MARGAO: Citizens of Margao have formally objected to the Draft Margao Master Plan 2041, raising serious concerns about the planning process and demanding greater community involvement in shaping the city's future. The objections were submitted to the Margao Municipal Council (MMC) by Goyche Fudle-Pilghe Khatir (GFPK), with a copy being submitted to the Goa State Urban Development Agency (GSUDA).

The controversy stems from the recent public meeting at the MMC hall where the Mumbai-based consultant presented the draft plan on behalf of GSU-DA. During the presentation, the consultant clarified that the master plan is non-statutory and merely supplements the existing Outline Development Plan (ODP) rather than replacing it, a clarification that has sparked further concern among citizens.

Thus, GFPK has demanded that the ODP of Margao be finalized first with people's participation, followed by stakeholder meetings to consult on all Master Plan-related issues at the conceptual stage. They are calling for comprehensive data collection on all parameters to be gathered and shared publicly, with priority areas identified for primary attention in the Master Plan before addressing secondary issues.

The citizen's group has urged authorities to approach the Margao Master Plan as a community effort with a bottom-up approach, emphasizing the need for collective participation in shaping the city's future. They await further developments on the matter while maintaining their stance that meaningful community involvement is essential for any successful urban planning initiative in Margao.

Despite collector's order, unauthorised gaddas remain outside Aquem Power House

MARGAO: Despite explicit orders from the South Goa District Collector to relocate unauthorised gaddas from outside the Power House in Aquem, several continue to operate in violation of the law.

The action was prompted by a formal complaint from Executive Engineer Kashinath Shetye, who raised serious concerns about the stalls blocking access to the power department facility.

In his complaint to the Collector, Shetye stated that the gaddas were obstructing key entry points needed for the operational disturbing turn with the

power department. He further highlighted that the stalls are located on the footpath, which is a clear breach of court orders banning commercial encroachments on pedestrian walkways.

Following the complaint, the District Collector directed the local civic body to immediately initiate action and ensure the removal of the unauthorized vendors. However, days passed and the gaddas remained in place, suggesting either non-compliance or deliberate inaction by local authorities.

"This is nothing short of encouraging illegalities," said Krishna Raikar, a long-time resident of Aquem. "Instead of supporting an officer who was doing his duty, the authorities are punishing him. The gaddas are illegal, they block footpaths and access to essential infrastructure, and yet no action is taken."

Benaulim fishermen seek govt's nod for dedicated berthing zone at hatchery site

MARGAO: Fishermen from Benaulim have renewed calls for the Goa government to allocate a section of the long-defunct hatchery complex in the village exclusively for their fishing activities, pressing for 5,000 square metres to be set aside to berth their country-made canoes and support related operations.

With their livelihoods increasingly under threat due to the absence of a permanent docking site, the fishing community is looking

we're being forced to park our vessels on private land," he said.

This year, tensions escalated after some private landowners, upset by the use of their beachfront property, lodged complaints with the Fisheries Department. "We've even received notices warning us that our licences might be cancelled if we don't vacate these areas," Fernandes said. Fisherman Pele Fernandes expressed gratitude to the CM for initiating the inspection and hoped that concrete steps would soon follow. "The hatchery site has stood idle for years. Using just a fraction of it could solve so many of our problems," he said. Deputy Collector Shabir acknowledged the difficulties faced by the fishermen during the monsoon and offseason periods when vessels are pulled ashore. "The land is clearly accessible from the shore and suitable for the community's use," he noted after the inspection, adding that a report would be submitted to the District Collector Egna Cleetus for onward transmission to the government.

surprise win for Jacinta Dias amid internal rifts

MARGAO: In a surprising political turn, Jacinta Dias was elected the new Sarpanch of Raia village panchayat on Monday, following a dramatic cross vote from within the majority group of panchayat members

At the panchayat meeting convened to elect a new Sarpanch, Dias secured a narrow victory over Xavier Fernandes by a 6-5 vote. The result came as a shock to many, especially since Fernandes was the presumed frontrunner with backing from the six-member group that had recently gained control.

Just days earlier, the same group of six panchayat members had successfully voted out the then Deputy

Sarpanch and elected Manuel Rodrigues in his place. The leadership reshuffle was set in motion after the resignation of Mario D'Souza, which left the Sarpanch's chair vacant.

