

## A DAY LATER, CRACKDOWN ON 'ILLEGAL' HILL CUTTING

### Deputy Collector and SDO seeks reports from Deputy Town Planner 'at the earliest' after O Herald exposed how rule of law was flouted

PANJIM: A day after O Herald exposed the 'unauthorised' hill cutting at Sirvo in Quepem, Quepem Deputy Collector and Sub-Divisional Officer (SDO) Manohar Karekar directed the Deputy Town Planner of the Town and Country Planning (TCP) Department to investigate if development permissions or approvals were issued by the department for the work.

In his letter, Karekar also directed a probe into whether the 'activities' fall within any planned development zones and violate any provisions of the Regional Plan or Outline Development Plan.

### 'ILLEGAL' HILL CUTTING SPARKS OUTRAGE IN SIRVOI

To, The Deputy Town Planner, Town and Country Planning Department, Quepem, Goa.

Subject: Regarding Alleged Illegal Hill Cutting and Land Development in Survey No. 62/3-A and 122/1-C of Village Sirvo, Quepem Taluka - Reg.

Sir,

This office has come across a news article published in the Herald newspaper dated 07-04-2025, which alleges illegal hill cutting and land development activities in Survey No. 62/3-A and 122/1-C of Village Sirvo, Quepem Taluka.

In view of the seriousness of the matter and potential violation of planning regulations, you are kindly requested to:

1. Verify whether any development permissions or approvals have been issued by your Department in respect of the said survey numbers.

The letter issued to the Deputy Town Planner taking cognisance of the April 7 report in O Herald highlighting the alleged illegal hill cutting at Sirvo

The letter seeks a report necessary action and urges the deputy town planner

to take appropriate action under the Goa Town and Country Planning Act, 1974, if any unauthorised development was identified.

The hill cutting is taking place in survey numbers 62/3-A and 122/1-C.

Additionally, the Deputy Collector and SDO issued a show cause notice to property owner Santosh Phal Desai, questioning why action should not be taken against him for conducting hill cutting in the No Development Zone (NDZ).

Karekar's letter began by

referencing the O Herald report titled 'Illegal Hill Cutting Sparks Outrage in Sirvo', which brought the issue to his attention.

O Herald had revealed that, despite previous orders, including a show cause notice and stop work order issued by the Deputy Collector South-I, unauthorised hill cutting activities have continued. An inspection by the flying squad further confirmed that the actions violated Section 17(A) of the TCP Act 1974.



## Govt hikes LPG price by Rs 50, CNG by Re 1

PTI, NEW DELHI: The domestic cooking gas LPG price on Monday was hiked by a steep Rs 50 per cylinder across India and CNG by Re 1 per kg, while the government raised taxes on petrol and diesel to shore up its revenues.

The increase in cooking gas price will be for the Ujjwala - poor beneficiaries who got LPG connection free of cost - and general users, and will be effective from April 8 and has been necessitated due to the rise in input cost, Oil Minister Hardeep Singh Puri said.

Cooking gas for Ujjwala users will cost Rs 553 per 14.2-kg cylinder from the current Rs 503 in the national capital. The same for general users will now cost Rs 853.

The rates, which vary from state to state depending on local incidence of taxes, were last revised in March last year when they were cut by Rs 100.

Also, CNG prices were hiked by Re 1 per kg in the national capital and adjoining cities after the government last week raised input natural gas prices by almost 4%. CNG in the national capital will cost Rs 75.09 per kg, Indraprastha Gas Ltd - the city gas retailer - said in a post on X. This follows the price of input natural gas being hiked from \$6.50 per million British thermal units to \$6.75 from April 1.

Alongside, the government hiked excise duty on petrol and diesel by Rs 2 per litre each to raise about Rs 32,000 crore additional tax revenue. However, there will be no change in retail prices as the increase will be adjusted against the price cut that was warranted because of falling international oil prices.

Puri said prices of crude oil - which is turned into petrol and diesel in refineries - have fallen to about \$60 per barrel from \$70-75, and a reduction in the retail selling price of petrol and diesel is possible if the international oil prices stay at those levels.

### Sensex tanks 2,227 points, wipes out Rs 14 lakh crore of investor wealth

PTI, MUMBAI: Stock markets crumbled on Monday with Sensex sinking by 2,226.79 points - its steepest single-day decline in 10 months - as a global market carnage following US President Trump's tariff hikes and retaliation from China fanned fears of economic slowdown. Dalal Street investors were a poorer lot on Monday as their wealth eroded sharply by Rs 14 lakh crore.

## Prez Murmu in Portugal: Special stamps released


