# US BOMBS IRAN NUKE SITES

# **Tehran confirms attacks on the Fordow, Natanz** enrichment facilities and the Isfahan nuclear site

AP, DUBAI: The United States joined Israel's war against Iran by dropping 30,000-pound bombs on a uranium enrichment site early Sunday, raising urgent questions about what remains of Tehran's nuclear programme and how its weakened military might respond.

Iran lashed out at the US for crossing "a very big red line" with its risky gambit to launch strikes on three Iranian nuclear sites with missiles and the bunker-buster bombs.

"The warmongering and lawless administration in Washington is solely and fully responsible for the dangerous consequences and far-reaching implications of its act of aggression," Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said, adding that he would immediately fly to Moscow to coordinate positions with close ally Russia.

The Atomic Energy Organisation of Iran confirmed that attacks took place on the Fordow and Natanz enrichment facilities as well as the Isfahan nuclear site. Both Iran and the UN nuclear watchdog said there were no immediate signs of radioactive contamination around the sites.

# Yet another heritage breach in Old Goa, this time near St Augustine Tower

Action committee claims work being carried out without proper permissions and several trees have been felled

PANJIM: The members of the Save Old Goa Action Committee (SOGAC) and local residents are up in arms over the ongoing construction activity allegedly taking place in the buffer zone of the historic St Augustine Tower in Old Goa as they claim that the work is being carried out without proper permissions and several trees have been felled to pave way for the project.

Claiming that unchecked construction threatens the heritage and ecological value of Old Goa, they demanded immediate intervention from authorities to halt further encroachment and called on Chief Minister Pramod Sawant to urgently implement a master plan for Old Goa.

Speaking to reporters, Vincent D'Silva, from the Save Old Goa Action Committee, stated, "A new construction is coming up near the St Augustine Tower. We do not know who has granted permission for this project — whether it is the panchayat, the Forest Department, or the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI). We have made it clear on multiple occasions

served that poles have already been erected, the area is fenced with iron sheets, and construction work is underway. If all permissions were in place, there would be a mandatory display board at the site listing approvals from various departments — but no such board exists. Despite repeated objections, construction activities are continuing in the buffer zone. Previously, we opposed the building of the interpretation centre and the police station, and now this new project has begun."

D'Silva emphasised the need for comprehensive planning: "We want to reiterate that no construction

activity should be allowed in the buffer zone of the Basilica of Bom Jesus, a UNES-CO World Heritage site. We urgently demand the formulation of a master plan for Old Goa. It is essential for protecting the sanctity and integrity of this historical area."

Caterina Peres, another member of the Save Old Goa Action Committee, questioned the lack of enforcement despite public assurances. "The Town and Country Planning (TCP) Minister, Vishwajit Rane, has publicly stated that no construction will be permitted in the buffer zone. Yet, the interpretation centre and the police station have already been built there — and now this new construction is underway.

# Arrests near schools reveal expanding drug threat in Goa

Police crackdown welcomed, but activists demand more stringent action against entrenched drug networks targeting youth

PANJIM: On 16 June, Pernem Police arrested 28-year-old Shivanand Gawade from Parcem, who was found with 732 grams of ganja worth ₹70,000 concealed in his scooter. Just two days later, Bicholim apprehended Police 19-year-old Harshadeep Ghanekar from Mayem with 29 grams of ganja

valued at ₹2,900. Both the state. arrests were part of a special operation by the police targeting drug peddling near schools

and colleges. While the arrests have been welcomed, social activists and concerned citizens argue that such actions are merely cosmetic and do little to dismantle the deeper, organised drug networks operating across During a drug-aware-

ness event on 22 June, the Superintendent of Police, Anti-Narcotics Cell, acknowledged the scale of the issue, saying, "Illicit drug trafficking and drug use are rising, especially among the younger generation. It's destroying families and society and poses a national threat. This

menace must be eradicated."

Sabina Martins, Convenor of Bailancho Saad, raised critical questions about the nature of the arrests. "Selling ganja to students is deeply worrying. But were they caught selling or merely in possession? The legal consequences differ significantly," she told **O Heraldo**.

## Pahalgam attack: NIA arrests two men for harbouring terrorists

PTI, SRINAGAR: In a major breakthrough, the National Investigation Agency (NIA) has arrested two men for harbouring the terrorists who had carried out the Pahalgam terror attack that left 26 people dead, the agency said on Sunday

According to the NIA, the two men -- Parvaiz Ahmad Jothar from Batkote and Bashir Ahmad Jothar of Hill Park in Pahalgam -- have disclosed the identities of the three armed terrorists involved in the attack.

They have also confirmed that the assailants were Pakistani nationals affiliated to the proscribed terrorist outfit Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT)

"Parvaiz and Bashir had knowingly harboured the three armed terrorists at a seasonal dhok (hut) at Hill Park before the attack," the NIA said.

The two men had provided food, shelter and logistical support to the terrorists, who selectively killed the tourists on the basis of their religious identity on April 22, making it one of the most gruesome terrorist attacks ever.

The NIA has arrested the duo under Section 19 of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967. Further investigations

are going on. Meanwhile, Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah on Sunday said the efforts put in by him and his colleagues for the revival of tourism in Kashmir are bearing fruit, as tourists are returning to the Valley. "The last time I was in
