ancient traditions, and architectural brilliance that have withstood the test of time

For travellers seeking to move beyond the usual, exploring India's hidden cultural gems offers a unique opportunity to step into the past, immerse in local traditions, and experience the richness of India's diverse heritage in a more intimate and less commercialized setting.



MAJULI, ASSAM: The River Island of Spiritual and Cultural Legacy

Far away from India's bustling cities lies Majuli, the world's largest river island, floating serenely on the Brahmaputra River in Assam. Majuli is not just a scenic retreat; it is a vibrant cultural hub where the traditions of the Vaishnavite sect have been preserved for centuries.

The island is home to several satras. or monastic institutions, where monks engage in devotional music, dance, and storytelling. The Kamalabari Satra and Auniati Satra offer visitors a glimpse into the spiritual and artistic traditions unique to this region. If you happen to visit during Raas Mahotsav, a festival celebrating Lord Krishna's life, you'll witness breathtaking performances of Sattriva dance, a classical dance form native to Assam

Majuli is also known for its sustainable way of life, with locals crafting beautiful masks, pottery, and textiles using eco-friendly materials. The island faces the constant threat of erosion, making it all the more important to visit and appreciate its rich heritage before it changes forever.

ANDU, MADHYA PRADESH: The Forgotten City of Love and Music

Mandu, often overshadowed by the more famous Khajuraho and Orchha, is a hauntingly beautiful fortress city in Madhya Pradesh. Perched atop a plateau, Mandu is a relic of the medieval Malwa Sultanate, with palaces, mosques, and tombs scattered across the lush landscape.

The most enchanting structure here is the Jahaz Mahal, or Ship Palace, which appears to float on the surrounding water tanks. Built by Sultan Ghiyas-ud-din Khilji, it was designed as a pleasure palace for his royal harem and is said to have been filled with music, poetry, and

LEPAKSHI, ANDHRA PRADESH:

The Forgotten Vijayanagar Marvel Tucked away in the heart of Andhra Pradesh, Lepakshi is a stunning example of Vijayanagar-era architecture that remains surprisingly under the radar. This small town is home to the Veerabhadra Temple, built in the 16th century, a marvel of intricate carvings, giant monolithic sculptures, and a fascinating mix of Hindu mythology and artistic grandeur.


One of the most mesmerising features of this temple is the hanging pillar, a column that barely touches the ground. Local guides often slip thin pieces of paper underneath to demonstrate the gravity-defying mystery of this architectural wonder. Adding to its charm is the colossal Nandi (bull) statue, one of the largest monolithic Nandi sculptures in India, sitting majestically at the entrance of the temple complex.

Lepakshi remains an uncrowded sanctuary for those looking to appreciate temple architecture in solitude. As you walk through its pillared corridors and frescoed ceilings, it feels as though history whispers through the stone carvings, telling tales of a glorious past.

extravagant festivities. Equally mesmerizing is Baz Bahadur's Palace, with its acoustically perfect architecture that once echoed with the soulful music of Rani Roopmati, a Hindu queen whose love story with the Muslim king is still sung in local folklore. The blend of Islamic and Hindu architectural styles in Mandu makes it a fascinating study of India's syncretic culture.

Wandering through Mandu feels like stepping into an abandoned kingdom, where every ruin holds echoes of romance, war, and a bygone era of artistic splendor.

OSIAN, RAJASTHAN: The Desert's Hidden Temple Town The small town of Osian, located on the fringes of the Thar Desert, is a hidden architectural



gem. Known as the "Khajuraho of Rajasthan," Osian boasts an exquisite collection of intricately carved temples dating back to the 8th century. The Sachiya Mata Temple, perched atop a small hill, is a breathtaking sight, with elaborate sandstone carvings depicting Hindu deities, celestial dancers, and intricate floral motifs. Nearby, the Jain temples of Osian showcase the fusion of Jain

and Rajput architecture, each structure adorned with mesmerizing sculptures that have stood the test of time

Osian is also the perfect place to experience a different side of Rajasthancamel safaris through the dunes, stays in desert camps under star-lit skies, and interactions with the local Bishnoi communities, who are known for their deep-rooted environmental conservation traditions.

UNAKOTI, TRIPURA: The Land of a Million Shiva Carvings

Tripura, often overlooked in India's cultural landscape, is home to one of the most mysterious heritage sites—Unakoti, an ancient rock-cut site dating back over a thousand years.

Unakoti, which translates to "one less than a crore" (10 million), is named after the countless rock carvings of Lord Shiva, mythologically believed to have been created by celestial beings. The site features colossal bas-relief sculptures, including a massive 30-foot-tall Shiva head, alongside intricate carvings of other deities and mythological figures

Unlike conventional temples, Unakoti is an open-air site where nature and spirituality merge seamlessly. Covered in moss, surrounded by dense forests, and often shrouded in mist, Unakoti offers a surreal experience-one that feels sacred, untouched, and deeply mystical.

in 1934. His commitment to the poor was profound; he often sacrificed his own comfort to provide for those in need, earning him the affectionate title of 'Pai' among his Sisters and the Orphans he cared for.

The congregation was canonically established as the Congregação das Irmãs de Santo Aleixo in 1949. Later with Post Vatican II, the Congregation came to be known as Congregation of the Handmaids of Christ. He was appointed Vicar General of the Ghats and later became a Papal Chamberlain in 1947. Msgr. Gonsalves passed away on March 21, 1950, leaving behind a legacy of compassionate love and service. In recognition of his remarkable contributions and enduring influence, the celebration on March 21, marks 75 years since his completion of earthly journey. This event will not only honour Msgr Herculano's life but also celebrate the on-going mission of the Handmaids of Christ, who continue to embody his spirit of service.




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
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
