about the perpetrators or

their reasons. A police complaint has been filed, and we have urged authorities to step up patrolling in the area," he stated.

Nadia Fernandes also voiced her shock at the repeated desecration and emphasized the gravity of the situation, warning that if such acts are not addressed firmly, larger religious structures could be at risk.

"If miscreants can damage a small cross today, local police.

tomorrow they might attempt to harm a church. The police need to act swiftly to prevent such incidents from escalating," she asserted.

In response to these alarming events, villagers recently gathered at the site in a display of unity, reaffirming their commitment to protecting the religious landmark and pressing for decisive action from the

# No end in sight: Unfinished roadwork at Gogol-Borda causes traffic snarls, sparks commuter frustration

MARGAO: Ongoing road digging work along the Gogol-Borda stretch leading to Margao is causing severe traffic congestion, especially during peak hours, leaving commuters frustrated. Large pits dug for sewage or pipeline work have made travel through Borda difficult, with multiple sections of the main road blocked.

In Xelvona, roadwork has been ongoing for over a year, further adding to congestion. With traffic bottlenecks wors-

ening in the mornings and evenings, citizens have demanded that police or home guards be deployed to manage the flow and prevent accidents. Several minor mishaps have already been reported in Borda due to the chaotic situation.

Commuters traveling from Gogol to Margao, including government and private sector employees, are often stuck in long queues of vehicles, including buses, trucks, and two-wheelers. The absence of traffic personnel has exacerbated the situation, with

scooter riders maneuvering haphazardly, worsening the congestion.

Adding to the chaos, stray cattle can be seen sitting on the dug-up roads, creating further obstacles.

Gopal Naik, a company employee in Verna, expressed frustration over the prolonged work in Margao and Fatorda. "The department has been digging roads for a long time, causing daily inconvenience. The work must be expedited, especially since many office-goers travel to Curchorem in the morning and return home in the evening," he said. He also stressed the need

for officials to be present on-site to supervise the labourers. "Often, workers are seen sitting on the road, obstructing vehicles," he added. A supervisor at the site assured that work is in progress and will be completed as soon as possible. However, residents remain skeptical, urging authorities to speed up the project and deploy traffic personnel to ease congestion.
