

Illegal stone mining in Tillari may cause water crisis in Goa

Hunger strike in Maharashtra border village against quarrying and blasting operations; agitators seek Goa govt's intervention to shut the mines

DODAMARG: Locals villagers are on a hunger strike against illegal stone quarrying in the Tillari Dam area even as environmentalists cautioned the State government that North district could face an acute water crisis if the stone mining and blasting operations near the banks of the dam are not stopped immediately.

Senior environmentalist Rajendra Kerkar said, "If illegal stone quarries in the Tillari Dam region are not shut down immediately, North Goa could face an acute water crisis in the near future."

The dam, in which the Goa government holds an 80% stake, is reportedly at risk due to these operations.

PROLIFERATED ILLEGAL MINING

Dr Madhav Gadgil Committee had previously classified Dodamarg taluka as an ESA in its Western Ghats Environmental Study Report.

The subsequent Kasturirangan panel removed Dodamarg from the ESA list, opening the doors for large-scale mining operations

This proliferated illegal mining in Shirange & Khanyale

Numerous stone crushers are allegedly operating without

permits, with significant financial backing from Goan investors

A major portion of the extracted gravel is reportedly supplied to hot mix plants in Goa

The villagers allege that local revenue officials in Dodamarg taluka are concealing crucial information from senior authorities

They fear that if mining continues, the dam water could flood Khanyale, leading to a catastrophic disaster akin to the Malin landslide tragedy

Man killed, Israeli tourist among two gang-raped near Hampi

PTI, KOPPAL: Two women, including a 27-year-old Israeli tourist, were allegedly gang-raped and assaulted while stargazing near Hampi, police said on Saturday. Three male tourists who were with the women were also assaulted and pushed into a canal and one of them was found dead, they added.

"Of the three accused, we have arrested two and a search is on to nab the third suspect in the case," Ram L Arasiddi, SP of Koppal, told PTI.

According to him, the arrested accused have been identified as Mallesh and Chetan Sai. Both aged 21 years hail from Sai Nagara in Gangavathi town and work as masons.

police said. In her police complaint, the homestay operator alleged that three men on a motorcycle approached them, asking where they could get petrol. When she informed them that there were no petrol pumps nearby and suggested they get it from Sanapur, the accused demanded Rs 100.

"Since the homestay operator did not know them, she told them they had no money. When the men repeatedly insisted, one of the male tourists from Odisha gave them Rs 20. After that, the three men allegedly started arguing and threatened to bash their heads with stones," the complainant stated in the FIR.

PTI, IMPHAL: A protester was killed and over 40 others were injured in clashes between Kuki demonstrators and security forces in Kangpokpi, officials said.



Deserted by family, 75-yr-old from Sanguem seeks refuge at bus stop

Rs 12 crore drug haul in Guirim

PANJIM: The Goa Police Crime Branch on Saturday blew the lid off a major drug trafficking operation, netting a massive haul of nearly 12 kg hydroponic marijuana valued at Rs 11.67 crore in the international market. A 32-year-old from Bangalore has been arrested in the case.

Hydroponic ganja, known for its purity, is priced at Rs 50 lakh per kg or Rs 5,000 per ounce, and is popular for its chemical-free properties at high end party venues in Goa. Gautam, the accused, who was nabbed from an apartment in Guirim, is said to have been introduced to hydroponic weed during his time working as a bartender in various Goa restaurants, where he witnessed the growing demand for the narcotic.

According to police reports, the investigation began when Gautam successfully smuggled the contraband from Thailand to Bengaluru via Nepal. He then travelled by bus from Bengaluru to Goa around two weeks ago and rented two apartments, one in Guirim and another in Pernem.