It was widely expected that the newly elected Sarpanch would emerge from the dominant group that installed Rodrigues. However,

a surprise cross vote by one of the six members derailed that plan, allowing Jacinta Dias to clinch the top post. The outcome has reshaped the power dynamics in Raia's local body. With Dias as Sarpanch and Rodrigues, from the rival group, as Deputy Sarpanch, the village panchayat is

now led by a politically split executive—a rare and potentially unstable configuration.

Prolonged power outage at **Manora-Raia sparks frustration** Residents furious over regular black-outs; lash out at power dept for failing to address issue

MARGAO: Residents of Manora-Raia grappled with a prolonged power outage on Monday, intensifying long-standing frustrations over the area's unreliable electricity supply.

The outage, which lasted several hours, disrupted daily activities and highlighted persistent power supply issues faced by the community over recent months.

Adding to their frustration, one official from the power department reportedly stated that he was unaware of the power failure in Manora. This shocking claim has only deepened residents' discontent, raising questions

about the communication and accountability within the department.

Local residents said frequent power failures have become a distressing norm, severely affecting work, education, and household routines. Many expressed disappointment at the lack of timely resolutions and growing negligence in addressing the problem.

"Frequent power failures are making life increasingly difficult. We have endured this silently for months, but now it's affecting everything-work, children's studies, and essential household chores," said a resident who wished to remain anonymous.

Menino Quadros, a longtime resident of Manora, voiced deep concern and frustration. "This is not an isolated incident. Erratic power supply has been our reality for months, sometimes with multiple outages in a single week. The authorities must take these issues seriously

and ensure stable electricity for residents," he said. Residents also expressed anger over the perceived lack of initiative from their local elected representative, who they say has failed to take any meaningful steps to address the problem or question the power department over the repeated fail-

es Monday's outage to a fuse failure caused by heavy rains. However, residents were upset that despite early identification of the problem, the fuse replacement took the entire day to complete.

"This delay is unacceptable," Quadros added. "If the fault was detected promptly, why did it take so long to fix a basic issue like a fuse? Such inefficiency adds to the residents' suffering."

With the monsoon season ongoing, residents fear power disruptions could become more frequent and severe. They have appealed to the electricity department to improve maintenance practices and ensure faster responses to faults.

Margao-Panjim commuters hit by KTC bus shortage

MARGAO: A shortage of Kadamba Transport Corporation (KTC) shuttle buses left passengers at the Margao KTC bus stand waiting for over an hour on Monday morning, causing widespread delays and frustration among daily commuters heading to Panjim and beyond. One such passenger explained the cascade effect of selves waiting for over an hour before buses became the delays. "I usually reach available. The delay parmy office in the morning afticularly affected commutter taking the bus from here and then another from Pan-

I was over an hour late. My entire morning schedule was disrupted." Her experience was echoed by dozens of other passengers who depend on the Margao-Panjim route as the first leg of their daily commute.

Others too pointed out that the bus delay meant they reached an hour later to Panjim and missed a portion of work in the morning, things that their higher ups may not always accept as others had reached on time and here they were delayed for no fault of theirs.

One such person was jim," said Priya Naik. "Today a bank employee who

lamented that this has become a recurring problem. "We depend on these buses for our daily commute, and such disruptions affect our work attendance. Plus standing in line for an hour is frustrating," he added.

The delayed commuters called for urgent deployment of additional buses on the heavily used Margao-Panjim route. They pointed out that this route is essential for people travelling to multiple destinations and pointed out that when the Margao-Panjim buses are delayed, it creates a chain reaction of delays.

Global Konknni forum hits back at Velingkar's remarks

MARGAO: The Global Konknni Forum has strongly reacted to recent remarks by Subhash Velingkar, who criticised the demand for granting official status to the Roman (Romi) script of Konknni under the Goa Official Language Act (OLA).

In a press statement, the Forum's Secretary, Jose Salvador Fernandes, said Velingkar's statements reflect frustration over the lack of scope for elevating Marmits that the Portuguese

athi to the same status as Konknni in Goa's language policy.

Fernandes accused Velingkar of attempting to exploit the Konknni community's demand for recognition of the Romi script, while ignoring the historical and cultural significance of the script in Goa.

He also alleged that Velingkar was trying to divide Goans along linguistic lines, after previously failing to divide them communally. "Velingkar himself ad-

wrote Marathi in Roman script to cater to newly converted Goans," Fernandes noted. "This should make him appreciate the contribution of the Romi script, which also helped Marathi survive in Goa."

The Global Konknni Forum clarified that its demand to accord equal status to the Roman script alongside Devanagari is not linked to Portuguese colonial legacy, but is a bid to rectify "37 years of injustice and script-based discrimination."
