

## Cong raises Rs 300 cr scam stink in Goa

### Party leader Pawan Khera lists over 20 projects that he claims were awarded to private players without due process

NEW DELHI, PTI: The Congress on Saturday accused Goa's BJP government of awarding projects worth hundreds of crores to private players without competitive bidding and asked if the BJP-led Centre would initiate an Enforcement Directorate probe into this. Congress' head of Media and Publicity Department Pawan Khera claimed that over 20 projects worth over Rs 300 crore were awarded to private players without competitive bidding. In a statement, Khera said "BJP has created a cabal of 'Mini-Adanis' in Goa, who benefit through favouritism in awarding plum contracts". There was no comment from the Goa government or the BJP on the charges. Khera alleged PM Narendra Modi's 'fight against corruption' is a 'fight for the corrupt' as his "own government" in Goa is an example of this "hollow talk". ### GOA PROJECTS THAT PAWAN KHERA RED-FLAGGED

- **47.18 cr** Smart Water Supply IoT Project under Jal Jeevan Mission was awarded to vendor, apparently without open bidding
- **148.66 cr** worth of PWD works carried out without bidding and only on nomination basis
- A power infrastructure improvement scheme in the Siolim area with **₹32.14 cr** of road reinstatement work was split into four contracts to keep each below certain financial thresholds, thereby avoiding the higher authorisation and open bidding process that a single **₹32 cr** project would have required.
- A **₹9.17 cr** contract for highway consultancy was awarded without an open selection process
- A bundle of PWD Division II projects totaling **₹2.74 cr** was completed only after completion did the department seek approval in aggregate
- Building renovation works—such as alterations in a Goa Medical College hospital ward (costing **₹2.03 cr**) and repairs to a minister's office chamber (**₹0.34 cr**)—were carried out and then presented for ex-post approval
- Vikasat Bharat event in Margao, costing **₹13.22 cr**, was carried out without any formal administrative or expenditure sanction before the event.
- The Goa CSR Conclave 2023 (**₹2.78 cr**) was executed first and approved later
- During PM Modi's visit to Goa on 27th April 2024, the state incurred about **₹1.37 cr** in expenses. Only after the event was the bill submitted for formal approval
- The construction of a fire station in Cuncolim was divided into at least five separate contracts under **₹50 lakh** each, as this allowed approvals at lower administrative levels

## Betul blast: Company's licence suspended

### Inspection of gutted gunpowder warehouse points to significant safety protocol lapses

MARGAO: Within 48 hours of the massive blast and fire at a gunpowder storage facility that rocked Naqueri-Betul on Thursday night, the Petroleum and Explosives Safety Organisation (PESO) has suspended the licences of Hughes Precision Manufacturing Pvt Ltd, which was operating the storage facility. PESO's decision came after a site inspection on Saturday, which aimed to assess the damage and determine the cause of the incident. Preliminary findings suggest that significant safety protocol lapses occurred at the facility, raising concerns about the handling and storage of

The Petroleum and Explosives Safety Organisation (PESO) did on-site inspection on Saturday, after which it handed the suspension of licence order to Hughes Precision Manufacturing Pvt Ltd. The safety protocol lapses at the facility raise concerns about the handling and storage of hazardous materials. The blast had shaken buildings around the area, with the fire visible for many kilometres in all directions, though there were no casualties. The regulatory body, which operates under the

Union Ministry of Commerce & Industry, Government of India, deemed the storage facility unsafe for use. The decision followed a comprehensive report from South Goa District Collector Egna Cleetus, who visited the site on Thursday night to oversee emergency operations. In a formal notice issued to Hughes Precision, Joint Chief Controller of Explosives, R Rawat, confirmed that the company's licence to transport explosives by road was suspended. This temporary measure was taken under Section 6E of the Explosives Act, 1884, and Rule 118(5) of the Explosives Rules, 2008.

## For the first time since going to hospital, Pope to be seen in public

AFP, VATICAN CITY: Pope Francis will make his first public appearance on Sunday with a blessing and a wave from Rome's Gemelli hospital where he was admitted on February 14 with breathing problems. The 88-year-old pontiff has been battling pneumonia in both lungs after being hospitalised.

"Pope Francis intends to wave and offer a blessing from the Agostino Gemelli hospital in Rome after Angelus prayers," The Vatican said Saturday. The pope has missed the Angelus prayers for five straight weeks for the first time since his election in March 2013. The Angelus prayers are normally recited by the pope at midday every Sunday. The pope has made public appearances from the Gemelli hospital earlier.

## 8 paragliders seized from Maha tourists at Keri Beach

PERNEM: The Tiracol Coastal Security Police on Saturday launched a crackdown on illegal paragliding activities and confiscated eight paragliders from Maharashtra tourists at Keri Beach. The action comes after deaths of a Pune tourist and

a pilot from Nepal during paragliding at Keri in January this year. The police asked the eight tourists to appear before the Judicial Magistrate First Class (JMFC), Pernem on Monday. The tourists hailing from Mumbai and Pune had gone to Keri Beach for paragliding, but they had

no licence for carrying out the activity. When contacted, Tiracol Coastal Police Station PI Vikram Naik said that they noticed tourists landing on the Keri beach with paragliders and immediately stopped them. The police confiscated their paragliders and after getting their details, asked

them to appear before the JMFC, Pernem. Following deaths of a Pune tourist and a pilot from Nepal during paragliding at Keri in January this year, the Tourism Department had suspended paragliding activities, both motorised and non-motorised throughout the State until further orders.

## Taking aim with young Goans to keep archery alive

PANJIM: He may be physically challenged, but that has not deterred Jose Luis Godinho, popularly known as Zito, from dedicating his life to train young Goans in archery at Pilar.

A former goalkeeper, Jose entered the world of archery by chance in Dubai in the 80s. Before training students in archery, at 18, he was the youngest to be recruited for the State police and continued for the next three years. In 1986, he went to Dubai to boost his finances and took up archery. A recreation manager at a popular hotel in Dubai, he trained locals, Indians and Europeans in the sport.

He returned to Goa in 2016, Jose launched the Zito Archery Club at the Don Bosco oratory. After being given a chance by Fr Ralin, he started training the local children and also trained the U-16 team for the nationals.

"One can figure out how talented a person is the way he/she holds the bow. I provide them with the basics on how to stand, how to aim and when to shoot. The standard of the sport is improving, there is a lot of talent, but with no ground I had to pay for the facility," Jose said.
