MUMBAI CLINCH PLAYOFF SPOT



PTI, MUMBAI: Survakumar Yadav's doughty 73 not out proved to be the difference as Mumbai Indians sealed the fourth and final play-off berth with a 59-run trouncing of Delhi Capitals in the Indian Premier League here on Wednesday.

Suryakumar's masterclass — a 43-ball knock with seven fours and half a dozen sixes in adverse situation — paved the way for a dominating win. The fivetime champions had not made the play-offs last year.

Delhi Capitals, who came into this contest with their fair share of opportunity to reach the final four, saw the tables being turned on them when MI batters collected 48 runs off the last two overs.

But the visitors were also

guilty of a meek reply in a do-or-die contest which had their top-order blown away in the powerplay, leaving the rest of the contest a mere formality.

Chasing 181, Delhi Capitals, who were without regular skipper Axar Patel in this game, rolled over for 121 in 18.2 overs with Sameer Rizvi (39) being the top scorer.

Mitchell Santner was the pick of the Mumbai Indians bowlers, returning 4-0-11-3 and accounting for Rizvi, Vipraj Nigam (20) and Ashutosh Sharma (18). Jasprit Bumrah enjoyed an-

other successful outing as he returned 3.2-0-12-3. Delhi Capitals' hopes suf-

fered severe blows right at the start of the chase when stand-in skipper Faf du

Plessis (6) and KL Rahul (11) fell cheaply, leaving the others with a mountainous task to accomplish.

Rahul, coming off an unbeaten ton in the last game, perished when he edged one off the toe end of the bat awkwardly off Trent Boult (1/29) while du Plessis hit one straight to long-on off Deepak Chahar (1/22)

Bumrah left DC reeling at 65/5 when he trapped Tristan Stubbs (2) in front of the wickets and in the 15th over, Santner dismissed Rizvi and Ashutosh to shut the doors completely on the Delhi Capitals. Earlier in the first half,

it was Suryakumar who anchored MI's resistance even as Delhi's spin pair of Kuldeep Yadav (1/22) and

Nigam (0/25) exploited the sluggish nature of the surface to the maximum benefit.

On an uncharacteristic Wankhede Stadium pitch which had plenty of grip and turn for spinners and slow cutters doing the job for fast bowlers, Suryakumar dug in to produce a quality knock for the fiveime IPL winners

Suryakumar forged two crucial stands which revived a faltering innings. First, amid a challenging phase of play with DC's spinners dominating the proceedings, Suryakumar put on 55 runs for the fourth wicket with Tilak Varma. Towards the end, found a perfect foil in Dhir (24 off 8 balls, 2x4s, 2x6s) to add another 57 runs

Nagal bows out of French Open qualifying

PARIS: India's top singles player Sumit Nagal bowed out of the French Open singles qualifying following a 2-6 4-6 defeat against lower-ranked Jurij Rodionov in the second round, here Wednesday. Nagal, ranked 170th, lost to the 225th ranked Austrian in one hour and 20 minutes at the 225th-ranked Austrian in one hour and 29 minutes at the Roland Garros. He had beaten American Mitchell Krueger in the first round. Nagal will miss the singles main draw of a Grand Slam after appearing in all four in 2024. After losing the first set and trailing 2-4 in the second, Nagal got an opportunity to bounce back in the seventh game. He grabbed the chance by getting the break back. He again fell back in the next game, losing the first two points to be 0-30 but managed to hold, making it 4-4. Serving out to stay in the match, Nagal dropped serve in the 10th game to make an exit.

Bhambri-Galloway bow out of Geneva Open GENEVA: Second seeds Yuki Bhambri and Robert Galloway

suffered a first-round exit at the Geneva Open following a tough battle against the German team of Jakob Schnaitter and Mark Wallner, here Wednesday. The Indo-American pair lost 6-7(3) 4-6 to the unseeded rivals in the Round of 16 at the Euro 5,96,035 clay-court tournament, which is the last in the run-up to the French Open, the clay-court major. Bhambri and Galloway split Euro 3,240 as prize money but no points were awarded since it was a firstround loss. Last week, Bhambri and Galloway had ended runners-up at the Bordeaux Challenger, his best performance since the clay-court season began. He lost in the first rounds at Monte Carlo (with Alexei Popyrin), ATP 500 in Munich, Madrid Masters and Rome Masters.

