TWO BOOKED FOR STALKING, HARASSING WOMAN IN NUVEM

MARGAO: The Maina-Curtorim police have registered a case against two men for allegedly stalking and harassing a woman in Nuvem. According to the complaint, Mahendra Singh Rawat and Freddy Pinto, both residents of Nuvem, followed the complainant, stared and whistled at her persistently. Based on her written complaint, an offence under Sections 78, 79 read with 3(5) of the BNS has been registered. PSI Praful Giri of Maina-Curtorim police station is leading the investigation.

TWO ARRESTED FOR BLACKMAIL AND ONLINE DEFAMATION OF WOMAN

MARGAO: Verna police have arrested two men for allegedly blackmailing a woman and circulating her obscene pictures on social media. The accused, Adrian alias Joyson D'Silva of Nuvem and Constancio alias Concy Gama of Cortalim, reportedly threatened the victim, demanding she comply with their demands or face false accusations of immoral behaviour. They later circulated her images online, defaming her. Additionally, in August 2024 at Perina Restaurant, Margao, D'Silva allegedly sexually harassed the complainant by making explicit advances. The police have booked the duo under various sections of the IT Act and BNS. PI Melson Colaco of Verna police station is handling the investigation.

PEDESTRIAN SERIOUSLY INJURED IN BENAULIM ROAD ACCIDENT

MARGAO: A pedestrian sustained severe injuries after being knocked down by a scooter rider in Benaulim. According to a complaint lodged with Colva police, the incident occurred on March 25, at 7.30 pm, when Lawrie Pereira of Cavellossim, riding a Jupiter scooter, allegedly drove in a rash and negligent manner and hit pedestrian Barka Kaur of Khareband, Margao. The impact caused her to fall onto the road, sustaining serious injuries.

JHARKHAND MAN FALLS TO DEATH AT MAJORDA

MARGAO: A Jharkhand native succumbed to his injuries at GMC Bambolim after falling from a height in Majorda. Police enquiries revealed that on March 13, Bihari Singh was sitting on a retaining wall under the influence of alcohol when he lost his balance and fell. He was initially taken to SGDH, Margao, before being referred to GMC Bambolim. A post-mortem confirmed that his death resulted from septicemia and shock following a head injury. The police have conducted an inquest and registered the case accordingly.

DOMESTIC HELP BOOKED FOR GOLD JEWELLERY FROM CALANGUTE HOUSE

PANJIM: The Calangute Police have booked a domestic help from Karnataka for allegedly stealing cash and gold ornaments worth lakhs of rupees from a residence at Nalkwado-Calangute. Adelia Fernandes has filed a complaint that her domestic help, identified as Reshma, a resident of Karnataka, stole Rs 56,200 along with five gold chains, eleven earrings, two diamond earrings, one bracelet, and a men's gold ring of unknown value before February 22.

SALIGAO MAN CHEATED FOR RS 5.21 LAKH ON PRETEXT OF OVERSEAS JOB

PANJIM: A resident of Grand Morod, Saligao, has filed a complaint against a man for allegedly cheating him of Rs 5.21 lakh by promising a job abroad. Cletus Fernandes reported that between December 10, 2024, and March 11, 2025, the accused, identified as Francis Barretto, took money from him multiple times under the pretext of securing an overseas job.

MUMBAI MAN ARRESTED FOR CHEATING WOMAN OF RS 3.43 LAKH IN ONLINE SCAM

PANJIM: The Agasaim Police have arrested Firdous Ali Shah (36) from Andheri West, Mumbai, for allegedly cheating a woman of Rs 3.43 lakh in online scam. The victim Shilpa Gawas in her complaint said that the incident occurred between August 3 and 17, 2024. The accused allegedly impersonated an investment company and used digital platforms to carry out the fraud.

UK NATIONAL FOUND DEAD IN RENTED HOUSE AT ANJUNA

PANJIM: A 61-year-old UK national, Timothy Paul Davis, was found dead in his rented house at Soranto Vaddo, Anjuna, on March 29. Davis was lying on his bed with no visible external injuries, except for ant bite marks near his neck and private parts, police said. The body has been preserved at Goa Medical College and Hospital (GMC), Bambolim, for post-mortem examination.

THREE E-BOOKS ON PATHOLOGY RELEASED BY DR WISEMAN PINTO

PANJIM: Three new e-books titled 'USP6 Gene Rearranged Tumours', 'SATB2', and 'Peutz-Jeghers Syndrome' were recently released. The e-books have been edited by Dr R G Wiseman Pinto, Professor of Pathology, Former Head of Department, former Dean of Goa University, and President of the Asian Society of Cytopathology. The first book, 'USP6 Gene Rearranged Tumours', focuses on Ubiquitin Specific Protease 6 (USP6) Gene Rearrangement, which is observed in Aneurysmal Bone Cysts (Primary) as well as in other soft tissue tumour-like lesions. The book highlights the role of Immunohistochemistry (IHC), RT-PCR, and Gene Sequencing in diagnosing and confirming Aneurysmal Bone Cysts and other soft tissue tumours. The second book, 'SATB2', discusses Special AT-Rich Sequence Binding Protein 2 (SATB2), an essential marker for diagnosing colorectal carcinoma, appendiceal carcinoma, and osteosarcoma. The third book, 'Peutz-Jeghers Syndrome', explores this genetic disorder, which is characterised by the presence of polyps in the gastrointestinal tract along with oral mucocutaneous pigmentation. All three e-books have been uploaded on www.pathoindia.com, where they can be accessed and read free of cost.

Highway labourers forced to reside in squalor in Ponda

PONDA: Labourers engaged in highway development work at Farmagudi, Ponda, have been residing in deplorable conditions by the roadside for several months without access to basic facilities. This situation has raised health concerns not only for the workers but also for students of GVM's Higher Secondary School, located nearby.

The workers, who have set up temporary shelters covered with plastic sheets near the roadside in front of the school, lack essential amenities such as toilets and bathrooms. Local resident Viraj Sapre has called on the authorities to instruct the contractor to provide proper accommodation and basic facilities for the workers.

Expressing concern over the issue, Sapre highlighted the risks posed to students, noting that some parents

and teachers have raised complaints about open defecation in the nearby bushes. "On humanitarian grounds, these workers

deserve proper accommodation, toilets, and bathrooms," he stated.

The workers, including women, are struggling

under the harsh summer heat, living under plastic tents without safety or sanitation. According to them, around eleven

couples are currently residing in these makeshift shelters, with women labourers earning Rs 450 per day while males are

paid Rs 550.

Sapre clarified that he is not against development projects but insisted that while crores are being spent on infrastructure, labourers should be provided with dignified living conditions and basic necessities. He urged the authorities to take immediate action to improve their situation.

Migrant workers play an essential role in the Indian economy with millions working in various sectors including construction, agriculture and manufacturing but unfortunately are subjected to various forms of exploitation like low wages, poor working conditions and lack of basic amenities.

BICHOLIM: The Nestlé workers from Bicholim on Monday protested in front of the factory premises against the company's inaction on reinstating retrenched employees

The protest was organised to highlight the company's failure to reinstated retrenched workers de-

spite the issue being settled in the court of the Labour Commissioner. Janardhan Tamankar, leader of the workers' union, assured the protestors that they would ensure justice for the affected workers, demanding their re-employment. "We will look into the matter and ensure that there is no injustice on any of the workers. We demand that they are

re-employed," he said. Union leader Anand Shirodkar further explained that they had issued an intimation letter to the company on March 4 and submitted their demands, followed by a reminder. Despite this, no action has been taken by the management. Shirodkar warned that the protest would continue until their demands are addressed.
