The GSPCB's affidavit confirmed action against Diaz (a unit of P&P Food Corporation), located in Gaum Vaddi, Anjuna, and called on the operator to appear for a hearing on June 20 to show cause why their 'Consent to Operate' should not be revoked.

When the petitioner

questioned why action was limited to one establishment, Justice Dangre instructed, "Compile all violations and submit them to the Amicus Curiae."

The court was also informed that several establishments along the Baga coast continue to disturb religious institutions, including Xavier Retreat House, which has joined the case as an intervenor. The retreat house submitted records of seven unanswered complaints made between June 9 and 17 to the Calangute Police and other authorities.

Justice Dangre directed the impleadment of the Calangute Police Inspector in the case, noting that repeated complaints had gone unaddressed.

"This case is going on with directions being issued on suggestions and recommendations and this is taking too long," said Justice Dangre, ordering the Amicus Curiae to present a synopsis of all directions issued so far and their compliance status at the next hearing on July 14.

'Supari Andolan' will continue, says Kala **Rakhon Maand**

Group welcomes Gaude's removal but vows to protest until KA is fully restored to former glory

PANJIM: Members of Kala Rakhon Maand on Friday declared that their ongoing 'Supari Andolan' would continue despite expressing satisfaction over the sacking of Art and Culture Minister Govind Gaude from the Cabinet.

Speaking to reporters, Devidas Amonkar of Kala Rakhon Maand stated. "Kala Academy has not been restored to what it was. We have observed that there are more problems than what was reported earlier. But under these circumstances, Minister Govind Gaude has been sent home. We do not know whether the minister has been sent home or has been put into hiding."

He alleged that Gaude had been used as a "shield" when the group was actively raising concerns over the state of the Kala Academy. "Still, we have not received the full details of the amount spent on the so-called renovation of Kala Academy. But now one message has gone across — that nobody should try to play with artists," Amonkar said.

Kala Rakhon Maand also demanded that the key posts of Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Member Secretary of Kala Academy be reserved for individuals from the field of art and culture.

"We do not want politicians in these positions. Politicians have destroyed the Kala Academy," the members asserted.

PANJIM: Minister for Archaeology Subhash Phal Dessai on Thursday announced that the Goa State Heritage Policy will be implemented in a phased manner over the next five years.

Speaking at a press conference held at Mantralaya, Porvorim, the Minister said that under the Goa State Heritage 2025 plan, 122 heritage houses across the State have been identified for restoration and maintenance.

He also revealed that the government intends to develop a revenue-sharing model in collaboration with the owners of these properties to support their long-term upkeep. "The initiative aims to preserve Goa's architectural legacy while ensuring

sustainable use of heritage be conducted to identify properties," he stated. Phal Dessai said the pol-

icy will remain in place for five years and will be analysed at the end of the term. "If required, it will be reviewed based on its impact and outcomes," he added.

As part of the broader implementation plan, the Minister said that a comprehensive survey will also antique items lying in villages, with documentation and historical research to be compiled into a dedicated report.

The policy further includes plans for the restoration of 222 heritage structures, the revival of 46 folk art forms, and the preservation of 61 traditional occupations.

Absconding land grabbing mastermind Suhail arrested

PANIIM: Mohammad Suhail alias Michael (48), a notorious land grabber who had been absconding, was arrested by the Crime Branch on Friday near a petrol pump in Quepem.

Suhail, a resident of Pilar, Goa, originally from Davangere, Karnataka, was wanted by the Crime Branch in connection with multiple involving forgery,

cheating, and criminal conspiracy. A habitual offender, he is believed to be the mastermind behind several high-profile land grabbing operations.

Between 2012 and 2023, Suhail had previously been arrested in over a dozen cases across Goa. These include cases registered with the Special Investigation Team (SIT), the Economic Offences Cell (EOC), and police stations.

PONDA: Panic gripped the residents of Varchawada, Dhavalim, on the night of 19 June after a fully grown leopard entered the courtyard of a house in the Kulagar Bagayat area at the foothills, in an apparent attempt to poach a dog.

Mangal Gaude narrowly escaped a terrifying encounter when she stepped outside around 7.30 pm, alerted by the loud barking of her two dogs. "It was a close shave," she said, recounting the moment she saw the leopard charging into her courtyard. "Seeing me and hearing my cries for help, the confused leop-

to catch the dog and disappeared from the site."

Her dogs managed to escape unscathed and fled into the house for safety. Gaude added, "I heaved a sigh of relief as the leopard, despite being just a short distance away, did not attack me.'

Her husband, Prakash Gaude, expressed concern over the increasingly frequent appearance of wild animals near their home. "We fear for our lives, especially during the evening hours when darkness sets in. These wild animals often enter our area between 6.30 pm and 8.30 pm. While

main worried for our safety," he said.

This is not an isolated incident. Prakash recalled a frightening episode last vear when a leopard entered their house through the main door and was discovered sitting on top of the refrigerator. As soon as it was spotted, it fled the scene.

He also noted that another family member had once seen a black panther on their pathway leading to the house. In addition, wild bison are frequently spotted in their plantation area. The Gaudes live in the

Kulagar Bagayat region, a densely vegetated slope

rich with betel nut, coconut and other plantations. The area is home to eight small springs and a lake, which serve as water sources for

the wild animals. "Due to widespread deforestation, wild animals now roam closer to human settlements in search of water and food. Leopards specifically target dogs," Prakash said.

The family, along with other local residents, have urged the Forest Department to take immediate steps to ensure their safety. They have called for measures such as installing cages to trap leopards or driving the animals back into deeper forest zones.
