Biker injured in Verna crash with car

Five arrested for assaulting restaurant employee in Anjuna **Team Herald**

PANJIM: The Anjuna police have arrested five individuals for allegedly assaulting a restaurant cook following an altercation over the relocation of a pedestal fan. The accused have been identified as Rohit Kambli

(23), Kiran Kambli, Kiran Pawar (23) and Vikram Chaudhary (20) - all from Canca and Aditya Manolkar (24) from Valpoi.

According to police, the complainant, Manoj Kumar (25), a native of Bijnor, Uttar Pradesh, and employed as a cook at the Fishermen Village Restaurant in Anjuna, reported that the incident occurred after a dispute regarding the movement of a standing fan from the entrance of his accommodation room.

ing on or moving across the roads not only block traffic but also put commuters at risk." Another regular commuter, Dinesh Shet, added, "Senior citizens and school-going children especially find it difficult to navigate the road safely due to the cattle menace."

According to sources, the cattle are often brought out for grazing by their owners, but once left unattended, they tend to occupy busy roads, causing frequent traffic disruptions.

On Monday, a group of stray cattle was seen blocking the main road at Xelvona, bringing traffic to a complete halt. Despite continuous honking, the cattle did not move. Å truck driver eventually had to get down and physically drive them away. By then, a long line of vehicles—cars,

trucks, and two-wheelers had piled up on both sides. Traffic finally resumed once multiple drivers stepped in to clear the road.

Residents have urged local authorities and the veterinary department to take immediate steps to address the growing stray cattle issue, which they say is turning into a daily nuisance and potential accident risk.

Govt launches incentive scheme to boost job creation

PANJIM: The Union Government has approved the Employment Linked Incentive (ELI) Scheme to promote job creation and social security. Under the scheme, first-time employees registered with EPFO can receive a one-time incentive of up to Rs 15,000 in two instalments - after six and twelve months of service-upon completing a financial literacy programme. Eligible employees must earn up to Rs 1 lakh per month. Employers hiring additional staff will receive incentives of up to Rs 3,000 per month per employee for two years, extendable to four years for the manufacturing sector. Establishments must hire at least two additional employees (for firms with fewer than 50 workers) or five (for firms with 50 or more) for at least six months to qualify. With an outlay of Rs 99,466 crore, the ELI Scheme targets over 3.5 crore jobs over two years and 1.92 crore first-time beneficiaries. The scheme is valid for jobs created between August 1, 2025 and July 31, 2027.

The award is announced annually on January 23, commemorating the birth anniversary of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose.
