'Kaanta Lagaa' fame Shefali Jariwala passes away at 42

Actor, model, dancer, and singer **Shefali Jariwala**, best known for her breakout appearance in the 2002 music video 'Kaanta Lagaa', has passed away at the age of 42 in Mumbai. According to initial reports, Shefali suffered a suspected cardiac arrest late Friday night. She was rushed to Bellevue Multispecialty Hospital, where she was declared dead on arrival. The hospital has yet to release an official statement. Mumbai Police visited her residence this morning, and a forensic team has also been summoned to assist with the investigation. While an official statement from her family is still awaited, the All Indian Cine Workers Association has confirmed her death was due to a heart attack. Shefali was also known for her appearances on television shows including 'Bigg Boss 13', 'Nach Baliye 5 and 7', and 'Boogie Woogie'.

The story revolves around an elderly man, Agnelo (Ulhas Tari), who is a bachelor. He resides with Francis (Eddie), his nephew's family including Francis' wife Sophia (Renzia), and their son Leslie (Leslie D'Souza). Eddie's sister, Fatima (Jennifer), a widow, also lives under the same roof with her daughter Reena (Aliva).

Francis, Sophia, and Fatima treat the two children as their own. Agnelo suffers



from a disorder wherein he gets irritated by any noise. He cannot even tolerate the playful nature of the children in the house.

While Francis serves as a sarpanch, his wife is a panch in the village panchayat, and being engrossed in official work,

they hardly have time for the children. Although Fatima works for an NGO, she makes time for Leslie and Reena whenever she is home.

By nature, Agnelo is a greedy man and wants to grab the ancestral property to



sell it off to a Delhi builder, Gupta (Cajie de Curtorim). But his nephew is unwilling to part with the property.

One fine day, Leslie is kidnapped, and nobody knows his whereabouts. Francis and Sophia begin to suspect Agnelo.

Investigations begin under the leadership of PI (Rosario de Benaulim).

Now, who is the actual culprit? Is it Agnelo or someone else in the family? Why was such a play planned in advance? Answers to these queries get unveiled in the last scene.

'KHUIM VHORTOLO?'

Francis de Tuem's 10th production, 'Khuim Vhortolo?', focuses on varied family relationships and greed for ancestral property. When objections arise in relationships, the dire consequences faced are the highlights of the drama.

Ulhas Tari stands tall as the elderly and is ably supported by Eddie, Renzia, and Jennifer. Teenagers Leslie and Aliva stand out in their performances, and their confidence in dialogue delivery wins

the hearts of the audience. Rosario de Benaulim as the police officer and Alijoy as the priest have enacted their roles with ease. Cajie de Curtorim as the Delhi builder is apt, with confident dialogues in Hindi. Eliton makes a cameo.

In the comic acts, there is comedian Rizton, along with Nato, Fiona, and Agnelo, who is projected as a eunuch. The foursome carries a good number of laughter pills under their sleeves and entertains the audience.

In the category of songs, there's Alijoy stepping on stage for the opening, followed by solos by Leslie D'Souza, Rosario de Benaulim, Cajie de Curtorim, and Renzia. There's another song by Francis de Tuem and Alijoy. A political song by Francis de Tuem receives an encore. A duet, trio, and quartet went amiss in the drama. Alex and his musical team have provided good live music offstage.

The stage sets have been designed by Anthony de Ambaji, and Eliton has handled the light effects.
