Simon D'Mello SJ, held an outreach programme visiting old age homes and slums around Margao, distributing essential commodities. The parents supported this initiative wholeheartedly.

The Visits to Old Age Homes:



Loaded with their collected items, students set out to achieve their task. At the onset, they were moved to witness the stark contrast between their own environments as compared to the less fortunate. While receiving blessings from the elderly, students remembered their aged grandparents, especially those who had left early. They spent time, distributed goodies, shared conversations, listened to the

aged, assisted with daily work, moved wheelchair-bound elderly, and keenly conversed with nuns and those who took care and familiarised themselves with administering medical dosages, meals, baths, and care of the sick. The students questioned why anyone would send the aged to old age homes.

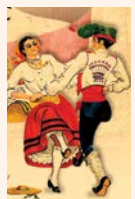
The next stop was a run-run orphanage, housing children, sickly and destitute, with some having diverse illnesses and requiring immediate attention, tender love, and care. Students presented a cultural entertainment program. The elderly joined in games, riddles, sing-alongs – some even danced. In slum areas, students were taken back to observe children running to welcome them and accept the goodies happily.



Feedback on the Visits:

Back to school, students had an interactive session and shared how the visit touched them. Every student had different experiences and vowed to take care of the elderly and never abandon them. They eagerly appreciated those who create a supportive environment and have tremendous patience in their work for others, especially nuns. On a day well spent, students took home unique experiences, moved by the plight of the vulnerable, applauding those working in the field, and vowing to undertake these visits more often in the next academic year.

Traditional Portuguese Dance Form

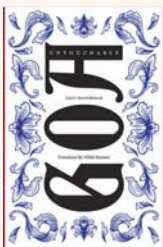


Goa's rich cultural tapestry – the traditional Portuguese dance form, Corridinho. It will be hosted by Goan Messias Tavares.

The King's School commemorated World Heritage Day on April 23rd, 2025, with vibrant enthusiasm, centred around the global theme "Disaster and Conflict Resilient Heritage." Creative activities brought the theme to life across the school. These included clay modelling, mud pot painting, paper straw art, eco-friendly pen stands made from coconut shells, and keychains crafted from recycled materials. Students also participated in ecosystem model-making and heritage-themed puzzle solving, reinforcing environmental and cultural awareness.

The event was inaugurated by Chief Guest Professor Dr. Sushila Sawant Mendes, retired professor of the Government College of Arts, Science and Commerce, Quepem, Goa. A distinguished historian, Professor Mendes highlighted the importance of taking Social Science beyond classroom walls and encouraged exposure to

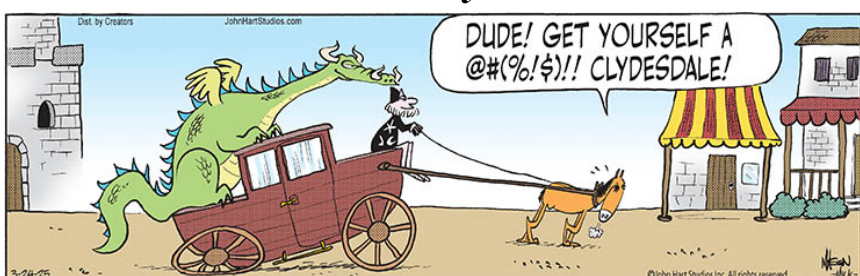

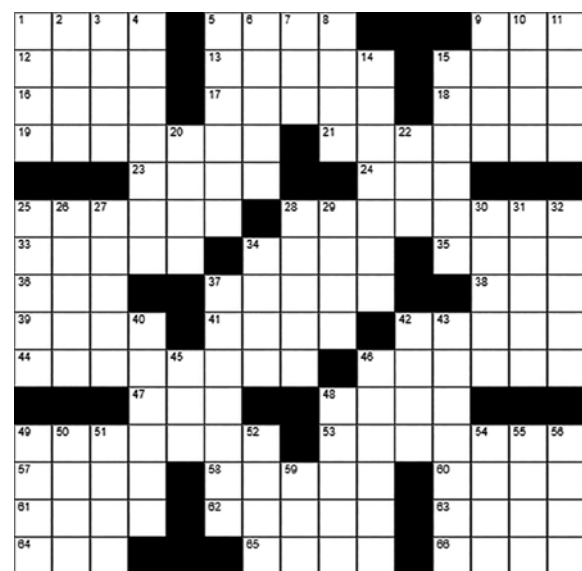

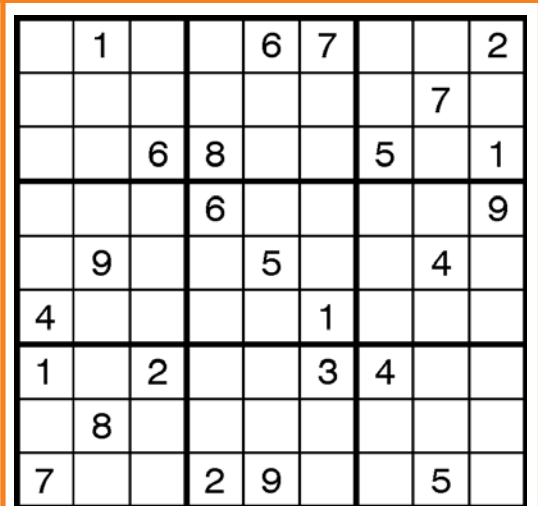
