

Stray dog attacks rattle beach-goers, bite into Goa's tourist experience

Several foreign tourists badly bitten by free-roaming beach dogs; rue that their holiday was wasted in recovery or visiting hospitals for anti-rabies vaccinations; share bad experience on social media

MARGAO: Foreign tourists visiting Goa's popular beaches are increasingly raising concerns about stray dog encounters, with several reports of bites and aggressive behaviour mar- roring their holiday experiences. From the southern shores of Cavellissim and Colva to northern hotspots like Anjuna and Vagator, tourists have reported un- settling incidents that have disrupted their vacations.

"This is an issue that ur- gently needs attention from the authorities," said Emma Thompson, a 45-year-old visitor from the UK. "Goa is such a beautiful desti- nation, but the stray dog situation is affecting many tourists' experiences."

While victims have ex- pressed gratitude to locals,

shack operators, fishermen, lifeguards, and accommo- dation staff for their swift assistance in arranging medical care, they describe these incidents as painful and unexpected disrup- tions to their holidays. Many tourists reported los- ing valuable vacation time as they were confined to their rooms recovering or making repeated visits to doctors for follow-up in- jections.

Robert Jenkins, a re- tired teacher from Eng- land, shared his concern: "I've visited Goa before, but this is something I hadn't experienced on previous trips. It's wor- rying to see this change in what has always been such a welcoming place."

Frequent visitors, par- ticularly from the UK, say these incidents have altered their

HOW TO WARD OFF TROUBLE

■ **Never run or scream** – this triggers the dog's predatory instinct to chase after you

■ **Stay calm, stand tall, speak in a low, firm tone**— This intimidates the dog. Most aggressive dogs that charge at humans do not intend to bite, and may back off

■ **Create a shield between you and the dog (s)** – Use whatever

is handy - a bag, bottle, shoe or umbrella – as a barrier to prevent the dog from reaching you. Do not throw it at the dog and excite it further, though

■ **Enact a defensive stance**— If the dog still does not back down, protect your torso with your arm and fists, kick out at the dog to ward it off. If you fall down, curl into a ball and cover your face, head and body

perception of Goa. Many who once enjoyed morn- ing and evening beach walks now express an- xiety after encountering stray dog packs, depriving them of activities they had planned for.

The issue has gained traction on social media, with tourists sharing their experiences online — a de- velopment that tourism stakeholders fear could impact Goa's reputation as a leading hol-

iday destination.

While some local au- thorities have taken steps to address the problem, including the Cavellissim panchayat's partnership with Mission Rabies to establish a dog shelter, tourism industry repre-

sentatives stress that more comprehensive govern- ment intervention is needed. They warn that unless proactive measures are taken, the stray dog men- ace could pose a growing threat to Goa's tourism industry.

Mormugao council to raze MPA's 'illegal' wall blocking Baina flyover access

VASCO: The Mormugao Municipal Council (MMC) has unanimously resolved to demolish the wall and gates constructed by the Mormugao Port Authori- ty (MPA), which have been blocking public access to the Baina flyover.

All 25 ward councillors backed the resolution dur- ing Thursday's ordinary council meeting.

Following the meeting, MMC chairperson Girish Borkar condemned the MPA's decision to con- struct the wall, particu- larly since it was built shortly after the inauguration of the Baina loop port con- nectivity flyover in January this year.

Borkar alleged that MPA officials had misbehaved with councillors and refused to apologise when confront- ed. He asserted that the

council would take neces- sary steps to safeguard pub- lic interest.

Borkar further claimed that no demolition notice was required as the struc- ture was erected illegally.

Meanwhile, the council also decided to inspect and halt operations at Goa Ship- yard Limited's (GSL) new building until compliance with construction condi- tions is ensured.

Councillor Deepak Naik highlighted that GSL had failed to shift its com- pound wall as previously agreed, contributing to traffic congestion. Naik pointed out that the road in front of GSL has become a bottleneck, with several mishaps reported in the area. Despite committing to the council, GSL neither demolished the wall nor obtained permission to op- erate from its new premis- es, he said.

Encroachments on footpaths, traders warn legal action

MARGAO: Persistent encroachments on Margao's footpaths continue to inconvenience pedestrians, with no effective action from local authorities despite repeated complaints.

The situation has sparked grow- ing frustration among shop owners, residents, and city officials. A group of concerned citizens and vendors is now preparing to file a public interest litigation (PIL) against the Margao Municipal Council (MMC), with plans to seek intervention from the High Court. Councillor Mahesh Amonkar, who has repeatedly raised the issue in council meetings, criticised the in- action. "Despite numerous appeals, no concrete steps have been taken," Amonkar said. "Vendors have taken over the footpaths, forcing pedestri-



ans to walk on the road and putting their safety at risk." He called for a comprehensive action plan to address the problem.

Vinod Shirodkar, former president of the New Market Traders Asso- ciation, voiced frustration over the authorities' inconsistent approach. "They conduct drives only when there's public outrage, but within days the encroachments return," he said, adding that vendors are also facing losses due to poor public amenities. Abdulah N. M. Abdul Karim, a cloth merchant, accused the MMC of turning a blind eye to the worsening situation.

