

CEASEFIRE, INTERRUPTED

India says Pakistan violated de-escalation agreement hours after it was announced on Saturday; Trump takes lead in making ceasefire public on social media

PTI, NEW DELHI/ WASHINGTON: Hours after India and Pakistan reached an understanding on stopping military actions, New Delhi on Saturday accused Islamabad of breaching it.

In a late night media briefing, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri called upon Pakistan to take appropriate steps to address these violations and deal with the situation with "seriousness and responsibility".

TWISTS AND TURNS ALL DAY

5 MAY 10 EARLY MORNING: Exchange of missile and drone strikes between Indian and Pakistani forces

AROUND 3.35 PM: Pakistan's Director General of Military Operations (DGMO) called the Indian DGMO. Both sides agreed to cease all firing and military actions on land, air, and sea effective from 5:00 PM IST. Orders were issued on both sides to implement the ceasefire.

5 PM: A ceasefire between India and Pakistan officially takes effect. Both sides halt all firing and military operations

5.25 PM: US President Donald Trump breaks the ceasefire news to the world on Truth Social, hailing the "FULL AND IMMEDIATE CEASEFIRE" and congratulating both countries

SOME MINUTES LATER: Pakistan's Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar confirms the ceasefire on X

6 PM: Indian Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri officially announces the ceasefire in a press briefing

JUST AFTER 9 PM: Omar Abdullah shares video from Srinagar where loud explosions can be heard and drones flying in the sky, claiming the ceasefire has been violated

however, clearly said that the outcome was the result of a direct engagement between the Indian and Pakistani sides and that Islamabad agreed to it with "no pre conditions, no post conditions and no links to other issues."

In a short announcement after Trump's remarks, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri said the directors general of military operations of India and Pakistan agreed on the

understanding during a call this afternoon.

"The Director General of Military Operations of Pakistan called the Director General of Military Operations of India at 1535 hours IST earlier today," Misri told the media at around 6 pm.

"It was agreed between them that both sides would stop all firing and military action on land and in the air and sea with effect from

1700 hours Indian Standard Time today," he said.

The foreign secretary said instructions have been given on both sides to give effect to the understanding and that the DGMOs of the two sides will talk again on May 12 at 1200 hours.

Trump announced the understanding in a post on Truth Social.

"After a long night of talks mediated by the United States, I am pleased to announce that India and Pakistan have agreed to a FULL AND IMMEDIATE CEASEFIRE," he said.

"Congratulations to both Countries on using Common Sense and Great Intelligence. Thank you for your attention to this matter!" Trump added.

The understanding by India and Pakistan on stopping military actions came hours after their militaries targeted each other's in-

stallations in a phase that marked the most severe confrontation following India's 'Operation Sindoor' launched on May 7 targeting nine terror sites in Pakistan and Pakistan-Occupied-Kashmir (PoK). The operation was launched in a strong retaliation to the Pahalgam terror attack on April 22 in which 26 people, mostly tourists, were killed.

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Tourism takes a huge blow as holidayers desert Goa

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MARGAO: The already dismal tourism scene in Goa — marked by empty hotels and restaurants for much of the recent tourist season — has now taken a complete nosedive. Over the past month, murmurs of the tourism downturn have grabbed headlines, with ministers and MLAs of the ruling BJP speaking openly about the tourism sector taking a big hit.

Stakeholders have pointed at multiple factors — from unusually high hotel rates to taxi unions that refuse to cooperate with visitors. Now the tense situation between India and Pakistan seems to have added to this, with numerous cancellations of hotel bookings and events.

"Goa hotels are further affected by the current escalated Indo-Pak conflict, with several hotels receiving cancellations for group reservations," said a senior hotelier on the condition of anonymity due to the sensitive nature of the situation.

"Hotels are experiencing less than 50% occupancy in May, and June isn't looking too good either. Likely to be the worst quarter for Goa tourism in many years."

Responding to queries from **O Herald** on the issue, Travel and Tourism Association of Goa (TTAG) president Jack Sukhija acknowledged the impact of

According to military experts, going ahead, drones or Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) will have a critical role to play in inflicting maximum damage to the opposition in the 'contactless war'.

Monsoon likely to reach Kerala on May 27: IMD

PTI, NEW DELHI: The southwest monsoon is likely to reach Kerala on May 27, earlier than the usual date of June 1, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said on Sunday.

If the monsoon arrives in Kerala as expected, it will be the earliest onset over the Indian mainland since 2009, when it began on May 23, according to IMD data.

The arrival of the main rain-bearing system over the Indian mainland is officially declared when it reaches Kerala, usually around June 1.

The monsoon typically covers the entire country by July 8. It starts withdrawing from northwest India around September 17 and completes by October 15.

The monsoon had set in over the southern state on May 30 last year; June 8 in 2023; May 29 in 2022; June 3 in 2021; June 1 in 2020; June 8 in 2019; and May 29 in 2018.

An IMD official said there is no direct relationship between the onset date and the total rainfall over the country during the season. "The monsoon arriving early or late in Kerala does not mean it will cover other parts of the country accordingly. It is characterised by large-scale variabilities and global, regional and local features," the official said.

What's in a Pope's name? Trilogy has unique link

Australian writer Morris West's Papal trilogy rings out quite true with the choice of the name Leo XIV



The choice of name of Leo XIV, completes in a manner of speaking the Papal trilogy of Morris West, where fiction has come as close to reality as possible.

As an avid reader of fiction, one writer whose works came rushing back to memory as the announcement of the new Pope was read out from the balcony at St Peter's Square are those of West.

West may not be too familiar a name in Goa. He was an Australian writer who died in 1999, but what triggered the mind were his three books on Popes and the Vatican, and how what he penned has turned almost prophetic.

West's first book in this trilogy was published in 1963 and is titled 'Shoes of the Fisherman'. It was about Kiril Lakota, a Pope who was elected from behind the Iron Curtain. Some 15 years later, in

1978, Karol Cardinal Wojtyla became Pope John Paul II and came from Poland, a country that was under communist rule and on the other side of the Iron Curtain. The similarity in the names of Kiril and Karol was not lost on me when I first read

the book, sometime in my teenage days. The book was subsequently turned into a film with Anthony Quinn playing the role of Pope Kiril I and also starred Lawrence Olivier.

West's next book in the trilogy was

'The Clowns of God', published in 1981, about a Pope who abdicates. John Paul II's successor, Pope Benedict XVI resigned from the Papal throne in 2013. In the book, the Pope announces his resignation in the presence of a full consistory of cardinals. In reality, Pope Benedict did so to the Cardinals.

Of course the reasons for the resignation in the book are, well dramatic and fictional, and better left for reading in the book than discussing them here.

Which brings us to West's third offering in the Papal trilogy, 'Lazarus', published in 1990 and about a Pope Leo XIV, a conservative. How the papacy of Leo XIV pans out will be seen over the next few years, for now, it is only the name that is significant.

These are not the only works of West on the Vatican, but other eminently readable books include 'The Devil's Advocate' of which there is also a movie version and 'Eminence'.

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
