Goa school body raises pitch for full-time staff

Goa School Managements' Association says Directorate of Education delaying hirings, pushing for teachers on contract, a move that doesn't benefit students

MAPUSA: The Goa School Managements' Association on Tuesday reiterated its long-standing demand for the sanctioning of full-time teaching and non-teaching staff and called for an end to the appointment of teachers on a contractual

Speaking to media persons at the Dnyanprasark Vidyalaya hall, association action committee convenor Prashant Naik alleged that for the past three years, the Directorate of Education has been adopting delaying tactics in sanctioning full-time staff in government-aided schools.

Naik said school managements are being denied approval to fill posts on a regular basis, which is affecting the functioning of schools. "Certain preferred managements are granted permissions to fill posts on regular or full-time basis," he alleged.

The association has been raising this issue since the start of the last academic year, but their demands have fallen on deaf ears. Naik pointed out that earlier, when a teacher retired and a vacancy arose, school managements would write to the Directorate of Education and receive permission to fill the post within a month. But now the whole process has become selective, he said.

School managements are of the view that teachers and non-teaching staff appointed on a contractual basis are often in search of permanent positions elsewhere, leading to a lack of continuity. They stressed that all vacant posts must be filled before the start of the new academic year in June 2025 to ensure the smooth functioning of schools and in the best interest of students.

Naik demanded that school managements be allowed to apply directly to the Directorate of Education and that full-time staff be sanctioned to eligible schools. He also urged the State government to implement the recommendations of two State-appointed committees on the grants-in-aid pattern and the Goa Schools Education Act and Rules.

Hurrah for diaspora: 2 Goans elected **Australian MPs**

PANJIM: Two young members of the Goan diaspora have been elected to the Australian Federal Parliament, bringing pride and recognition to the community in Australia as well as across the globe. Zaneta Mascarenhas and Leon Rebello won in their respective constituencies during the recently held Australian federal elections.

Rebello, aged 30, made history by becoming the youngest Liberal MP in Australia. He will represent the southern Gold Coast seat of McPherson. Rebello's family traces its roots to Verna in South Goa.

Mascarenhas, who is 43. retained her seat for a second consecutive term as MP for Swan in Western Australia, representing the ment of the Goan diaspora ruling Labour Party. Mascarenhas, who had visited Goa five years ago to attend a family function in Benaulim, has spoken with pride about her Goan her-



itage. She has expressed a desire for her children and extended family to stay connected to their cultural

roots. The election of Mascarenhas and Rebello is being hailed as a testament to the talent and commitand community leaders say their presence in the Australian parliament will serve to amplify the voice and visibility of Goans in international forums.



AFP. WASHINGTON: President Donald Trump's education secretary said Monday that Harvard will no longer receive federal grants, escalating an ongoing battle with the prestig ious university as it challenges the funding cuts in court.

The Trump administration has for weeks locked horns with Harvard and other higher education institutions over claims they tolerate anti-Semitism on their campuses threatening their budgets, tax-exempt status and enrollment of foreign students.

Education Secretary Linda McMahon, in a letter sent to Harvard's president and posted online, said that the university "should no longer seek GRANTS from the federal government, since none will be provided."

Union Bank faces scrutiny over Rs 7 cr book purchase

The public sector bank purchased 2 lakh copies of former CEAKV Subramanian's book

AGENCY, NEW DELHI: Public sector lender Union Bank of India spent an estimated Rs 7.25 crore to purchase nearly 2,00,000 copies of a book authored by former Chief Economic Adviser (CEA) Krishnamurthy V Subramanian, according to a media report. The report comes amid Subramanian's recent exit from his post as India's executive director at the International Monetary Fund (IMF), six months ahead of schedule.

According to internal correspondence in the report, the bank's central office ordered 1,89,450 paperback and 10,422 hardcover copies of 'India@100: Envisioning Tomorrow's Economic Powerhouse', to be distributed among customers, corporates, schools, col-



leges and libraries across India. Priced at Rs 350 and Rs 597 respectively, the total procurement cost amounted to over Rs 7 crore.

A 50% advance was paid to Rupa Publications before the book's publication in August 2024, with the rest to be covered through the bank's miscellaneous revenue budget.

Cardinals move into Vatican, to go incommunicado

AFP, VATICAN CITY, HOLY SEE: Cardinals will on Tuesday begin moving into the Vatican accommodation where they will stay during the conclave, on the eve of their secretive meeting to elect a new pope.

Following the death of Pope Francis on April 21, 133 cardinal electors will gather on Wednesday in the Sistine Chapel for an election that could last hours,

days, or even months. They normally stay in

the Vatican's Santa Marta guesthouse, which has en-suite bathrooms and hotel-style room service, but there are not enough rooms for them all.

With representatives from 70 countries across five continents, this conclave is the largest – and the most international - ever. As a result, some of the

cardinals will be housed at Santa Marta Vecchia, a building next door usually used to accommodate Vatican officials.

They will be able to access their rooms - assigned by drawing lots between Tuesday and the mass on Wednesday morning that precedes the conclave.

PANJIM: A day after a massive fire engulfed a dry grass field at Cambrabhat, Taleigao — destroying crops, killing reptiles and sending residents fleeing from their homes — locals have expressed serious concern, calling the incident a wake-up call for the authorities.

Juliet Fernandes, who lives next to the field, described the chaos that unfolded. "Our house was filled with smoke. My neighbour told me to get out immediately. I couldn't even pick up my dogs because they were too scared to move. Though the fire has been extinguished, it has left an impact on us," she told O Heraldo.
