Tourism Dept faces heat over failing infrastructure, red tape in shack ops

MARGAO: Shack operators from across Goa met Tourism Department officials in Panjim this week, flagging serious concerns about this season's challenges and offering suggestions for the upcoming one.

The meeting was held in two parts — an initial session with Tourism Director Kedar Naik and a follow-up chaired by Tourism Minister Rohan Khaunte. Both sides described the interaction as a routine consultation to review operations.

Post-meeting, members of the Goa Shack Owners Welfare Society highlighted a range of issues — foremost among them, the increasing threat posed by aggressive stray dogs on beaches.

"Sterilisation alone isn't enough," said one shack owner, acknowledging the ongoing Mission Rabies campaign but demanding parallel action to identify and remove aggressive dogs. "We need a focus on tourist safety."

They also demanded a single-window system for shack



licence approvals, streamlined tax procedures, and clearer regulations.

The operators pushed back against the narrative blaming unlicensed masseurs and hawkers for declining tourist numbers. "Enforcement needs to focus on the real problems," one operator said, pointing instead to illegal touts and prostitution rackets which, they argue, are fleecing tourists and damaging Goa's image.

Infrastructure failings were another flashpoint. Shack owners slammed the deplorable state of public toilets and changing rooms, with some falling into disuse just a few vears after installation. At Baga, they alleged a borewell dug for a government facility has resulted in open sewage discharge, while similar requests from shack owners are

Tourism Director Naik conceded issues at "one or two locations" but insisted most facilities are operational. He said the department is replacing contractors and enhancing monitoring.

Cong stages women-led protest against LPG hike

MARGAO: In a show of dissent against the rising cost of living, Congress party workers, including a large number of women, staged a protest in Margao on Thursday to oppose the recent hike in LPG cylinder

The demonstrators accused the BJP-led government at the Centre of pushing the common man into financial distress through repeated increases in fuel and essential commodity prices.

Prominent Congress leaders such as Michel Rebello, Zilla Panchayat (ZP) member, Savio Coutinho and others were present at the protest, which saw participation from locals, party workers, and women

Women protesters, holding empty gas cylinders and banners, highlighted how the LPG price increase was directly affecting daily household budgets. "We are the ones running the kitchens. Every time the cylinder rates go up, it becomes harder to feed our families," one of the protesting women Congress workers said.

Speaking to the media, Congress leaders alleged that the government was flooting the common people'. "This price hike is yet another blow to the middle class and poor families, who are already struggling with inflation and unemployment," said Savio

GFA urges CM to reconsider housie ban, warns of impact on village clubs

PANJIM: Goa Football Association (GFA) President Caitano Fernandes submitted a representation to Chief Minister Pramod Sawant, urging reconsideration of the recent ban on housie activities imposed under the Public Gambling Act, 1976, by the South Goa Collector.

Held during feasts, zatras, and festivals, housie has long been a traditional fundraising tool for clubs, helping sustain grassroots football programmes and community initiatives.

With sponsorships and donations dwindling, income from housie often helps clubs stay afloat. Many of these registered clubs maintain audited accounts and operate transparently, the GFA noted, warning that a sudden ban could jeopardise their existence and damage Goa's footballing ecosystem.



The Chief Minister assured the GFA of his support and acknowledged the need to protect Goa's rich footballing heritage. To build momentum, the GFA has convened a meeting with all affiliated clubs on Monday, April 14, to launch a signature campaign. The petition will be submitted to the South Goa Collector, highlighting the collective concerns of the state's football community.

After housie ban, citizens question inaction on matka

MARGAO: Following the State-wide ban on housie, citizens and social groups have begun voicing strong concerns over the continued and unchecked operation of matka gambling across Goa, accusing authorities of selective enforcement of the law.

"If housie, a low-stakes game played for entertainment, has been banned, then why is matka—known for its deep-rooted gambling network-still running unchecked?" asked Rodney D'Souza, a concerned citizen. Alvito Fernandes added, "Matka involves lakhs of rupees, but why is there no strict action against this gambling? Some of these counters are operating in full view of police stations."

Set up edu hub at Davorlim:

MARGAO: Rajya Sabha MP Sadanand Shet Tanavade on Thursday stressed the need to pursue late CM Manohar Parrikar's vision of an education hub at Davorlim. The MP said the project, modelled on the Cujira school complex, must be taken to its logical conclusion.

Tanavade also confirmed that the Scheduled Tribes (ST) Bill, introduced in Parliament, will come up for discussion and approval during the upcoming Monsoon session. Tanavade told reporters that the ST Bill could not be taken up in the recently concluded session due to other pressing legislative matters, including the Wafq Board Bill.

At annual Chrism Mass, priests urged to be humble, inclusive, and available to faithful

MARGAO: The annual Chrism Mass of the Archdiocese of Goa and Daman was celebrated on Thursday at the Se Cathedral, Old Goa, with Archbishop Filipe Neri Cardinal Ferrao presiding over the solemn occasion. Auxiliary Bishop Simiao Fernandes, Bishop Emeritus of Port Blair Alex Dias, Vicar General Jose Remedious Fernandes, and priests from across the Archdiocese participated in the ceremony.

The Chrism Mass is a significant event in the liturgical calendar, symbolising the unity of priests with their bishop and the blessing of the holy oils

used throughout the year in sacraments.

Delivering the homily, Auxiliary Bishop Simiao Fernandes reflected on three key virtues of priestly ministry—availability, humility, and inclusivity. "Just as Jesus made himself available to the people, priests must be present for their flock. Like Jesus who washed the feet of his disciples, they must serve with humility and avoid clericalism. They should also be inclusive, reaching out especially to those marginalised by society," he said.

He also urged the faithful to pray for all priests and deacons of the Archdiocese, and for Cardinal

Ferrao, who marked the anniversary of his episcopal ordination.

During the Mass, Cardinal Ferrao blessed the three Holy Oils—the Oil of Catechumens (Oleum Catechumenorum), the Oil of the Sick (Oleum Infirmorum), and the Sacred Chrism (Sacrum Chrisma).

The Chrism mass has special significance as the Bishop expresses his bond with the Priests and all the faithful during the Mass. The priests in their turn resolve to work under the fatherly care and guidance of their Bishop.

The celebration concluded with the release of the Pastoral Diary for the upcoming year.
