Justice B R Gavai to be next CJI

To take oath on May 14

PTI, NEW DELHI: Chief CJI. He is due to retire on Justice of India Sanjiv November 23, 2025. Khanna on Wednesday rec-

ommended to the Centre the name of Justice Bhushan Ramkrishna Gavai as the next CII. Justice Gavai, the

second senior-most Court Supreme judge after the incumbent CJI Khanna, is set to become the 52nd CJI on May 14 after the retirement of CII Khanna on May 13.

Justice Gavai, who was elevated as a judge of the Supreme Court on May 24, 2019, would have a tenure of over six months as the

CJI Khanna, who was

sworn in as the 51st CII on November 11 last year, recommended to the Union law ministry to appoint Justice Gavai as the next CJI. The retirement age of Supreme Court judges is 65 years.

Born on November 24, 1960 at Amravati, Justice Gavai was elevated as an additional judge of the Bombay High Court on No vember 14, 2003.

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Indian student sues Trump admin over deportation threat

PTI, NEW YORK: An Indian was among four students at Michigan public universities who have filed a lawsuit against their possible deportation after their student immigration status was terminated 'unlawfully'.

Chinmay Deore from Inida, Xiangyun Bu and Qiuyi Yang from China, and Yogesh Joshi from Nepal on Friday filed the lawsuit against the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and immigration officials, saying their student immigration status in the Student and Exchange Visitor Information System (SE-VIS) was illegally terminated "without sufficient notice and explanation".

SEVIS is a database that tracks information about non-immigrant students and exchange visitors in the US.

The American Civil Liberties Union of Michigan, which is representing the students, on Thursday, said they "filed a federal lawsuit along with a request for an emergency injunction on behalf of the students who had their F-1 student immigration status unlawfully and abruptly terminated by the Trump administration for no valid reason and without notice".

"The lawsuit asks the court to reinstate the status of these students so that they will be able to complete their studies and avoid facing the risk of detention and deportation," it said.

"None of them has been charged with, let alone convicted of, any crime in the US. None has violated any immigration law. Nor have they been active in on-campus protests regarding any political issue," said a complaint in the court, naming DHS Secretary Kristi Noem, acting ICE Director Todd Lyons and ICE Detroit Field Office Director Robert Lynch.

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Maradona's daughter says doctors could have prevented his death

AFP, SAN ISIDRO, ARGEN-TINA: Argentine football legend Diego Maradona's daughter told a court Tuesday his death 'would have been avoided' if doctors caring for him after surgery had done their jobs.

Maradona died on November 25, 2020, aged 60, while recovering at home from brain surgery for a blood clot. He had battled cocaine and alcohol addiction for decades.

His seven-person medical team is on trial for what prosecutors have called the "horror theater" of the final days of his life, and risk up to 25 years in prison if found guilty.

Maradona was found to have died of heart failure and acute pulmonary edema - a condition where fluid accumulates in the lungs - two weeks after going under the knife.

"If they had done their job, this would have been avoided," his daughter Dalma Maradona, a plaintiff in the case, told a court in San Isidro in the north of Buenos Aires.
