ienna is a city of beautiful surprises - with all the ingredients that go into the making of a lovely European holiday. The charming old town, the splendid Baroque churches, the majestic cathedrals, the magnificent old buildings, the larger-than-life statues and the lively café culture.

SIGHTS AND SOUNDS

The fantastic sight of the 445-feet tall St. Stephen's Cathedral, that soars into the sky, leaves you in awe. Take that 500-metre high street walk through fine boutiques and label stores to the State Opera and relax on one of the benches to see the most amazing mix of the modern and the traditional in motion



The hop-on-hop-off bus is a great way to see the sights and sounds of the stately city. While the red line tour shows you attractions in the heart of the city (museums, parliament, city hall, university), the blue-line shows you around the suburbs and the outskirts of Vienna, that includes a visit to the Giant

Ferris Wheel and over the Blue Danube. The history of this European city meshes effortlessly with the grind and rush of the modern metropolis. When all the walking and going around gets you tired and hungry, vou can sneak into one of the beer gardens in the inner city, or the traditional cafes that offer schnitzels, sausages and the exquisite sacher torte - a chocolate cake brushed with warm

apricot jam and covered in a shiny coat of rich dark chocolate ganache.

HAVE A BALL


In Vienna, a good 300 balls take place every year - that's practically the Sunday off. The city of waltzes exuberantly celebrates carnival from January until early March, with the ball

in February. From the eclectic Coffee-House Owners' Ball and the Hunters' Ball to the exclusive Doctors' Bal

and the Lawvers' Ball - and yes, the Rainbow Ball for LGBTQI, there's a ball for everyone. And then, there's the grand Opera Ball at the Vienna State Opera in early March, the one day when visitors have the unique opportunity to see the famous opera house on Ringstrasse not only from the spectator's seat but actually experience it 'backstage' surrounded by many music celebrities.

SALZBURG -A CHARMING CITY

The fastest way to reach Salzburg is to take the Rail Jet from Vienna, have breakfast on-board and in less than three hours, you are in Salzburg, the birthplace of Mozart



Back to Salzburg, this is the place where the maestro spent much of his 25 years, before he moved to Vienna. The two residences in which Mozart lived. the town hall where he performed, the original instruments of his time, the artefacts representative of his life and a handful of museums in memory of the great musician - Salzburg is a city dedicated to Mozart. Start at the tourist office on Mozartplatz, and admire the sculpture in honour of the composer. Take snaps of the majestic 18th-century fountain of Neptune and his horses, walk down the alley to Salzburg's prettiest shopping street, take a lazy stroll along the River Salz, veer towards the countryside with the entertaining fourhour Sound of Music tour

This tour takes you through the life of the von Trapp family. The fascinating life of former novice Maria von Trapp and her singing family became a world-wide success when the film was released in 1965, with Julie Andrews starring as Maria The songs from "The Sound of Music" are famous around the globe. The tour takes participants through most of the original shooting locations like Mirabell Gardens and the Pegasus Fountain (the dance scene with Maria and the children) Schloss Leopoldskron (in the film, the house where the family lived); Hellbrunn palace (singing scenes); Nonnberg Convent (where the young Maria was a novice); St. Gilgen / Wolfgangsee (opening scene of the movie) and Mondsee Basilica (wedding scene).




