Smart City CEO can't give finishing date for project, says 'wait till May 31'

PANJIM: For the tired residents of Panjim enduring road blockages, barricades, and dug-up roads for seven years, the nightmarish experience unleashed by the Smart City works is far from over.

Fresh from missing the High Court-given deadline of March 31, Sanjit Rodrigues, CEO of Imagine Panaji Smart City Development Limited (IPSCDL), had a pithy answer on Tuesday: "Wait until May 31."

Rodrigues was addressing the press, where he faced tough questions about the missed deadlines. But he did not - or could not - clearly specify the date by which the work would finish and Panjim finally become 'smart'. He acknowledged that the work on Taad Maad Road near Caculo Mall at St Inez



remains unfinished due to certain 'complexities', which require additional time for completion.

"I will follow my affidavit, and the court is monitoring the process. I can only provide updates as per the status, which is being supervised by the court. I cannot override the court's queries. I am answering very clearly to the court's questions,"

When asked why the project was delayed for so long, Rodrigues explained, "Many smart cities, including Paniim, requested an extension of the deadline from the Central Government. The Centre set March 31 as the final date. It's not that I extended or shortened the project timeline; the mission was supposed to end on March 31."

Blast, blaze at firecracker godown in Gujarat kills 18

PTI, PALANPUR (GUJA-RAT): Eighteen persons were killed and five others injured after a blast at a firecracker warehouse led to a blaze and collapse of the building in Gujarat's Banaskantha district on Tuesday, officials said.

The incident took place in an industrial area near Deesa town at around 9.45 am.

"As many as 18 persons died in the incident, and five others were injured after the slab of the building collapsed following a massive blast," Superintendent of Police Akshayraj Makwana said.

He said the victims workers from Madhya Pradesh and their family members, and most of them died after the slab collapsed on them.

PANJIM: Issuing a stern warning to the State government for disobeying its order and failing to demolish 51 illegal structures, the High Court of Bombay at Goa on Tuesday ordered the razing of the structures in order to restore the low-lying paddy fields to their original state at Socorro, Guirim and Sangolda within the next three months.

Ever since a High Court order in 2021, government officials have found different reasons over the last four years to not comply with it. During Tuesday's hearing, the government counsel told the Court that the Rs 69 lakh

May 26, 2020 respectively, on the alleged unauthorised activities regarding filling up of the paddy fields.

Representing the Comunidade of Serula, Adv Y V Nadkarni, had also submitted that these activities were still on. Government Advocate P Arolkar had assured the Court as well that steps will be taken to implement the order both in letter and spirit.

In August last year, the Court had requested the Administrative Tribunal to dispose of the pending appeals as soon as possible, preferably within six months. The Court had also asked the government authorities to submit the plan of action for implementation of its own orders. But since the government authorities did not initiate any action, the petitioners again approached the Court praying to direct the government authorities to execute the order.
