Real Madrid march into quarters amid penalty controversy

Arsenal set up quarter-final against Real after 9-3 aggregate win, Asensio stars as Villa beat Brugge to book Paris Saint-Germain showdown

AFP, PARIS: Julian Alvarez had his penalty in the shoot-out controversially disallowed as Real Madrid beat rivals Atletico to reach the Champions League quarter-finals Wednesday while Arsenal, Aston Villa and Borussia Dortmund also advanced.



Failures from the spot defined the second leg of the Madrid derby last-16 tie including a remarkable decision to rule out Alvarez's kick for Atletico as Real won 4-2 on penalties after a 2-2 draw on aggregate.

Conor Gallagher's strike 27 seconds into the game at the Metropolitano stadium had levelled the scores on aggregate.

Gallagher's close-range finish cancelled out Real's 2-1 lead from the first leg last week, but the reigning champions could have progressed inside 90 minutes.

They won a spot-kick midway through the second half when Kylian Mbappe was hauled down by Clement Lenglet after accelerating into the box.

However, Vinicius Junior blazed his kick high over the bar, and the game went to extra time and then penalties with no

Brook banned from IPL for 2 seasons following

NEW DELHI: England batter Harry Brook has been banned

from the Indian Premier League for two seasons following his last minute pullout from the 2025 edition. Earlier this week, Brook had made himself unavailable for the second straight season and apologised "unreservedly"

Brook opted out of IPL 2025 to focus on his England career while in 2024, he withdrew following the death of his grandmother. "I have made the very difficult decision to pull out of the upcoming IPL. I apologise unreservedly to the Delhi Capitals and their supporters," Brook wrote on social media earlier this week. "It is a really important time for England cricket and I want to fully commit to preparing for the upcoming series."

Former Aussie spinner MacGill convicted in cocaine case

SYDNEY: Former Australian spinner Stuart MacGill was found guilty of involvement in a cocaine deal on Thursday, but cleared of participating in largescale drug supply. A Sydney District Court jury acquitted the 54-year-old leg-spinner of facilitating a one-kg cocaine deal worth AUD 330,000 in April 2021. However, he was convicted of the charge of tak-



ing part in drug supply. MacGill, who played 44 Tests for Australia, "showed little emotion" as the verdict was read, according to a reports in Australian media. Hearing of his sentence was adjourned for eight weeks. The court heard that MacGill introduced his regular drug dealer to his brother-in-law, Marino Sotiropoulos, at a meeting under his restaurant on Sydney's north shore. While he denied knowledge of the transaction, prosecutors argued the deal could not have taken place without his involvement.

India tops medal tally in World Para Athletics Grand Prix

NEW DELHI: Three-time Paralympic champion long jumper Vanessa Low of Australia lived up to her top billing as she easily clinched gold in T61-64 class while India's Paris Games medallist Preethi Pal bagged a bronze in T35-38 class 200m race on the concluding day of the World Para Athletics Grand Prix, here, on Thursday. India finished on top of the medal tally with a total haul of 134 -- 45 gold, 40 silver, and 49 bronze. Around 150 Indians had competed in the Grand Prix while around 100 were from other 19 countries. Vanessa, one of the few top stars taking part in the three-day event, cleared a distance of 4.96m in her third attempt, to stand on the top of the podium. Zhanna Fekolina, a Neutral Paralympic Athlete, and India's Bhavani Munniyandi took home the silver and bronze respectively with efforts of 4.13m and 3.51m at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium here. India has signed a four-year contract with the World Para Athletics to host the Grand Prix annually till 2028.

In a video shared by the franchise in their official social media handle, Dravid was seen making his first appearance at the Royals' camp, arriving in a golf cart before switching to crutches for mobility. Although his left leg was secured in a medical walking boot, Dravid remained actively involved in the session despite his injury. He shook hands with players, before engaging in discussions with young talents like Riyan Parag, and shared a moment with Yashasvi Jaiswal as the young India opener was seen demonstrating shadow shots while seeking the legendary batter's advice. Seated with crutches in hand, Dravid closely observed the entire session on Wednesday. The Royals earlier confirmed that Dravid suffered the injury while playing.

NEW DELHI: Rohit Sharma has no reason to retire, says South African batting great AB de Villiers, who believes the India skipper could go down as one of the greatest ODI captains of all time. Speculations were rife about Rohit's retirement from ODIs after the Champions Trophy, but the 37-year-old put them to rest after leading India to an unprecedented third title. "Compared to other captains, look at Rohit's win percentage -- it's almost 74 per cent, which is substantially more than any other captain of the past," de Villiers said in his YouTube channel. "If he keeps going, he will go down as one of the best ODI captains of all time. Rohit has also said he is not retiring and has requested that rumours be stopped spreading." "Why would he retire?
