The International Jazz Day will be celebrated on April 30. It will be celebrated in more than 190 countries with Abu Dhabi selected as the Global host city. In Goa, as in every year, jazz musicians will play and jazz aficionados will listen to their favourite genre of music. This will happen this year at the Jardim Garcia de Orta in Panjim from 6 pm. It will be a free show for everyone with 40 musicians performing. This year will be the 14th edition featuring a wide range of artists. From twelve year old Nigel Rebello to 78-year-old jazz veteran Allan Moraes, the concert will present jazz in all its glorious forms from the swinging 60's right up to today's electrifying funk and fusion. History of International Day of Jazz in Goa

- The first International Jazz Day that was organised by Jazz Goa in 2012 was a small affair at Jardim Garcia De Orta in Panjim. Around five musicians took the stage to entertain around 200 music lovers.
- Every year, the venue moved around Goa until the 14th edition when it's back to its original origin but this time a mega production.
- Fifty six artists from Goa, across India and around the world come together to celebrate a great form of music.

The number of performers is quite large and so it means musicians will be allowed to perform just one number. Seby, a veteran musician said he would be performing an original jazz number in Konkani which was very popular. 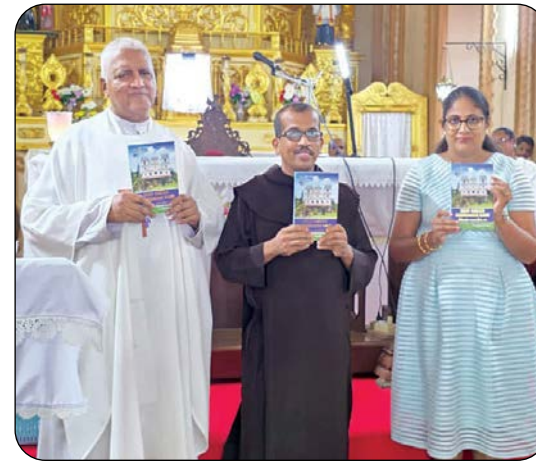

Authorities confirmed that his body showed several injury marks. Officials revealed that Rohit had moved back to Guwahati from Mumbai a few months ago. His family mentioned that he had left home around 12:30 pm on Sunday to go on an outing with friends, but later in the day, they were unable to reach him.

Enjoying the depths of the sea from a young age

A young girl, Varuna Unnikrishnan, has achieved the Junior Open Water Diver Certification making her one of the youngest to do so in Goa

A young girl of 10 from Goa has successfully completed her Junior Open Water Diver certification, thus becoming one of the youngest divers in Goa to reach this milestone. Varuna Unnikrishnan, a Class 6 student of the Navy Children School, the daughter of a navy man, was introduced to the sea at 9. Varuna means God of Oceans and her love for marine life began at an early age, and her passion for the ocean led her to take the plunge into scuba diving.



Her training

She started her Open Water Diver course with Scuba Evolution Dive Centre, where she learned essential skills such as dive theory, buoyancy control, and underwater navigation. Her course included a mix of theory, confined water training, and four open water dives, which she completed successfully with flying colours. She is currently qualified to dive up to a depth of 12 metres.

Her future plans

Varuna's instructor, Madhuli P Karmalkar, a highly experienced dive professional, guided her throughout the training process. Under Madhuli's patient and thorough mentorship, Varuna demonstrated incredible focus, learning both the technical aspects of diving and how to

safely navigate the open waters. Her dives took place off the near Grandi Island of Goa, where she encountered vibrant coral reefs and a variety of marine life, making her achievement all the more special. Her father said he was preparing to go to the Lakshadweep Islands after the monsoons to go diving.

With the Open Water Diver certification now under her belt, Varuna has set her sights on expanding her diving horizons. She hopes to make this her career and someday even become a diver in the navy. Perhaps when she is grown up the navy will have a place for someone like her.

Her love for water and diving

Varuna, a very confident young girl, said, "I am super comfortable in water. I have seen so many things under water like coral rocks and different kinds of fishes. I also got used to dealing with different situations. Like when the glass is filled with water and when the regulator comes out of your mouth."

You have to keep calm and not panic. If you panic then no one can help you. I love the ocean and everything in it. Diving is like stepping into a new world where everything is calm and beautiful," Varuna shared, her face lighting up with excitement. "I can't wait to explore more of the sea!"