England's Archer out of West Indies series in latest injury setback

LONDON: England fast bowler Jofra Archer has suffered yet another injury blow that could hamper plans for a Test return against India later this season. The 30-year-old express quick hurt his right thumb while fielding for Rajasthan Royals in the Indian Premier League. He could now be out of action for at least



a month, with England announcing Wednesday he had been withdrawn from the upcoming one-day international series against the West Indies. If Archer is sidelined for several weeks, it may also scupper plans England had for reintroducing him to red-ball cricket as well. Archer was expected to play for the second-string England Lions at home to India next month in the hope of making a much anticipated return during the subsequent five-match series.

Maradona death trial suspended as

judge's impartiality questioned SAN ISIDRO (Argentina): The Argentine court trying the medical team of late football legend Diego Maradona over his death suspended the trial on Tuesday for a week over questions about a judge's impartiality. The court ordered the suspension after defense lawyers said that the judge's involvement in a documentary about the case constituted a possible breach of her duty of impartiality, as well as possible influence peddling and even bribery. Prosecutor Patricio Ferrari said the pause was ordered "to resolve an issue ... of institutional gravity." Two defense lawyers asked for the judge, Julieta Makintach, to be recused from the two-month-old trial. At issue is the alleged use of cameras in the courtroom in violation of a ban on filming the trial. The prosecutor's office will investigate whether the rule was broken and what part, if any, Makintach played in the transgression. Makintach told the court on Tuesday that she could "understand the concerns of all." "But I am convinced of my impartiality," she said, adding that she would consider recusing herself from the case if there were doubts over the matter.

Simraniit Kaur turns professional

NEW DELHI: Former World championship bronze medallist Simranjit Kaur has become the latest Indian boxer to turn professional. The 29-year-old two-time Asian Championship medallist, who represented India in the Tokvo Olympics, decided to take the plunge by signing with former American professional boxer Roy Jones Jr. and Indian professional boxer Mandeep Jangra. Simranjit, who finished second at the National Championship in the 65kg category in March, is the third Indian boxer to turn professional this year after World championship medallists Nishant Dev and Amit Panghal. With this move, Simranjit follows in the footsteps of 2008 Olympic bronze medallist Vijender Singh, Vikas Krishan, Sarita Devi and Neeraj Goyat, who also moved to professional boxing after a good run in the amateur circuit.

England prepares for India with its first Test against Zimbabwe in 22 years

NOTTINGHAM: For England, it's little more than a warm-up match ahead of much sterner examinations to come. For Zimbabwe, it means everything. Trent Bridge in Nottingham will host a four-day test match – something of a rarity for the usual five-day format but perhaps a sign of the future – from Thursday when England and Zimbabwe meet for the first time at international level in 18 years since a Twenty20 World Cup match in Cape Town. You need to go back four more years - to Chester-le-Street in 2003 when Jimmy Anderson, a 20-year-old with highlights in his hair, was playing in his first series – for the last test match between the teams. Zimbabwe's return to English soil continues the African nation's gradual reintegration to test cricket after two decades of political interference, poor governance and sanctions that resulted in the team being exiled from test cricket for around six years.

India have incredible battery of batters, can't take them lightly: Stokes

PTI, LONDON: India will be as formidable as ever despite the absence of Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma during the five-Test series against England, given the "battery of batsmen" they possess, feels all-rounder Ben Stokes, who will lead the home side during the gruelling series beginning on June 20.

Stokes, 33, who is returning to the side after undergoing surgery on his left hamstring in December, added that in Kohli India would miss someone with loads of fighting spirit and competitiveness on the field.

Both Rohit and Kohli retired from the longest format earlier this month.

"One thing about India is their battery of batsmen; it is just incredible. The time I've spent in the IPL, they've got batters coming out of there... can't say a word on this in this interview but you know what I mean," Stokes said in a video posted by England and Wales Cricket Board.

"You can never take any Indian team lightly even if the fact that they are



without two of their great batsmen." Stokes said that the onus would be on his bowlers to put India under pressure in the opening Test.

"We always look to get out the opposition at the start of the Test match and then look to see how we adapt throughout the game as it progresses. But I know they (India) have got two big retirements. They have been such an important part of the Indian team and all the success they've had," he added.

"It's going to be a long tough summer. Five Test matches always is, always is against India as well and tomorrow (the one-off Test against Zimbabwe) is the start of the tone setting."

Kohli's iconic stature and his competitiveness have made a lot of difference to the team's success over the years and Stokes said he personally would miss him on the field.

"What India would miss maybe is his fighting spirit out in the game, his competitiveness, desire to win. He's made No.18 (jersey) his, hasn't he?

"So, we haven't seen No.18 on the back of any Indian shirt. It's going to be a shame not to be playing against him because we both playing against each other, we both have the same mindset on the field

"He's been incredible. No doubt there's been a lot of praise for him in India, there's definitely been praise for him from players here. He's done really well against England... he's a class player," added Stokes.
