Speaker dismisses disqualification petition against 8 rebel Congress MLAs

Decision comes after two years; Tawadkar said that the arguments of the petitioner were factually and legally incorrect

PANJIM: Goa Assembly Speaker Ramesh Tawadkar on Friday dismissed the disqualification petition filed by former Congress president against eight rebel party MLAs who defected to the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP).

The Speaker dismissed the petition after two years stating that the arguments of the petitioner were factually and legally incorrect when he says that the Speaker had decided about the merger in the order dated September 14, 2022.

On October 14, the Speaker had dismissed the disqualification petition filed eight Congress rebel MLAs Digambar Kamat, Michael Lobo, Aleixo Sequeira, Delilah Lobo, Kedar Naik, Rajesh Faldessai, Rudolf Fernandes and Sankalp Amonkar.

The petitioner had argued that all eight MLAs had voluntarily given up the membership of their original political party and had incurred disqualification under Para 2 of the Tenth Schedule of the Constitution.

The respondents claimed that their merger with the BIP was valid as they constitute two-third of the Members of Congress Legislature Party (CLP). They argued that there was no need of an actual and factual merger of the original political parties i.e. Congress and BIP. They stated that as per Para 4 of the Tenth Sched-Dominic Noronha of ule, there was a deemed Dramapur-Sirlim against merger and prayed that the petition be rejected.

Sound demon goes on a rampage across Goa on Narakasur night

All-night music and revelry at different locations drown out the complaints of citizens, who say that effigy makers create a public nuisance with their open drinking, blocking of roads and boisterous celebrations

PANJIM: Thundering music, nightlong revelry, and disturbed citizenry - Narakasur night saw effigy makers turn up the decibel across Goa even as the Goa Human Rights Commission (GHRC) stepped in to turn down the loud music in St Inez, Panjim, after a complaint from a local resident.

Historian Sanjeev Sardesai, who had a sleepless night thanks to the loud music played by Narakasur organisers at Dona Paula, remarked, "Narakasur got an extended life and in our area the effigy was burnt at 7.45 am on Diwali day. The music was so loud that it rattled the windows of my flat."

Sardesai added that the burning of effigies on roads damaged the tarmac and often left debris that could lead to punctures and suggested that the effigy makers must be made to clean up the roads the next day.

Not too far away from Dona Paula, pulsating music made life difficult for citizens in the Tonca-St Inez stretch. Goa RTI Forum joint secretary Sandeep Heble said,

Eminent economist Bibek Debroy passes away

Debroy's last column suggests he had premonition of his death fered from hyperten-

PTI, NEW DELHI: Bibek Debroy, a key economic adviser to the Prime Minister, whose prolific work included economic theory, income inequality, and infrastructure financing, died on Friday. He was 69.

Debroy, who had a history of diabetes, hypertension, and a blockage in the heart for which

he had a pacemaker, was admitted to the AIIMS emergency late on October 31 and died around 7 am on Friday. "He was admitted with subacute

intestinal obstruction. He also suf-

awardee, Debroy was the chairman of the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council since September 2017. A columnist to several
