Annual cover-up of Cuncolim's hazardous waste dump begins

The long overdue transportation of 35,000 tonnes of hazardous waste from the Industrial Estate to the Pissurlem disposal facility will have to wait another year

MARGAO: As authorities commenced the process of covering hazardous waste at the Cuncolim Industrial Estate, concerned citizens have raised strong objections, demanding more comprehensive action to environmental prevent contamination and protect agricultural land.

Residents from the surrounding areas have voiced concern that simply covering the hazardous waste is not a long-term solution, or even a safe short-term option for the monsoon. They emphasised that leachate from the waste continues to seep into nearby fields, contaminating underground ing areas. water sources and threatening livelihoods.

"This is not just industrial waste anymore—it has effectively turned into a mining pit, leaking toxins into our fields," said Aviraj



Dessai, a local resident. The waste site, long criticised for being a health and environmental hazard, has grown increasingly dangerous, especially during the monsoon season when runoff from the dump carries contaminants into low-ly-

Citizens are now demanding that the entire field dump be removed and shifted to a secure location with proper containment measures.

Locals have also pointed out that the current efforts fall short of environmental norms and do not address the root of the problemthe illegal and unregulated dumping of hazardous industrial waste.

unless the leachate is controlled and the waste is relocated, the threat to nearby ecosystems will persist. Citizens are calling on the Goa State Pollution Control Board (GSPCB) and the Department of Industries to step in and take stricter enforcement action.

CB Chairman Mahesh Patil said they had formally approached the Union Environment Ministry for financial assistance, estimating the transportation cost at Rs 14-15 crore. He noted that the Ministry has agreed in principle to partfund the project under a

Margao, Fatorda locals wake up to dry taps again

MARGAO: Residents of Margao and Fatorda were left with dry taps and empty tanks for the second day on Wednesday, even as sheets of rainwater continued to pour from

the sky. While localities connected to old pipelines continue to receive water, those on the new line have had their supply completely cut off - without prior notice. Families were seen putting out buckets and pans, collecting rain water for their household needs.

Residents are frustrated and left without answers as the water crisis drags on without resolution.

tially promised restoration by this evening, the latest updates suggest water may not be available until well past midnight — or possibly even tomorrow morning, alleged citizens.

Savio Coutinho, Convener of the Margao Congress Block, strongly criticised the lack of urgency from the authorities.

"It is unacceptable that Margao residents are left

without water for over 24 hours, and no concrete action has been taken. What is more shocking is the silence of our local leaders. Where are the emergency water tankers? Why are basic needs being ignored?"

He further added, "The promises made to Madgaonkar residents on 8th March 2025 have turned out to be hollow. The least the administration can do now is ensure that water tankers are deployed immediately to all affected areas — not tomorrow, but right now.

The Margao Congress Block is calling for the PWD Water Supply Division and the Margao MLA to respond immediately and ensure water supply in full swing. "The people deserve timely and fair access to essential services," said Coutinho.

Sewage gushes onto streets in Malbhat-Margao, residents demand lasting solution

MARGAO: For the past several days, residents of Malbhat in the Aquem area of Margão have been grappling with a serious sanitation crisis, as raw sewage continues to pour from an overflowing chamber into a nearby nullah adjacent to Cine Vishant Theater.

Local resident and civic activist Savio Coutinho expressed deep frustration over the ongoing problem. He explained that the sewage is not only flooding open gutters but also seeping into residences, creating an unbearable stench

and exposing families to hazardous conditions.

"This isn't the first time we're facing this problem. We endured a similar situation last year, yet authori-

ties have failed to act decisively," Coutinho said. The recurring nature of the crisis has raised ques-

tions about the Margão Municipal Council's commitment to public health and

Coutinho highlighted that although a robotic machine was recently procured to clean sewage chambers, it remains unused.

The equipment was purchased despite clear indications that it would not be compatible with the existing chamber design. As a result, it now lies idle, and sanitation workers are forced to revert to manual cleaning methods," he added.

Residents have voiced their disappointment over what they describe as negauthorities, stressing that the absence of a long-term solution has left the community vulnerable to disease outbreaks, especially with the monsoon underway.

Calls are growing louder for the MMC to take immediate action. Locals are demanding that the council not only address the current overflow but also implement structural improvements to prevent future incidents. Community members insist that health and safety must be prioritised, and that temporary fixes are no longer acceptable.

Navelim garbage to be treated at Cacora plant

MARGAO: The Goa Solid Waste Management Authority (GSWMA) has initiated the process of clearing and transporting accumulated waste from Navelim constituency to the Cacora waste treatment plant.

The operation began on Wednesday and has been welcomed by local representatives and village panchayats.

The move brings much-needed relief to residents of Rawanfond. Davorlim, and Aquem-Baixo, whose panchayats have extended full support to the initiative. Navelim MLA Ulhas Tuenkar expressed satisfaction over the progress, noting that the garbage problem had persisted for years due to inadequate waste manage-

Tuenkar also revealed that discussions were held with all five panchayats within his constituency regarding coordinated waste management.

South Goa Collector orders demolition of 2 unsafe buildings

MARGAO: As the South Goa District Collector issued instructions for the demolition of two unsafe buildings in Margao, former minister Babu Azgaonkar strongly criticised the Margao Municipal Council (MMC) for failing to ensure public safety, citing negligence and lack of initiative.

Speaking to reporters, Azgaonkar expressed outrage over the MMC's justification that lack of funds was preventing it from dangerous demolishing structures.

The MMC has submitted a list of 21 unsafe buildings in the city to the District Collector, but action has been limited. Azgaonkar argued that the cost of demolition should be recovered from the owners of the buildings and that continued inaction is endangering lives.

"The Chairperson is more focused on increasing fees than delivering safety and essential services. The Margao MLA must also take this matter seriously," he added.



on Tuesday to discuss the issue, South Goa Collector and District Disaster Management Authority Chairperson Egna Cleetus, IAS, raised critical concerns about the growing number of dilapidated buildings posing risks to the public. She directed the Deputy

Collector to issue orders to the Executive Engineer of PWD (W.D. VIII - Buildings) to carry out the demolition of two identified unsafe buildings.

The Chief Officer of MMC reported that three out of 26 families still remain in the unsafe Indira Apartments, and the municipality lacks the equipment and expertise for demolition. In the case of the Cabecca de Calconde building, the matter is under litigation in the High Court, and only one occupant remains. The municipality reiterated its inability to proceed due to lack of resources and requested assistance from the District