"Footpaths are cluttered with boxes and stock, yet municipal officials seem uninterested in resolving the issue," he said. With frustration mounting, vendors and residents believe legal intervention is the only way forward. "We will approach the High Court to ensure the authorities are compelled to act," Karim added.

Meanwhile, MMC Chairperson Da- modar Shirodkar was unavailable for comment.

TTAG seeks budget boost for tourism

MARGAO: The Travel and Tourism Association of Goa (TTAG) has pre- sented a detailed set of recom- mendations to Chief Minister Pramod Sawant, urging strategic budget al- locations to enhance Goa's tourism sector. The proposals emphasise en- vironmental preservation, improved infrastructure, and revised taxation policies to strengthen the state's tour- ism economy.

TTAG stressed the need to safeguard Goa's natural beauty, cultural heritage, and ecological balance — key draws for tourists. The association called for stricter clean- liness measures, better waste management, and tech-driven im- provements to the transport system to ensure price transparency for visi- tors. Safety and security upgrades, including improved polic- ing in tourist hubs, were also high- lighted as urgent concerns.

On taxation, TTAG proposed slash- ing the Value Added Tax (VAT) on liq- uor to 10% for beer, wine, and locally distilled spirits. TTAG President Jack Sukhija argued that Goa's current high liquor taxes are pushing tourists to bring their own alcohol, particularly for weddings and conferences, result- ing in revenue losses. Aligning taxes with Mumbai's rates, Sukhija believes, would encourage local purchases and

boost state earnings.

To expand Goa's global presence, TTAG urged participation in key inter- national travel marts in London and Berlin, alternating with BTL Portugal and FITUR Spain. Annual partici- pation in MITT Russia, ATM Dubai, and ITB Asia was also suggested.

Domestically, TTAG recommended Goa maintain visibility at major travel events like OTM Mumbai, SATTE Delhi, GITM Jaipur, and TTF Kolkata and Ahmedabad. Road- shows in Tier II and Tier III cities with di- rect connectivity to Goa were also proposed to expand the state's visi- tor base.

Highlighting the need for large-scale event fa- cilities, TTAG called for the development of a world-class convention centre in Goa, aligning with the Union Budget 2025's Rs 20,000 crore allocation for 50 key tourism desti- nations.

To simplify event planning, TTAG proposed a single-window clearance system for weddings and functions, reducing red tape and attracting high-profile events to the state.

Sustainability formed another pil- lar of TTAG's recommendations. The association urged authorities to pro- mote eco-friendly practices by ban- ning flex plastics and thermocol at events, positioning Goa as a responsi- ble tourism destination.

MP slams tree felling for highway expansion at Nuvem

MARGAO: South Goa MP Captain Viriato Fer- nandes has strongly criticised the State govern- ment's decision to cut trees along the old Nuvem highway to facilitate road widening, questioning the necessity of the project.

Fernandes, who has engaged in multiple discussions with the District Administration opposing the expansion, argued that the wid- ening is redundant since most traffic has al- ready shifted to the Western Bypass.

He pointed out that prior to the bypass opening, the old highway had been identified with black spots — known accident-prone ar- eas — but since the bypass became operation- al, traffic and accidents on the old highway have declined significantly.

Supporting local residents' calls to halt the expansion, Fernandes questioned the motives behind the project. He challenged the decision of the PWD engineer who sought permission to cut trees and speculated that the move could be influenced by the size of the road widening contract. Fernandes warned that lo- cals would oppose not only the PWD official but also the Minister responsible if the project proceeds against public sentiment.

He maintained that since the bypass effec- tively manages traffic, expanding the old high- way is unjustified need for effective allocation and management of these funds for the ben- efit of local communities.

Cong moots online, door-to-door campaign to raise awareness on Margao municipality fee hike

MARGAO: The Margao Congress Block has launched a social me- dia campaign to inform residents about a sharp increase in taxes and fees proposed by the Margao Mu- nicipal Council (MMC), set to come into effect from April 1. In addition to the online initiative, Congress workers will begin a door-to-door awareness drive on March 16.

Congress leader Savio Coutinho said that many residents were unaware of the significant hike, with some mis- takenly believing it to be just a 20% increase. "When we showed them the

MMC's public notice detailing the new rates, most were shocked and criticised their elected representatives for failing to inform them earlier," Coutinho said.

The MMC's revised fee structure includes over 50 different cate- gories, making it challenging for resi- dents to understand the extent of the hike. To simplify this, the Congress

team is circulating short video clips explaining the new fees for es- tablishments such as hardware stores, clinics, restaurants, and gyms.

"We will distribute copies of the public notice starting March 16 to show people exactly what they'll face from April 1. Our aim is to pressure the MMC to withdraw these proposed rates," Coutinho added. He further criticised the Council for targeting law-abiding taxpayers instead of expanding the tax net to include un- assessed properties, which he said would significantly boost revenue. Coutinho urged residents to demand that their elected representatives
