Five Azerbaijan nationals held at Delhi airport for smuggling gold worth Rs 2.4 cr NEW DELHI: Five Azerbaijan nationals have been arrested

by customs officials for allegedly smuggling into the country gold worth over Rs 2.4 crore at the international airport here, according to an official statement issued on Friday. The accused persons, comprising one female passenger, were intercepted after their arrival from Dubai on April 30, the statement released by the customs department said.

"On personal search of the said passengers, gold items in the form of jewellery, wire, belt buckle and handbag handle etc, totally weighing 3.5 kg valued at Rs 2.44 crore were recovered from them," it read. The accused were arrested and the gold items were seized, it added.

Punjab man arrested for spying for Pakistan's ISI: Police HOSHIARPUR (PUNJAB): A man from Punjab's

Hoshiarpur district was arrested for allegedly spying for Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence and helping the agency in organising anti-India activities, police said on Friday.

The man is accused of aiding anti-India activities by providing sensitive information about Indian Army deployments, and transmitting documents and photos from his mobile phone, they said.

Acting on a tip-off, police apprehended Harpreet Singh near a railroad crossing on Phagwara road in Hoshiarpur on Thursday night. The man, who hails from Tarn Taran district, was currently residing in Vijay Nagar area here. According to police, Singh, who has been living in the city for the past four years, had allegedly travelled to Pakistan twice on a visitor visa where he met ISI officials. He was allegedly in contact with these ISI officials via WhatsApp, they said.

Fire breaks out in forest near Raighat

NEW DELHI: A fire broke out in a forest area near Rajghat here on Friday, Delhi Fire Services (DFS) officials said. The fire spread due to strong winds, they said. "We received two calls regarding a fire in a forest area close to Rajghat. The first call was received at 10:30 am and two fire brigades were pressed into service. Another call was received at 2:50 pm and three more fire brigades were sent to the spot," a DFS official said. The fire spread due to strong surface winds but is under control now, officials said.

German foreign min says Russia will face consequences for cyberattack; NATO, EU show support

AP, BRUSSELS: Germany's top diplomat on Friday said Russia will face consequences after accusing its military intelligence service of masterminding an "absolutely intolerable" cyberattack, as NATO and European Union member countries said they will not let Russia's "malicious" behaviour in cyberspace go unanswered.

Relations between Russia and Germany were already tense, with Germany providing military support to Ukraine in its ongoing war with Russia.

German Foreign Minister Annalena Baerbock said Russian state hackers were behind a cyberattack last year that targeted the Social Democrats, the leading party

in the governing coalition. "Russian state hackers attacked Germany in cyberspace," she said at a news conference in the Australian city of Adelaide. "We can attribute this attack to the group called APT28, which is steered by the military intelligence service of Russia."

"This is absolutely intolerable and unacceptable and will have consequences," she said.

The Council of the EU later said that Czechia's institutions have also been a target of the cyber campaign.

In a statement by the EU's top diplomat, Josep Borrell, the bloc's nations said they "strongly condemn the malicious cyber campaign conducted by

NATO said that APT28 targeted "other national governmental entities, critical infrastructure operators and other entities across the Alliance," including in Lithuania, Poland, Slovakia and Sweden.

"We are determined to employ the necessary capabilities in order to deter, defend against and counter the full spectrum of cyberthreats to support each other, including by considering coordinated responses," said the North Atlantic Council, the principal political decision-making body within NATO.

Baerbock is visiting Australia, New Zealand and Fiii. with the trip focusing on security policy as China

pushes for influence in the Pacific region.

"The defense cooperation between Germany and Australia is close and we would like to deepen it further and together expand it, because we are in a situation where we face similar threats," said Baerbock, who is the first German foreign minister to visit Australia in 13 years.

Discussions between Baerbock and Australia counterpart Penny Wong centered on the conflict in Gaza. "I think we all understand that the only path out of this cycle of violence that we see in the Middle East at such great cost is one that ultimately ensures a twostate solution," Wong said.

Delhi court convicts juvenile of gruesome murder, rape of 5-year-old girl

NEW DELHI: A court here has convicted a juvenile for the gruesome murder and rape of a 5-year-old girl in 2017, saying the totality of all circumstantial evidence established his guilt.

