# **Residents near Guv's house** without water for 7 months

They suspect that the lack of water supply is due to illegal tapping and granting of new water connections to large projects along the main PWD water line that feeds their

PANJIM: Residents of La Marvel Colony in Dona Paula, Panjim, have been grappling with a severe water shortage, with little to no supply over the past seven months.

Despite repeated appeals to the Chief Engineer of the PWD, Chief Minister, MLA Jennifer Monserrate, and CCP Mayor Rohit Monserrate, residents say no action has been taken and no explanation provided.

Residents suspect that the lack of water supply is due to illegal tapping and the granting of new water connections to large residential and commercial projects along the main PWD water line that feeds their colony. This, they believe, has severely affected the pressure and volume of water reaching their homes.

With the onset of summer, residents fear their hardship will only worsen and have urged authorities to act immediately.

In a statement, the La Marvel Residents Welfare

Association said, "Living close to the official residence of the Hon'ble Governor of Goa does not guarantee a tax-paying citizen the right to receive daily PWD water. While the Governor enjoys a dedicated water supply line, the residents of La Marvel Colony do not. Developed in 1966–67, and home to many senior citizens, our colony is facing severe water scarcity—having gone 8 to 10 days at a stretch without water, for the past seven months right in the state's capital, Paniim.

Ajoy Barretto, President of the Residents Welfare to the PWD Assistant Engi-Association, added, "We have repeatedly brought to the attention of authorities that the issue lies in the in-Minister, residents say adequate water pressure, which prevents the supply they are yet to receive a re-

sponse or any relief. In December 2024, the Residents Welfare Association filed a complaint with the PWD Assistant Engineer (Division III, Sub-Division I, Panjim), stating that the disruption had begun in April 2024.

## Plastic waste gives Margao railway station an ugly look

"It's good that the panchayat is opposing development on Sinquerim hill. But why isn't the same interest shown for Candolim and Orda hills? If you look at Saipem hill behind Lloyd's restaurant, it looks like mining activity is taking place. The panchayat must step in," Fernandes said, pointing to a proliferation of illegal houses on the slopes.

Damien Teles of the Calangute Constituency Forum (CCF) said hill-cutting was rampant in Orda, and alleged that even his property had been encroached

upon. "Over 200 illegal houses have come up on the Orda hill slopes. This was acknowledged by the high court, yet the violations ly being discharged into fields and nullahs.

"At present, sewage is taken by tanker to the Tonca-Caranzalem plant in Panjim, which accepts only one tanker a day from Candolim. Our proposed STP will handle 10 tanker loads daily. ### **Rashtriya OBC Mahasangh wants caste-wise** census for upliftment of community

PONDA: The Rashtriya OBC Mahasangh has urged Chief Minister Pramod Sawant to initiate an immediate caste-wise census to aid the socio-economic and educational upliftment of Other Backward Classes (OBCs)

Convenor of the Rashtriya OBC Mahasangh, Madu Naik, addressing the media alongside Dhobi Samaj treasurer Vivekanand Verenkar and Render Samaj member Agnel Cabral, welcomed recent announcements by political leaders in support of OBC-related issues.

Naik praised Goa Forward (GF) MLA Vijay Sardesai for raising the concerns of OBC communities in the Assembly. He also extended appreciation to former BJP ministers Kiran Kandolkar and Dayanand Mandrekar for their public support. "We welcome the announcement

made by Kiran Kandolkar yesterday, in the presence of Vijay Sardesai and Dayanand Mandrekar, that if the Government does not conduct the caste census, then we will conduct it ourselves," said Naik.

Highlighting the impact of the absence of such a census, Naik stated, "OBCs are facing injustice. In the absence of caste census, they are not receiving the benefits of government schemes. Last time, the OBC Mahasangh put forward several demands, but no provisions were made for them in the budget."

He emphasised the need for a comprehensive survey covering the caste, economic status, hardships faced, educational qualifications, and overall poverty among OBCs. "Only then will the Government be in a position to implement genuine economic and educational upliftment for these communities," he added.

## Annoyed by traffic bottlenecks, Malbhat locals demand police presence

MARGAO: Already notorious for traffic snarls, Margao is now seeing congestion worsen in busy pockets like Malbhat-particularly outside a nationalised bank, where a combination of parked vehicles, roadside vending, and lack of enforcement is choking movement.

During peak hours, the area in front of the bank becomes a bottleneck. A tender coconut vendor stationed right outside adds to the congestion, drawing customers and further narrowing the road. Vehicles are routinely parked on both sides, leaving minimal space for moving traffic.





Another local, M.A. Raiker, echoed similar concerns, pointing out that sidewalks are crowded with pedestrians, while goods are unloaded onto the road by commercial vehicles, worsening the congestion.

Despite daily traffic woes, residents say neither the police nor municipal authorities have intervened to streamline traffic or regulate roadside vending in the area. Locals are now calling for immediate deployment of traffic personnel and stricter enforcement to ease the situation.
