PTI, THANE: In a major crackdown on illegal liquor smuggling, police in Ma-harashtra's Thane district have seized over 18,000 bottles of counterfeit Indian Made Foreign Liquor (IMFL) valued at more than Rs 45 lakh. The liquor was allegedly transported from Goa and repackaged in Thane for local sale. Four persons have been arrested in connection with the case.

Round-the-clock vigil at Ganjem river after series of drownings

Authorities ban bathing, picnics following four deaths

PONDA: Heightened vigilance is to be enforced along the Ganjem River following a spate of tragic drownings, with four young men having lost their lives at the same spot since March. In the wake of the most recent incident on June1 - when two young athletes from Sai Sports Authority, Ponda, drowned while bathing - local authorities, including the Usgao-Ganjem Panchayat, Ponda police, and residents, have resolved to implement stringent safety measures to prevent fur-

ther loss of life. Two others were rescued by locals. Earlier, during Holi celebrations in March, two youths from Khadpan-Ponda—originally from Karnataka—also lost

their lives at the same spot. Taking serious note of the recurring incidents, a strict action is taken, inmeeting was held at the Panchayat office in the presence of Ponda PI Vijaynath Kavlekar, Sarpanch Ramanath Dangui, and the panchayat body. The meeting resolved to adopt strict preventive meas-

ures, including round-theclock vigil and legal action against those entering the river for bathing or picnicking.

Sarpanch Dangui said, "The Panchayat has decided to install warning signboards along the riverbank and enforce the ban on bathing and picnics. The Ponda police, along with panchavat members and local residents, will maintain vigilance. If anyone is seen entering the river, locals are to immediately inform the police." He added that the sec-

tion of the river below the Ganjem barrage is particularly hazardous and has become a site of increasing fatalities, especially among tourists. "We have already received a prohibitory order from the South Goa Collector banning such activities during the monsoon. We will ensure cluding arrests if necessary," he said.

The meeting concluded with a unified commitment from the police, panchayat, and public to prioritise safety and prevent further tragedies in the area.

PMC orders eviction of vendors from dilapidated fish market

PONDA: The Ponda Municipal Council (PMC) has issued a 72-hour eviction notice to vendors operating on the first floor of the fish market building, directing them to vacate the premises due to the deteriorating structural condition of the G+1 structure. The notice comes after the vendors refused to relocate to the Palika Bazar Market, as proposed by the Council

Last week, PMC had requested cloth merchants. tailors, grocery shop owners and other vendors currently operating from the first floor of the fish market to shift to the Palika Bazar Market, where alternative space has been allocated for them. This decision follows the earlier relocation of fish vendors from the ground floor to the basement of the Mar-



ilar safety concerns. However, the first-floor

vendors have resisted the move, citing fears of losing customers. They insisted they should instead be accommodated in the Market Complex shed for the smooth running of their businesses. In protest, the vendors are now demanding clarification from the PMC as to why they are not being shifted to the Market Complex shed as requested. They have also warned of staging dharnas at the PMC office if their demand is not met.

cials displayed the formal eviction notice at the fish market premises, giving the vendors 72 hours to vacate and relocate to Palika Bazar. The notice, issued by the

PMC Chief Officer, cites the findings of the Municipal Engineers who deemed the G+1 fish market building to be in a "severely dilapidated and structurally unsafe condition." The report highlighted critical risks including corrosion of slabs and beams, raising fears of a potential collapse, especially during the monsoon season.

Assagao clash: Cross complaints registered

Fishermen urge halt to watersports during crucial spawning season in Sinquerim river

Union claims fish spawning activities disturbed; economic stability of fishing communities in Singuerim, Candolim, and Nerul areas at stake

MARGAO: The All Goa Small Scale Responsible Fisheries Union (AGSSRFU) has escalated its demand for the immediate revocation of water sports and tourism canoe permits in the Singuerim River, citing significant disruption to local fishing communities and critical fish spawning seasons.

The union's latest letter to the Captain of Ports follows a series of unsuccessful attempts to protect traditional fishing livelihoods in the region.

The dispute centers tourism canoes around with PNJ registration that began operations on June 1, 2025, despite assurances given during a personal hearing held on May 30 at

a stable and self-sustaining

local fishery that histori-

cally supported numerous

fishing families. The union claims that despite the Captain of Ports' office mandating 40 HP outboard motors for these canoes, some operators are using deceptive stickers indicating lower 9 HP capacity motors while actually deploying the more powerful engines. The situation intensified

during the May 30 personal hearing when a fisher from Candolim, who is also an AGSSRFU member. raised concerns about motor capacity discrepancies. The union alleges that the Captain of Ports responded rudely, asking "Are you questioning my decision?" The fishermen's organisation has criticized this response as inappropriate and contrary to democratic principles, stating that questioning administrative decisions is a fundamental right and necessary for accountability.

AGSSRFU has expressed dissatisfaction with the Captain of Ports' decision to outsource dispute resolution to Olencio Simoes, particularly as water sports operations resumed on June 1 despite ongoing concerns. The union argues that this approach has failed to address the core issues affecting fishing communities and their families' livelihoods.

The union's demand is grounded in Section 8 of Gazette Notification No. B 14022/WS/Special Permissions/COP dated July 7, 2023, which states that the "Captain of Ports reserves the right to grant or deny the NOC's in case of congestion, local fishermen problems, safety of navigation and may he revoked without assigning any reasons thereof." The fishermen's organization is calling for the immediate invocation of this provision to suspend all water sports and tourism canoe permits in the Singuerim River from June through August. The timing of this request

coincides with the crucial fish spawning season, which traditionally provides significant income for local fishing families during these months. AGSSRFU argues that allowing tourism activities to continue during this period will have longterm negative impacts on fish populations and, consequently, on the sustainable livelihoods of traditional fishing communities.

BJP leadership reviews Goa strategy, cabinet reshuffle still a suspence

PANJIM: Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) national general secretary B L Santosh held lengthy discussions with State president Damodar 'Damu' Naik regarding political developments, even as the latter maintained that he would act at the appropriate time.

Santosh, who arrived in Goa, met Naik at a hotel in South Goa, where the duo discussed political developments in the State and strengthening the party organisation.

The recent outburst by Art and Culture Minister Govind Gaude against the Department of Tribal Welfare over alleged corruption was also discussed, even as the matter has been referred to the party high command in Delhi. Santosh also reviewed

preparations for the upcoming 'Sankalp se Siddhi' (From Commitment to Accomplishment) programme scheduled to be held at Ponda on Sunday, June 8. The event marks the completion of 11 years of Prime Minister Narendra Modi-led NDA government and is part of a nationwide outreach initiative. Santosh departed for Delhi on Friday.

The BJP State president stated that various issues were discussed but declined to comment on the episode involving the Art and Culture Minister. "I don't want to speak anything for now but I will act at the right time," Naik said.

When asked whether the much-anticipated cabinet reshuffle was discussed, Naik said, "I have briefed him about everything — what is good and what is bad. Let him take a decision."