Additional Sessions Judge Amit Sahrawat was hearing the case against the child in conflict with law (CCL) who was accused of raping and battering the victim's head with cement stones, causing her death in February 2017. "This is a case of circumstantial evidence and all the circumstances against CCL are to be considered together. Collectively from these circumstances, the only hypothesis is the guilt of the accused," the court said in an order passed on April 27.

The court said that the deceased was last seen with the CCL and after the victim's father confronted him, the accused disclosed that he had raped and murdered the girl, following which the victim's body was found hidden under large stones in an under-construction site.

TN: Pregnant woman falls from moving train, dies

CUDDALORE (TAMIL NADU): A pregnant woman accidentally fell from a moving train between Ulundurpet and Vriddhachalam and died, police here said on Friday. The woman was identified as Kasthuri (22) from Tirusulam, Chennai who was travelling in the Kollam Express with her husband Suresh Kumar and other relatives for her baby shower function in Tenkasi district. "The woman, who was seven months pregnant, had

complained of nausea and rushed to the washroom. However, she slipped and fell from the train on Thursday night," a senior police official said.

First year B. Tech student commits suicide in Rajasthan's Phagwara

PHAGWARA: An 18-year-old student allegedly committed suicide by jumping from the 10th floor of his hostel here, police said on Friday.

Phagwara Sub-divisional Superintendent of Police (SP) Rupinder Kaur Bhatti identified the deceased as Mayank, a first-year student of B.Tech Computer Science. Mayank was from a Nimoth village in district Rewari, Haryana. He lived in a boys' hostel and jumped from the 10th floor of the building on . Thursday night, she said.

The body was handed over to the family on Friday after the post-mortem. The reason behind him taking this extreme step is yet to be ascertained, she said.

released by Raj Bhavan, Bose said, "I welcome all the generous allegations and the frequent innuendoes passed on me by some political forces. I understand, my friends, there is more in the offing. But one thing is clear, none of the absurd dramas is going to deter me from my determined efforts to expose corruption and curb violence." Claiming that character

First case of wild animal treating wounds with plants documented in study

PTI, NEW DELHI: Evidence of the first case of a wild animal treating their wound with medicinal plants was reported in a new study.

At the Suaq Balimbing research site in Indonesia, researchers observed that a male Sumatran orangutan repeatedly chewed and applied sap from a climber plant to a wound on his cheek.

"During daily observations of the orangutans, we noticed that a male named Rakus had sustained a facial wound, most likely during

a fight with a neighbouring male," said Isabelle Laumer from the Max Planck Institute of Animal Behavior (MPI-AB), Germany.

The research site is a protected rainforest area home to approximately 150 critically endangered Sumatran orangutans. The team included researchers from Universitas Nasional, Indonesia.



Three days after the injury, Rakus selectively ripped off leaves of a liana with the common name Akar Kuning (Fibraurea tinctoria), chewed on them, and then repeatedly applied the resulting juice precisely onto the facial wound for several minutes, the researchers described.

As a last step, he fully covered the wound with the chewed

leaves, they said.

Laumer explained that the plant and related liana species, found in tropical forests of Southeast Asia, are known for their pain-relieving, anti-inflammatory, and other properties important to wound healing.

The plants are used in traditional medicine to treat various diseases, such as malaria, dys-

entery and diabetes, said Laumer, first author of the study published in the journal Scientific Reports.

The researchers observed no signs of wound infection in the days following the injury. They also saw that the wound closed within five days and fully healed within one month.

She explained the "intentional" nature of Rakus's behaviour, as he "selectively treated his facial wound," and no other body part.

"The behaviour was also repeated several times, not only with the plant juice but also later with more solid plant material until the wound was fully covered. The entire process took a considerable amount of time," said Laumer.

While multiple wild primate species have so far been observed swallowing, chewing, or rubbing plants with medicinal properties, this is the first time that they applied them to recent wounds, the researchers said.

Thus, medical wound treatment may have arisen in a common ancestor shared by humans and orangutans, they said.

"As forms of active wound treatment are not just a human universal but can also be found in both African and Asian great apes, it is possible that there exists a common underlying mechanism for the recognition and application of substances with medical or functional properties to wounds and that our last common ancestor already showed similar forms of ointment behaviour," the authors wrote.
